'World Peace' Tour Blocked By State Dept.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—The State Department today set up a blockade against any tour of American cities by Soviet-and-satellite delegates to the "world peace" conference.

The department circulated a notice to embassies of their home countries, reminding them that the delegates were granted admission to this country only for the purpose of attending the controversial conference in New York.

Now that the conference is ended, the department announced, the delegates will leave within a "reasonable time."

The notice was sent to the Russian, Czechoslovakian, Polish and Yugoslav embassies.

Delegates from those countries have a different position from that of the delegates of other countries. American laws forbid admission of Communists to this country. That law was waived so that the delegates from the Communist-controlled nations could attend the conference. But the waiver extended only to the conference.

Plans for a tour of United States cities by many of the visitors were announced in New York yesterday after conclusion of the three-day conference sponsored by the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. Reports said the tour would last two weeks and include Philadelphia, Baltimore, Detroit, St. Louis and Los Angeles.

Nine to Appeal Contempt Terms

LOS ANGELES, March 29.—(AP)—Nine witnesses sentenced to jail for refusing to answer questions to a federal grand jury in its inquiry into Communist activities will appeal the case to the Supreme Court of the United States, it is necessary.

So said their attorneys yesterday after three witnesses, convicted of criminal contempt, were sentenced to one year each. They are Samuel H. Kasinowitz, Henry Steinberg and Ben Dobbs.

The six others, convicted of civil contempt, were ordered held in custody until they answer the grand-jury questions. They are Irving Chess, Merle Brodsky, Robert Blair, Philip Bock, Frank Spector and Mrs. Lillian Doran.

A member of the district attorney's staff explained that criminal contempt is a punishment, while the civil-contempt sentences were to secure compliance with the court's order to answer the questions.

Transit System May Install Radios on Buses, Trolleys

Music's charms may become standard equipment on Seattle Transit System buses and trolley coaches in the future.

Lloyd P. Graber, general manager, said today the possibility of installing frequency-modulation radio receivers on all the vehicles "is under consideration."

The experience of other transportation systems in offering their patrons music are being studied.

"Those experiences have not been for a long-enough time to know for sure what the possibilities are," Graber said.

Tacoma recently equipped some of its busses with radio receivers, Graber said. An early survey showed that about 97 percent of Tacoma bus-riders interviewed like the new service.

Nisei Seek Support for Bill Giving Aliens Citizenship

Two leaders of the Japanese-American Citizens' League today were in Seattle to enlist support for a bill, now before Congress, which would extend the privilege of naturalization to Japanese aliens.

Masao W. Satow of Salt Lake City, national director of the league, said the bill, House Resolution 199, now is before the Senate judiciary committee for consideration. It passed the House March 1.

"We're not asking special consideration for anyone," Satow said. "We're only asking that the privilege of naturalization be extended to those people now barred by race."

Approximately 85,000 Japanese in the United States and Hawaii would be affected by the bill, he said.

MANCHESTER, England, March 29.—(AP)—John Higginbotham admitted in Magistrate's Court today breaking into the home of the nuclear physicist, P. M. S. Blacket, and taking his Nobel Prize gold medal.

"The police can't get it back," Higginbotham said. "I can. If I am allowed bail I will report to the police every night and get the medal back."

Higginbotham was appearing on a charge of automobile theft when he made the admission. Bail was refused.
