



BARR PUTS

Man's Testimony Seattle Proves Ballinger's Accuser Guilty of Acts Similar to Charges Against Secretary.

PLANS TO PROFIT BY OFFICIAL KNOWLEDGE

Chief Witness Against Cabinet Officer Now Engaged in Timber Land Deal Intended to Net Him \$10,000.

MEN here who have been following the Pinchot-Baillinger investigation, lay much 'stress on the fact that L. R. Glavis, so far the principal witness against Ballinger, did the very thing himself that Ballinger has been accused of doing, namely, took advantage of his knowledge secured in government service, and less than two years after the close of that service, began operations as a land attorney that were intended to make him money. Ballinger was accused of becoming the attorney for the Cunningham people in the matter of their coal claims, shortly following his resignation as commissioner of the general land office. Glavis, according to testimony before the investigating committee, within four months after his dismissal from government employ, became a partner of W. W. Barr, of Seattle, in a series of land cases which, if decided in their favor, will net Glavis, \$10,000.

The facts as to this transaction were brought out in detail during the time Barr was testifying before the committee. Barr, is, a lumberman in Seattle, Glavis told him, about certain land which the State of Washington was eneavoring to patent and at Barr's suggestion went to Vancouver to look up the records. The cases were as Glavis had supposed them to be, whereupon Barr put up the money, and Glavis the experience, the profits to be equally divided between them. The right of the state to the land was protested, and the profests are now pendime. Barr believes that he and Glavis will get \$10,000 as his share of the profits.

Covers Eleven Pages.

The Barr testimony runs through eleven pages of Book No. 14 of the published testimony taken before the committee, and shows the interest the committee has taken in it. This interest does not go to the question whether Ballinger; is guilty as charged, but rather to the question of the ethical viewpoint Glavis has regarding transactions of this kind. Glavis was to do all the work, or see to having it done, and Barr was, to put up the money. These things Barr admitted in his testimony. The gross profits for four months' work, providing the cases come out right, will be \$20,000. Barr said in his testimony, and of this sum Glavis is to have one half.

Pinchot Without Pacts.

Another interesting feature of the investigation thus far has been the absoluce failure of Gifford Pinchot to produce proof of the sweeping charges made by him in his introductory statement, which was published all over the country. Nine-tenths of the Pinchot testimony, according to members of the investigating committee, was argument in support of vague surmises and suspicions held by him, and would have picions held by him, and would nave been ruled, out in any court of record. It was admitted by the committee be-cause none; of lis members wanted to appear to be doing anything that would interfere with Pinchot presenting; his case in his own way and in his own time

interfere with Pinchot presenting his case in his own way and in his own time.

What the committee's verdict will be is not yet known, but it is very close to the truth to say that if the verdict were to be rendered now. Glavis, Pinchot and Garfield having, testified as the three principal witnesses on the anti-Ballinger side, it would be in favor of Ballinger, Just how much the Ballinger people, in their testimony, will be able to strengthen their case, remains to be seen.

Assuming a verdict sustaining Ballinger, there will still be public opinion to reckon with. It is admitted here that public opinion, so far as crystallized, is hostile, to Ballinger—not because of specific charges proved against him, but rather because of a general feeling that he is unfriendly to and not in sympathy, with the administration's conservation schemes, and therefore cannot safely be trusted to carry that movement forward in the interest of the people as a whole.

So far as this feeling exists, it is recognized here that it is deep seated and persistent. The clearing of Ballinger by the investigating committee would not be accepted with favor by the country, but on the other hand it is pointed out here that the committee must confine itself to facts proved, and can take no notice of suspicions and general impressions.

Among the men who believe that the testimony thus far has shown nothing on which the committee would be justified in finding against Ballinger are many who are opposed to that official, and regret that he ever was made a member of the cabinet. They think his appointment one of the serious mistakes of President Taft. But even so, they point out that the committee of investigation must be guided in its verdict by the facts presented before it by the Plnchot side. And this occasions some regret that Plnchot was not better fortified with facts.

The opinion still prevails that the work of investigation will run through March and April, and that after the taking of testimony has ended, the committee will be several weeks sifting it and preparing a report to Congress.


