

# JUST COGITATING: The Kinnear Brothers

GEORGE KINNEAR always seemed to find life a pleasant experience. He surmounted the obstacles in his way, fulfilled his duties as a citizen, had a happy domestic life, and by thrift and prudence accumulated a fortune.

He was born in Ohio in 1836 and in childhood removed with his parents to Illinois. At 17 he was the boy of all work in a country store. When the Civil War came he promptly enlisted. He regularly sent his pay to his mother to keep the home fires burning, but at the war's end she handed him the entire amount, about \$3,600.

## Hood River to Bury Nisei With Honor

HOOD RIVER, Or., Sept. 9.—(AP)—A Nisei will be buried with honors Saturday in this city, where Nisei names once were stricken from the war's honor roll.

The body of Frank Hachiya, 25 years old, native of this country's fruit-growing valleys, holder of the Silver Star for gallantry, is home from Leyte.

The American Legion, which in wartime bitterness struck from the honor roll of county service men the names of Japanese-Americans, will join with the Veterans of Foreign Wars in conducting the services.

Hachiya died on Leyte to get information on Japanese positions ahead of advancing American troops. He crawled back to his lines, mortally wounded, but he had the information.

## Bridge-Leaper Can't Explain His Action

PASADENA, Calif., Sept. 9.—(AP)—Sherman A. Edwards, 25 years old, movie studio chemist, was in critical condition today in a hospital after falling 60 feet off the Holly Street bridge.

Edwards said he leaped from the bridge but did not know why.

So they sat in the buggy and watched the fireworks and the whole episode was so pleasant that they decided to repeat it the next year. With occasional rain, as during the year this was done, and then they were married and lived happily ever after.

In 1874, Mr. Kinnear made a tour of the Pacific Northwest. He was greatly impressed with the location of Seattle and its beautiful environment, and bought land which later became the G. Kinnear addition on the south side of Queen Anne Hill, and the original nucleus of that development. Four years later he sold his Illinois land for \$50 an acre and with this tidy sum came to Seattle for keeps. He devoted himself to developing his property, added to his holdings, especially some strategic corners in the downtown area, and assumed a large measure of a citizen's duty in the struggling community. He was active in organizing the Home Guards, a volunteer force of men, and was captain of the guards during the anti-Chinese riots, when five rioters were shot, one fatally. He gave money to Paris to the city and in his later years he and Mrs. Kinnear traveled extensively. With uncanny vision he wrote from Europe: "I often wonder what will become of these great structures. Will they fall, as did the pagan temples when the Christians came into power? Will not

some enemy rise up and with beautiful destroy these superb works of genius and beauty?"

On the morning of July 22, 1912, he was watering the flowers while awaiting the call to breakfast when another call came, and apparently in perfect health and the full enjoyment of life he heeded it and passed on.

A YOUNGER brother, John R. Kinnear, came to Seattle five years after his brother George. He was a student at Knox college when the Civil War came. He, too, promptly enlisted and participated in many of the great battles. At the end of the war he attended the Chicago Law School, was admitted to the bar, and practiced law in Illinois for 15 years, with three years as prosecuting attorney and four years as master in chancery. He came to Seattle in 1883 and the next year was elected to the Territorial Legislature. In 1888 he was elected to the upper house, but statehood intervened and he never took his seat. He was a member of the State Constitutional Convention and chairman of the committee on corporations. He was backed by the entire King County delegation for the office of the first

### HOME CANNING WITH WASHINGTON Peaches

Several varieties of Freestone Peaches are excellent for canning. Either hot or cold pack method may be used in the boiling-water bath. Follow the instructions for method selected.

With the hot pack method the peaches are heated through before packing in the jar. With the cold pack method, the peaches are packed raw in the hot jars.

Wash the peaches, then dip in boiling water, then in cold to loosen the skins for easy peeling. Slip off the skins, cut peaches in halves and remove the pit. Have ready a medium syrup—1 cup sugar to 2 cups water. Heat the peaches in the hot syrup, pack them in hot fruit jars to within 1/4 inch of the top of jar. Cover with boiling syrup, leaving 1/2 inch space in the top of jar. With the cold pack method, place peaches in liquid during boiling. Wipe rims. Place on jar lids, adjusting according to manufacturer's instructions. Process in boiling water bath for 20 minutes. If cold pack method is used, add 5 minutes to processing time.

#### Canning Pears

Handle a small batch of pears at a time to retain the delicate color. The hot pack method is considered better in canning pears than the cold pack. It produces a whiter pear and the processing time is shorter.

Wash the pears; pare; cut in halves, remove the cores and proceed as for peaches. Process 20 minutes. Remove from canner; separate jars 3 to 4 inches apart; cool quickly away from draft.

#### Prune Jam

To 4 cups stoned, chopped Italian Prunes add 3 cups sugar and the grated rind and juice of 1 lemon. Mix together and bring slowly to boiling. Then boil rapidly until thick. If desired, 1/2 cup blanched, chopped almonds may be added to jam 2 to 3 minutes before removing from heat. Pour into hot, sterilized jars and seal at once.
