Mrs. Ruth Bryan-Leavitt, eldest child of former Democratic Candidate for President, to Take Second Spouse

DIVORCED FROM ARTIST, WILL TAKE ARMY OFFICER

Bride-to-Be Gifted Author, and Champion of Cause "Votes for Women" and Accompanied Father in Campaign.

LONDON, Thursday, April 28.—The "engagement" is announced of the daughter of the late Reginald Owen, of the Royal Engineers, stationed at Jamaica, to Ruth Bryan-Leavitt, daughter of Wm. I. Bryan, ex-candidate for President. Mrs. Leavitt, who is a champion of the cause of woman's suffrage, was divorced from her first husband, an artist, three years ago. She is now living in Paris. Her father, who is a painter, wished to complete his education in art by studying with the foreign masters. Leavitt was a poor financier. His small fortune was soon exhausted and his earnings from paintings were not enough to support his family. Mrs. Leavitt came to the bar with a ready pen and not only helped to pay for her husband's lessons in art, but supported herself and her two children during their stay in Paris. Leavitt's artistic temperament and the wife's commercial leanings did not work smoothly under the same roof, and soon there were rumors of domestic difficulties. Mrs. Leavitt stood by the artist, however, until he had completed his studies. Then she came to America to sue for a divorce and the custody of her two babies. Her support was charged in the complaint. During Col. W. I. Bryan's last presidential campaign his daughter accompanied him on his speaking tours. In the cause of her father, she stumped the states of Colorado, Idaho and Wyoming, where women vote.

LINCOLN, Neb., Thursday, April 28.—When read the dispatch announcing the engagement of his daughter to Lieut. Reginald Owen of the British army, Mr. Bryan said the announcement was correct.

JAPANESE WOMAN SPEAKS FOR SUFFRAGIST CAUSE. Deaconess in Methodist Episcopal Church Addresses Members of Seattle Club.

In response to a toast to the cause of woman in her country, Miss M. Kinugasa, deaconess of the Japanese Methodist Episcopal Church, made an eloquent address before one hundred members of the Seattle Suffrage Club at a cosmopolitan luncheon given yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Washington. Miss Kinugasa is secretary of the Japanese W. C. T. U. and has been in this country only two years. She espoused the cause of woman's suffrage about three months ago and has already become one of the foremost enthusiasts in the club. Mrs. George A. Smith, speaking from the experiences of a recent visit to Hawaii, discussed the status of woman in the islands of the Pacific. Mrs. George E. Boos spoke on progress of the cause in Germany and problems that confront the English suffragettes were explained by Miss Isabel Brown. The work was taken up by Mrs. Edith de Long Jarmuth. The chairman of the club's suffrage committee reported the results of the recent Inverick contest and awarded the prizes, as previously published in The Times.

MEMBER POLICE BOARD PROMISES TO HELP CROOKS

Harry P. Flannery, of San Francisco Commission, Accused of Protecting Members of "Wire-Tapping" Gang

SEATTLE TELEGRAM IMPORTANT EVIDENCE

District Attorney Boyd Says Grand Jury Will Meet for Purpose of Considering Indictment of Official.

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., Thursday, April 28.—In testimony given Wednesday before the Marin County grand jury, according to District Attorney Thomas P. Boyd, Harry P. Flannery, head of the San Francisco police commission, is accused by Joseph Abbott, arrested March 7 in Sausalito, in a raid on a police headquarters, of protecting the ten men arrested in the wire-tapping case.

According to Boyd, Abbott testified that Flannery entered into an agreement with a number of underworlding that Flannery was to receive a fixed share of the proceeds, at one time tentatively agreed upon as 12 per cent. Abbott declared he offered his evidence to District Attorney Boyd of Marin County. Flannery, it is said, tried to protect him from the alleged extortions of Attorney J. W. Cochrane, who was engaged by Flannery to defend the alleged wire-tappers.

A telegram was offered in evidence, alleged to have been sent by Flannery to Abbott in Seattle, November 1909, the day after the election of the present city administration. It is as follows: "Col. Joe Abbott, Seattle Hotel, Seattle. Accept my sincere thanks for the victory. The victory is the grandest of the age. I hope to see you and all our friends. Joe, my promise is right." "Signed, Harry P. Flannery."

The telegram is said by Boyd to have been produced by Manager John O'Brien of the "Evening News" Telegraph Company of San Francisco. The foregoing account is based on the statements of District Attorney Boyd, as no other version of the transaction of the grand jury has been made public.

District Attorney Boyd said the grand jury would meet Friday to consider the indictment of Flannery. Mayor McCarthy of San Francisco, today refused to add to his last night's statement regarding the charges that the Police Commission placed upon police protection to the gang of alleged crooks, men and wire-tappers, further than to deny that he had any part to play in the transaction of any official business in tantamount to a suspension. In this connection it is announced that the board of police commissioners will not hold its usual meeting tonight.

The mayor said today that he would take no further action in the matter until he receives official information from the Marin County grand jury that Flannery stands accused of improper relations with the alleged bunco men.

Detective on Carpet. Chief of Police John Martin announced today that Detective Sergeant John W. O'Brien had been ordered to answer the charge made in Abbott's confession before the Marin County grand jury that Flannery, the police officer had been introduced to the bunco men with the understanding that he was to extend protection to them in their operations in the city. Flannery is still ill at his home here and has been forbidden by his physicians to see anyone, but his wife said in a telegram to Joe Abbott, the leader of the alleged gang of wire-tappers, was in the city in which he was arrested, but did not involve him in any wrongdoing.

NEW YORK COUNTS VAGRANTS IN PARK. Census Men Wake Sleeping Tramps and Take Names—Crowd Watches Proceedings.

NEW YORK, Thursday, April 28.—Census enumerators anxious to list every homeless and temporary resident as a census taker, New York, started today on the bench loungers in thirty city parks at midnight, but accomplished little. Comparative few vagrants were added to the list, despite the thoroughness of the canvass. The hard work of the police who accompanied the enumerators was to keep back crowds of curious persons who gathered to watch the census taking. When a derelict was rounded up the examination was conducted to the accompaniment of a flashlight attack by photographers who followed. They routed out of sleep to answer questions were allowed to rest when their slumbers undisturbed when information had been extorted.

Upon orders from Washington, Supervisor Falk today declined to give out any figures on the night's work.

Taft's Double Will Not Trail Him to Ball Game. Pittsburgh Policeman Owns Up to Skin Even More Sensitive to Ridicule Than That of President.

PITTSBURGH, Thursday, April 28.—When President Taft attends the ball game between Pittsburgh and Chicago at Forbes Field next Monday, he will not be accompanied by his double, Desk Sergeant Morley, of the central station. Morley was invited by a member of the entertainment committee to attend the game, but said last night he would not be there.

"I don't want to make a show of myself," said Morley. "And besides being embarrassing for me, it might not be comfortable for the President.
