STORES WILL CLOSE MONDAY

Central Labor Council Informed That Leading Merchants Took Initiative and No Petition Was Circulated.

Committees From Union to Hold Official Celebration at White City and Prepare Interesting Program.

Most of the stores of Seattle will remain closed all day Monday, Labor Day, in appreciation of the voluntary decision of the Central Labor Council.

This fact is very gratifying to us, said Frank W. Coburn, business representative of the Central Labor Council, and organized labor in general will greatly appreciate the voluntary decision of the leading merchants of the city to give their employees a chance to observe the national holiday.

The official Labor Day celebration will be held at White City, Madison Park, where a lengthy program consisting of sports, speech making, music, dancing, picnic, boat excursions and a big fire works display at night will be provided for the laboring men and the public who will join with them in the celebration.

The proposition for the city to buy the park has been renewed by a proposition of Mr. Beck to sell the park property for \$150,000. Of this amount \$10,000 is to be paid down and \$5,000 per year for the remainder, drawing 5 per cent interest.

Mayor Miller and the members of the park board today declined to express an opinion on the desirability of the new offer. The mayor said he realized the advantages of the city owning the park, but that while the money for the purchase must come from the park fund, there is a long list of private property owners and that he did not care to say whether it would be a good or a bad investment. The new proposition will be considered at the regular meeting of the park board at 1:30 next Wednesday.

JUDGE GORDON ASKS RENOMINATION

Seattle's Police Judge Makes Race for Justice of Peace Before Republican Primaries Next Tuesday.

Judge John E. Gordon, police judge of Seattle and justice of the peace, is a candidate before the Republican primaries for renomination as justice of the peace in Seattle precinct. Judge Gordon was first elected to the office in 1904, and shortly afterward was appointed police judge, which office he has held ever since.

Judge Gordon has proved an efficient jurist both as justice of the peace and as police judge, and in both offices has won the esteem of attorneys who practice before him. His friends point to his record as sufficient evidence that he has made good in his office and is entitled to renomination and reelection.

Judge Gordon was born on a farm in Illinois in 1834. He came to Seattle in 1852, studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1852. He was a member of the profession successfully until 1904, when he was elected justice of the peace.

MINISTER WOULD HAVE STOOLS FOR MOTORMEN

Rev. Mr. Marsh Asserts That Trainmen Would Be Better Fitted for Their Duties.

Editor The Times: A common humane feeling would favor placing in the small apartment occupied by the motorman a stool upon which during a part of his trip in and out of the city he might rest. A motorman who had given up his position said in my hearing in giving reason for resigning, "I could not stand being on my feet so long and constantly day after day, my legs at night were almost paralyzed." He was a young man, too.

It is certainly a mistake to say that better service is rendered by these men upon whom such responsibility rests, touching the convenience and safety of the general public, by compelling them to stand hour after hour all through each day's duty. If they could, by being seated a part of the trip, relieve the unnatural strain which comes upon the feet and legs by standing in one place in one position hour after hour, they would be much better fitted to render a more competent service if, instead of his mind being upon the wearying and soreness of feet and limbs, his undivided thought were strictly given to his work. In other large cities in the East (instance Chicago), motormen are allowed to sit during a portion of each trip. It would seem as

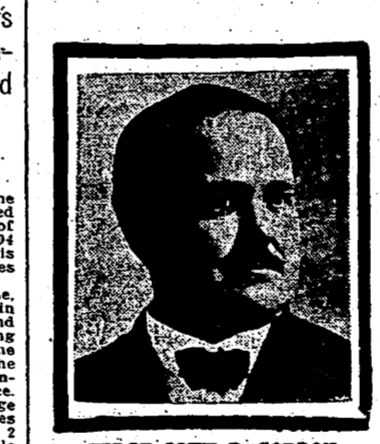
