Different at Kansas City. The situation at Kansas City is somewhat different. There is, without doubt, more interest displayed than the candidacy of William Jennings Bryan than in the effort of William McKinley to succeed himself as President of the United States.

A Solid South. A tremendous effort will be made by the Democrats to have a solid South in November. It is the expectation of Col. Bryan and his closest political associates that every state south of the so-called Mason and Dixon line will cast its electoral vote for the Democratic national ticket in the Senate of the United States next November.

There are only three states in doubt, and these are Maryland, Kentucky and Tennessee. All the other states in this Southern phalanx are regarded as certain to elect Bryan electors next November.

There are some Southern Congressional districts represented in this Congress by Republicans. The plan of the Democratic Congressional committee is already outlined to recapture these districts, and if it is successful the Democratic vote in the South will be solid in every particular against the Republicans when the ballots are counted.

The next Speaker of the House of Representatives will be Representative Richard D. Webb of Tennessee. This is a Democrat in control of the administrative branch of the government after March 1.

ARMY WAR Roberts Blundered at Pretoria. He Should Have Taken Both's Army—Not a Deserted Village.

By Cable to The Times. LONDON, Saturday, June 16.—"The war," as it is learned Gen. Kelly-Kenny said to Gen. Tucker a few weeks ago, "is a rumpled mess. It is a mess (referring to the division commanders) do things wrong, we are sent home in disgrace. If we do them right Roberts gets all the credit."

Those who know every inch around the Transvaal capital say Lord Roberts took the most apt and direct approach to it, whereas, with easier means of access, he might have gone eastward and shut off all possibility of Gen. Botha's retreat.

What old South African campaigners are asking is: "Why did Roberts not get Botha and his men into Pretoria at once, instead of occupying a deserted town and letting the Boers calmly walk away under the nose of his overwhelming force?"

The patent fallibilities of the general's fighting at the front have caused endless criticism since he began, but scarcely any blunder in our Africa has drawn upon it so much condemnation as the recent Aldershot maneuvers, when 30,000 troops engaged in a sham battle on the hottest day of the year.

FOREIGN LEGATIONS DESTROYED. Situation Very Grave. By Cable to The Times. 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SAD STORY OF SEA Finding an Old Hulk and Bleaching Bones. Unravels Mystery of the Long Lost Schooner Pioneer--The Indians of Quatsino Find Her.

The strange and unexplainable disappearance of the sealing schooner Pioneer, last seen by Capt. George Heater on October 4, 1898, when his vessel, the Alnoke, spoke her way coming down from Bering Sea with her catch of skins, according to advices received yesterday from the North, is a mystery no more.

According to this information the lost Capt. Heater and all his crew met their death on board the schooner, or nearly all, for the Indians claim to have discovered eight skeletons on board the derelict, only that of the "bones hunter," Louis, being missing.
