# FULL LOADS

Three Passenger Vessels Leave Tomorrow for Bering Sea Ports, and Will Take Hundreds of People North.

Little Prospect of Rate War Owing to Fleet Having Demand for All Cargo and Passenger Space Available.

With passenger accomodations full and carrying large cargoes, three big steamships will leave Seattle for Bering Sea ports tomorrow, inaugurating the Nome season and the opening of navigation in the North so, far as this port is concerned. There will also be a steamship from Victoria and one from Sea Francisco for Seward Peninsula carrying freight and passengers. The infur of people to the Nome country this season promises to be the largest for many years past; due in part to the number of unemployed men in the West and the Atractive prospects for work in the big mining camps of the North. The Victoris of the Alaska Steamship Company and the Ohio of the White Star Steamship Company is agent, will leave Piers' 4 and 5 respectively tomorrow and it is expected that both cabin and steerage quartors will be taxed to the utmost to accommodate the passenger list. A large number of prominent operators will go on the Victoria, special quarters having been arranged for some of them. The Senator will also, leave from this port for Nome tomorrow.

#### MARINE NOTES

Although the Tukon River is reported as being low and little freight is expected to move on the first boats, there will be a large crowd of passengers for the interior on the boats leaving White Horse the coming week for fiver ports.
