MAYOR URGES LOW METER RATES

Veto of New Water Bill to Be Accompanied by Recommendation That Measuring Price Be Further Cut.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE PASSES UNANIMOUSLY

Executive's Original Objection Is That Flat-Rate Consumers Get Same Privileges as Those With Device.

WHEN Mayor John F. Miller returns to the council Friday his veto of the bill passed by the council almost two weeks ago, regulating the use of water and reducing the minimum meter rate from 75 to 50 cents a month, he will accompany it with a recommendation that the meter rate be further decreased.

Councilman Arnold Zbinden introduced the original bill amending the present water ordinance, carrying a reduction of 25 cents a month in minimum charge meters. Mayor Miller objected to it on the grounds that flat rate consumers get the same privileges as meter consumers insofar as the use of automatic devices are concerned. Following a conference attended by Zbinden and Superintendent of Light and Water L. B. Younger, the bill was amended to allow the use of automatic devices by consumers on a flat rate basis during the regular irrigation hours.

When the committee considered the bill this amendment was stricken and the original bill recommended for passage, receiving the eighteen votes of the council one week ago last Monday night.

Miller's attitude on the bill has been the subject of a number of congratulatory letters from water consumers, and it has been generally believed that the bill would be vetoed and that the council would pass the measure over his veto.

By recommending that meter rates be again reduced, the mayor will attach an importance to the measure that had not been anticipated.

"I am at work on the bill now," the mayor explained today, "and do not care to say what is to happen to it between now and Friday, when it is due to reach the clerk of the council. In recommending a further reduction of meter rates, I want it distinctly understood that I would not favor a reduction that would bring the rates below what could be regarded as a sum sufficient to allow a profit on the water business."

Would Locate Edward Bucher.
Thomas A. Parish has received a letter from J. G. Mosley, grand secretary of the grand council, Missouri Royal Arcanum, asking his assistance in locating Edward Bucher, treasurer of Cole's Brilliant Council who left for Seattle in July and has not been heard of since. His Missouri friends fear that he may have met with foul play.

No Presiding Judge This Year.
The judges of the superior court have decided to elect no presiding judge this year, as has been done in the past for the reason that they feel that such an office is unnecessary. Judge J. T. Ronald has been the presiding judge for the past two months.

TAXICABS COLLIDE INJURING TWO PASSENGERS

Cars Run Together at Eleventh Avenue and East Denny Way When One Tries to Speed Around Corner.

BOTH CHAUFFEURS PUT UNDER ARREST

J. H. Clemmer, One of Victims, Says Driver of His Machine Got No Signal From Oncoming Car.

TWO taxicabs, one containing one passenger and the other three passengers, collided at 2:45 o'clock this morning at Eleventh Avenue and East Denny Way. J. H. Clemmer, proprietor of the Kennel Hotel on First Avenue, was badly cut and bruised. G. Russo, of the Oriental Building at the intersection, was painfully bruised. S. Zalud, a guest of the Savoy Hotel, and F. Carmachia, the other passenger, escaped with a shaking up. Carl Holzenback and M. L. Hays, drivers of the taxicabs, were uninjured. Both were arrested on charges of speeding and were released from police headquarters on \$25 bail.

Clemmer was alone in his cab when the crash came. According to his statement, made soon after he was taken to his home, 241 Eighteenth Avenue North, Clemmer was driving west when the cab in which he was riding was badly damaged. At the garage of the Seattle Taxicab Company, it was stated this morning that an axle was bent, but otherwise the machine was undamaged. One of the taxicabs was not damaged.

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The police department is making an investigation with the purpose of fixing the blame.

HOME FOR JAPANESE GIRLS READY

Woman's Baptist Missionary Union Meets in Dunlap Church and Arranges for Dedication on August 18.

The home for Japanese girls, at the corner of East Fir and Spruce Streets, will be dedicated August 18 without a dollar indebtedness. The report of the committee, headed by Mrs. H. W. Foster, who made a report on the home to a meeting of the Women's Baptist Missionary Union in Dunlap church this morning, are carried out. There is only about \$700 due on the home and this will be paid by public subscription. A big reception will be given all Japanese of the city in the afternoon and evening of the day of dedication, the wives of prominent Japanese of the city acting as hostesses.

These are from thirty-five to forty Japanese girls at the home most of the time and the institution has been self-supporting since last October. The house of the city donated more than \$2,000 to the home.

This afternoon, devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. James Cairns, a report of the women's meetings in Portland was made by Mrs. E. T. Duran, and the women's conference convention in Portland was made by Rev. Wadsworth.

PROWLER IN ALLEY ESCAPES POLICEMAN
