

JAPANESE DENIED CITIZENSHIP

Virginia Judge Bars Naval Steward, Holding No Alien Eligible Except of White or African Descent.

Right Claimed Under Act Enfranchising Foreigners Who Have Served Honorably in Navy or Marine Corps.

NORFOLK, Va., Tuesday, May 4.—Federal Judge Edmond Waddill, Jr., of the United States court for the Eastern District of Virginia, in the application for naturalization of Namyo Besho, a Japanese "chief steward" in the United States navy, denied the petition, holding that under the federal statute no Japanese or alien except of white blood or of African descent or nativity can become an American citizen, even though he has been served in the United States navy or marine corps.

SHOCKS JAR PUBLIC LIBRARY

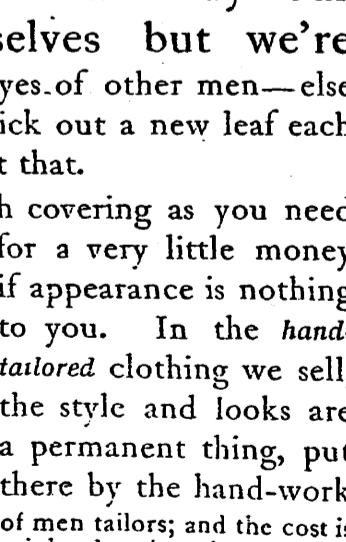
City Building Department Investigation Discloses Fact That Regrade Blasting Is Not Responsible.

ELEPHANT REFUSES PEANUTS

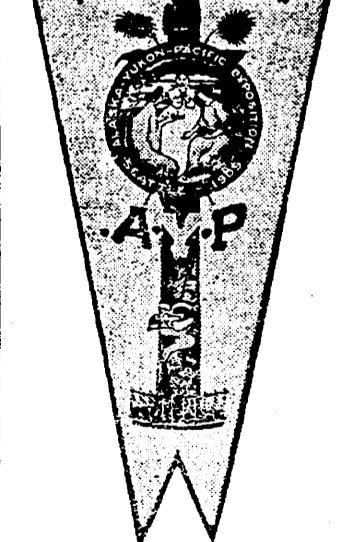
Big Pachyderm With Norris & Rowe's Circus Turns Up His Nose at Delicacy and Gives Boys Jungle Stare.

Almost Entire House Sold In Advance and Management Expects Interesting Performance Will Be Given.

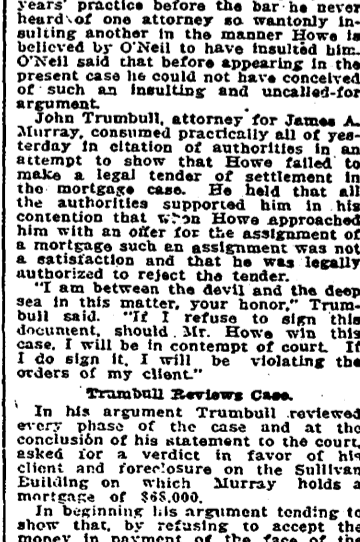
