



Golden Gate Municipality Wants International Fair, With Panama Celebration to Be Held in Town to South.

LOS ANGELES, Tuesday, March 29.—
Two expositions in California in 1915
to celebrate the opening of the Panama
Canal is the proposition offered last
night by a conference of delegates from
the commercial bodies of this city.

#### STRANGE ERUPTIONS NOW APPEARING ON SUN'S FACE

One Shoots Out to Length of 150,000 Miles and Detaches Itself Prom Solar Visage.

CHICAGO. Tuesday, March 29.— Strange eruptions have occurred on the sun, according to a statement made yes-terday by Prof. Edwin Frost, director of the Yerkes Observatory at Williams Par Wife.

of the Yerkes Observatory at Williams Bay. Wis.

The eruptions shoot from the surface of the sun like skyrockets," said Prof. Frost. They are easily visible at the edge of the disc. One of them shot out to a length of 150,000 miles, as nearly as we could estimate. It then detached itself from the main body and sped through space. Before it disappeared it had reached a distance from the sun of about 250,000 miles. The eruptions probably are caused by release of pressure on some particular spot of the sun."

## LAND REACHES **RECORD POINT**

#### arger Number Seeking Hold ings in Washington Than at Any Other Time in Last 30 Years, Says Thomas Cooper.

#### INFLUX OF SETTLERS WITHOUT PRECEDENT

Assistant to President Howard Elliott, of Northern Pacific. Tells of Movement to States of Northwest.

HOMAS COOPER. assistant t President Howard Elliott, of the Northern Pacific Railway, who ar-rived here last night from Portland in his private car, today told a reporter for The Times that the demand for for The Times that the demand for farm and fruit lands in Washington and the Pacific Northwest generally, as well as the movement of settlers to this district, is, greater than, at any other in his thirty years' experience with that railroad, Cooper was accompanied from Portland by Samuel Hill and City Engineer R. H. Thomson, who were his guests. He was Mr. Hill's guest at the latter's home on East Highland Drive last night.

Cooper said that President Elliott expected to visit Seattle this week but unexpected and important business compelled him to turn back at Spokane. Said Cooper:

"The demand for land in the Northwest, and the influx of immigration at the present time, I believe is unprecedented, H. certainly exceeds anything in my thirty years' experience. As an illustration; We put on the market about ten days ago 284,000 acres in Western North Dakota: on the morning of the day that applications were to be received, there were eighty purchasers in line at the office and about two-thirds of the area was sold the first day.

"The educational campaign conducted for several years past as to the value of lands in the district of light rainfall lying between the Missouri River and the Cascade Mountains, where dry farming methods are followed, is beginning to bear fruit. It is becoming known that the lands in this district are fully as valuable for farming purposes as the lands in the Canadian Northwest, and that there is no need for an American citizen to move out of his own country to build himself a home.

"There is great activity in irrigated lands. Their high value, based upon actual returns, is becoming recognized; and especially is this true of the lands adapted to fruit in Washington, Oregon and Montans.

"The prospects now for splendid crops in the entire Northwest this year are of the best. Spring has opened much carrier, than usual, and farm work therefore, is much further advanced. The outlook could not be better in this respect.

"An'excellent, illustration of the agil-

The board has lad an option on the land for some time. The site is located on Ravenna Avenue, about one block north of East Sixy-fifth Street. Before a decision is made for a site for the new school in the southern part of the city, improvements clubs have an opportunity to suggest to the board suitable sites. This matter will probably come up at the monthly meeting of the board April 7.

A committee consisting of Edmund Bowden. Everett Smith and William Piggot were chosen to investigate the advantages of turning all of the board's insurance over to one Seattle agency, which, it is claimed, would mean a saving to the hoard.

Edmund Bowden was chosen as the board's representative for the new municipal plans commission. President John Schram was, first selected, but he declined, saying he thought it best that the member chosen be a director whose term of service be coexistent with the life of the commissions.

## FOUR-CORNERED WAR ON GEORGETOWN BILL

Rollins, Who Wants His Money, Threatens to Sue While Solons and Their Legal Counsel Wrangle.

#### OREGON & WASHINGTON RAILROAD TAKES HAND

Real Excitement Starts When City Attorney Declares Councilmen -Personally Responsible for Debt.

After a hot four-cornered controversy in which the Georgetown council, City Attorney Charles Ennis, C. P. Rollins and attorneys for the Oregon & Wash-

refused to pay the bill; which amounts to \$2,900.

Rollins Declines Warrants.

Rollins was offered payment in general fund warrants on the Georgetown treasury and refused to accept them, on the ground that he would be required to discount them 2 per cent at the bank and that they were not negotiable paper because of the indebtedness of Georgetown. Rollins has made several other demands for payment and they have been refused by the city because the Oregon & Washington-Rallroad had not paid the amount into the treasury.

Last, night City Attorney Charles Ennis rendered an opinion that each member of the council was responsible for payment of the bill because the whole procedure had been illegal. This brought Councilman Hale to his feet. He said:

"The street committee acted in good faith and thought it was right and proper to approve the specifications. I want to ask the city attorney if it is not his duty to advise council as to legality of its ordinances and resolutions. He is paid a good salary to act as attorney for Georgetown, while we work for nothing."

"It is true that I am paid, while the rest of you work for nothing, smilnely said Ennis, "but this council is a legislative body, and my office is of an administrative character. If the council wants an opinion it should ask me."

"Then I want to ask you." Mr. Ennis, retorted Hale, "why it was that you declared, when I introduced a "certain ordinance, that it would be illegal to pass it without first referring it to you? You were in the council chamber when that resolution was adopted, and you said nothing."

"It don't knick docsn't give me my money, should Rollins, from the audience. "I have waited since last spring, and I think it is long enough. I give you notice right now that I propose to take this matter into court at once. We are going to annex to Seatile tomorrow, and I do not propose to have my money tied up any longer."

Attorneys for the Oregon & Washington then took a hand in the argument, and it finally ended by agreeing to lay the matter over Bollins Declines Warrants
