Calcutta Police Investigate Plot by Which Natives Conspired to Murder Foreigners by Means of Bombs.

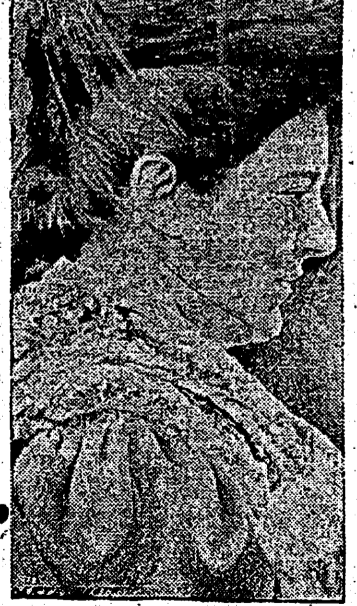
AFFAIR LOOKS LIKE REVOLUTIONARY ATTEMPT

BRITONS WORRIED BY SITUATION IN INDIA

LONDON, Monday, May 4.—India is a source of considerable uneasiness to the British government at the present moment. The difficulties with the Mohmids seemed on the eve of settlement when on Saturday, according to reports received here, a new danger threatened. An attempt was made by a large Afghan force, numbering 15,000 to 20,000, which went across the border, divided into two bodies, to seize the bichhouses at Khyber Pass, near Landi Kool. The attack was repulsed with trifling casualties among the British, but the Afghans remained in front of Landi Kool and another body is reported to be moving into the Bazar Valley by way of Lisote Pass.

ELEVEN DROWNED OFF OREGON COAST

Steamship Minnie E. Kelton Becomes Unmanageable in Storm and Part of the Vessel's Crew Is Lost.

LIFE-SAVERS FROM NEWPORT MAKE RESCUES

NEWPORT, Ore., Monday, May 4.—During a big storm Friday night off this Coast, the deckload of the steamship Minnie E. Kelton shifted and strained the vessel, which sprang a bad leak. Saturday noon a big wave struck the vessel and washed her deckload and cabin overboard, leaving the vessel waterlogged and unmanageable and deck awash. Eleven of the crew were drowned, some while trying to launch a boat; four of a raft tried to get ashore but only one succeeded and he sustained a broken leg. The life-saving crew of this place took nine men off the vessel and landed them on the shore about fifteen miles north of here.

HEROIC CHILDREN SAVE LIFE OF PLAYMATE

Sheldon Dahl and Carrie Anderson, Seven and Eight Respectively, Rescue Garfield Vilander From Salmon Bay.

LITTLE BOY FALLS FROM BOAT FLOAT

LITTLE Garfield Vilander, a 7-year-old Ballard boy, owes his life to the heroism of Sheldon Dahl, the 7-year-old son of Regner Dahl, who lives at Thirty-first Avenue West on the Port Laverton car line, and Carrie Anderson, eight years old, a neighbor girl, who rescued the boy from Salmon Bay when he fell into the water at foot of Twenty-eighth Avenue West yesterday. The three children were playing on a boat float when Garfield Vilander tried to step into a skiff that was tied alongside. It was high tide and the water at the point was ten feet deep. In stepping to the skiff the boy slipped and went headlong into the water between the float and the skiff. The drowning child screamed as his body came to the surface the first time. Sheldon Dahl ran to the edge of the float and reaching out, seized the boy by the collar as his body came up the second time. Carrie Anderson reached the spot almost simultaneously and with great effort the children dragged their little companion from the water to the float. While slightly ill from drowning, the boy is all right today and will soon be able to play again.

THAW BEGINS ACTION FOR LIBERTY

Slayer of Stanford White Wants Hearing as to His Sanity Held at Poughkeepsie, Dutchess County.

JEROME INSISTS ON TRIAL IN NEW YORK CITY

Wife of Prisoner, Who Is Seeking to Annul Her Marriage to Him, May Testify in His Behalf.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Monday, May 4.—Harry K. Thaw's fight for liberty, which has been in progress almost every moment since he shot down Stanford White in the crowded Madison Square Roof Garden Theatre nearly two years ago, was continuing its progress here today.

Mrs. Thaw May Testify

Every New York court has offered Thaw as a witness in her husband's behalf should her testimony be necessary to obtain a writ of habeas corpus. Whether it would be necessary to call her to Poughkeepsie, he said, but if he believed it necessary as the case developed, she would be summoned. Thaw himself undoubtedly will go on the stand in his own behalf, Peabody said. Peabody deems that Thaw is willing to submit to any examination the court or the district attorney may desire of his conduct. Peabody said he and Attorney Graham will oppose any attempt to have the case removed to New York County, which it was reported Assistant District Attorney Garvan would move to remove to New York County. "We want the case tried in Dutchess County," said Peabody. "Thaw's place of confinement at New York can be avoided in Poughkeepsie."

Court Room Is Small

As the capacity of the Poughkeepsie court room is not more than two hundred, cards were issued for admittance. A score of women were among the spectators. Harry Thaw reached the court room at 10:45 a. m. He was in the custody of Amos T. Baker, acting superintendent of the Matteawan asylum, and two attendants. Thaw looked rugged and well, and his appearance indicated that he had plenty of outdoor life at Matteawan. He took a seat at the counsel table with his lawyers, and at once entered into the most interesting conversation with Graham, who is in charge of the habeas corpus proceedings. Thaw's case is being handled Thaw and was joined later by Roger O'Mara, the Pittsburg detective who helped in the preparation of Thaw's defense. Thaw toyed nervously with his handkerchief while waiting for court to open.

The opening of the hearing was also delayed owing to the late arrival of Assistant District Attorney Garvan of New York. The court was presided over by Judge William F. Flinn of the Tombs Prison, New York, and nine or ten other attaches, and three chaplains from the same prison, who had been summoned by Thaw to testify as to his behavior while in prison.

The opening of the hearing was also delayed by a conference between District Attorney Garvan and Assistant District Attorney Garvan of New York. Dr. Baker, the acting superintendent of the asylum, was called to the conference at the conclusion of which Graham formally filed his writ and received from District Attorney Mack his return to it. District Attorney Mack then moved that the proceedings be sent to New York County. Mack said he was informed that it would cost Dutchess County \$20,000 to have the proceedings tried there.
