

CONTINUES ACCOUNT OF ADMINISTRATION

WANTED TO BUY UP CLAIMS AT REDUCTION

JWilliam H. Treatment, executor of the estate of W. C. Hill, continued before Judge. Mitchell Gilliam in the superior court this morning his account of his administration. Hill, now both deceased. Lewis will be on the stand the remainder of the day, going over his correspondence and accounts.

Amid all the pomp and splendor which a few scatteerd melialeucca-leuccadendrons and shell-bedecked savages could produce, His Majesty King Raramuga Taqualmaunu of Tonga, was married at Tangotabu, in the Friendly Islands, January 30. The inhabitants were still singing, "All Hail" etc., or as much as they knew of the Tonga equivalent, while staggering between the date paims, when the American barkentine, Mary E. Winkleman, arrived at Tongatabu two days after the glorious event.

Pomp and Splendor Ruis.

Captain John Petz, master of the Mary E. Winkleman, is in at Mukilteo from the South Sea Islands last night, brought news to Seattle of the royal marriage. According to those on the barkentine, all islanders for leagues around turned out to view the regal splicing. King Raramuga Taquaimaunu, according to those who saw the ceremony, appeared resplendent in a British bell-topper, a red fiannel ankleband and a historic belt of valuable pearl-shells, which are said to have been helrlooms in the royal household for many centuries. The dusky bride wore a wreath of date flowers, the popular January bloom in Tonga, and had her hair dressed in red calico and mother-of-pearl.

FIRE DESTROYS MILL. THREATENS TWO TOWNS

Lumber Yard at Sand Point, Idaho, Burns-Pend d'Oreille and Mootenai

SAND POINT, Idaho, Friday, April 29.

The lumber yard of the Humbird Lumber Company, on the northern outskirts of this town, was destroyed by fire last night, and the spreading flames are threatening the towns of Pend d'Oreille and Kootenai. It is estimated that the Humbird vards contained between 50,000,000 and 60,000,000 feet of lumber.

The fire started about 7:30 Thursday evening. Its origin is unknown. The flames crept steadily northward into the heart of one of the largest lumber yards in the West. Estimates of the loss run as high as \$750,000.

The plant of the Saginaw match block factory, just at the north end of the Humbird yards, was in the path of the flames. Dynamite was used to check the fire.

HEINZE NOTES UNPAID AT MERCANTILE BANK

Witness Declares National Depository Holds Demand Paper Given by Company Years Ago.

NEW YORK, Friday, April 28—Demand notes given years ago by otto Helize & Co., as the only collateral for loans aggregating \$431,000 are still held by the Mercantile National Bank of this city, according to testimony introduced Thursday at the trial of F. Augustus Helize.
