Right Claimed Under Act Enfranchising Foreigners Who Have Served Honorably in Navy or Marine Corps.

Federal Judge Edmond Waddill, Jr., of the United States court for the Eastern District of Virginia, in the application for naturalization of Namyo Bessho, a Japanese "chief steward" in the United States navy, denied the petition, holling that under the federal statute no Japanese are recept of white blood or of African descent or nativity can become an American citizen, even though he has seen service in the United States havy or marine corps.

Bessho claimed the right of naturalization under the act of Congress of July 24, 1894, giving an alien of the age of 21 years and upward who has served honorably in the navy or marine corps the right of citizenship after proper sourt form.

Howe, attorney for the Mercantile Investment Company, who said a week ago that, owing to the fact that Mir. O'Nell was not a practioner before the American bar, he did not know how, nor was be able, to protect the interests of his client.

O'Nell, after arguing that the Mercantile Investment Company was before the law, an interloper in offering payment on the Sullivan Block mortgage held by Jumes A. Murray and maintaining that Howe had no right to force himself into the proceedings when he did, referred to Howe's remarks of a week ago by saying that during eighteen years' practice before the bar he never heard of one attorney so wantonly insulting another in the manner Howe is believed by O'Nell to have insulted him. O'Nell said that before appearing in the present case he could not have conceived of such an insulting and uncalled-for argument.


