Gwendolyn II. and Aquila, Staunch Boats Owned by Seattle Yachtsmen, to Travel Around Protection Island.

Yachts Evenly Matched as to Size and Trip of 125 Miles Will Give Amateur Sailors a Chance to Test Seamanship.

One of the most interesting events in local yachting circles since the races between the Spirit and the Alexandra for the Alexandra cup last July will take place Saturday, February 22, when the Gwendolyn II and the Aquila, both Seatile bosts, will race from the moorings of the Elliott Bay Yacht Club around Protection Island, out in the Strait, and return, a distance of 125 mautical miles. The race will be under the suspices of the Elliott Bay Yacht Club.

This will be the first time that a race of anything approaching the same distance has been given by any local yacht club. The course calls for about thirty-five miles of sailing out in the open Strait and will give the men on the yawls a chance to display their seamanship.


