YOUTHFUL FORGER MAY BE MENTALLY UNSOUND

Joseph S. Danner Believes Injury of Several Years Ago Causes Son to Sign Father's Name to Bank Checks.

ASKS POLICE TO HELP BRING YOUNG MAN BACK

In Interval, Forgiving Parent Makes Good Bad Paper Floated by Boy, Who Has Been Seen on Streets Late.

BELIEVING that an injury of several years ago has unbalanced his son's mind and has driven him to the use of his father's name in writing forged checks and also caused him to leave his home more than three weeks ago because the parent charged him for his actions, Joseph S. Danner has asked the police to help search for his son, Joseph S. Danner, Jr. Several checks, made out by "J. S. Danner," have been returned to the father for collection and while the latter says that he is ready to make good the amounts involved, he also wants to get his son back home, fearing that he is not mentally responsible for his actions.

The father also has learned that since his son's disappearance from home three weeks ago he has appeared on the city streets in a new suit of clothes and generally bears an appearance of affluence. This leads the parent to the belief that other checks have been issued from which he has not yet heard.

Young Danner is 22 years old and lives with his father, at 1137 Sixteenth Avenue. When last seen by his father, he was wearing a new light suit. To some of his acquaintances, Danner is known as "Sidney," his middle name.

BENEFIT DANCE FOR "BABE" BERRY PLANNED

Friends of Invalid Chorus Girl Will Give Entertainment Sunday, May 8.

With the permission of Mayor Hiram Charles Gill, a dance will be given Sunday evening, May 8, at the home of "Babe" Berry, the chorus girl from the Honey Moon Trail Company, who has been in bed since suffering from rheumatism, for the past twenty-four weeks. Following the publication of "Babe" Berry's story in the Times of last Sunday, she has been besieged with visitors, many of them theatrical people, who have been set plans on foot to help her, resulting in a delegation going to Mayor Gill to ask permission to hold a Sunday night dance.

Miss Berry has no home and during her illness has been assisted by the Theatrical Mechanics' Association. She is still unable to leave her bed.

LINDSAY REFUSES TO UPSET DIVORCE ORDER

Dismore's Application Would Have Compelled Former Wife to Leave Man She Married Later.

Judge R. H. Lindsay, of the superior court, this morning refused to sign an order setting aside the decree of divorce granted to Mabel Scott Dismore by Superior Judge A. W. Taylor, in which it was asserted by her former husband, D. J. Dismore, that he had been seduced by her. After the divorce was granted, Mrs. Dismore was remarried, and to have set aside the decree would have placed her in the embarrassing position of having to leave her present husband for one from whom she had become legally separated. The court signed an order giving Dismore the custody of the child Dorothy Scott Dismore.

PARIS THANKS SEATTLE FOR FLOOD CONTRIBUTION

French Authorities Send Letter of Appreciation to Custodian of Relief Fund.

That the authorities of Paris are duly appreciative of the generous contribution to the relief fund raised at the time of the disastrous flood in the French capital is shown by a letter just received by the Bank of Savings, which is the custodian of the fund, from the Croix Rouge Francaise.

This letter is dated April 13 and requests the bank to convey to the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, the French colony and the people of Seattle generally, deep gratitude for the contribution forwarded at the time of the direst need that Paris has ever experienced.

"THANKS, JUDGE, THANKS" FOR DEATH SENTENCE

Condemned Murderer Extremely Grateful When Court Says He Must Die on Gallows.

LOS ANGELES, Friday, April 29.—Ernest Wirth, wife murderer, was enthusiastically grateful when Judge Wills sentenced him today to be hanged in San Quentin prison on June 17. "Thank you, judge," he exclaimed. "Thank you!" Wirth murdered his wife a week ago by crushing her skull with his boot heels. After his arraignment he asked that he be permitted to plead guilty and that his sentence be death on the gallows.

Attorneys who examined Wirth pronounced him sane.

CONTINUES ACCOUNT OF ADMINISTRATION

William H. Lewis, Executor of Estate of W. C. Hill, Reads Letters from Widow in Superior Court.

WANTED TO BUY UP CLAIMS AT REDUCTION

William H. Treatment, executor of the estate of W. C. Hill, continued today in the superior court his account of his administration. Numerous letters were read in support of Lewis' contention that he had at all times kept in touch with the widow, a resident of Washington, D. C., until the time of her death. Lewis insisted that he had discussed with Mrs. Hill the proposition to buy up the claims against the estate at from 33 to 33 1/3 per cent of their face values, but that nothing satisfactory was reached and that subsequently she consented for him to borrow enough money to pay off the claims on that basis. There was a hitch in this arrangement, according to Lewis, occasioned by the refusal of one claimant to agree and his refusal to accept property in lieu of his claim. L. A. Turner bought this claimant out. Turner yesterday said he had not cleared more than \$2,000 on the deal. The charge against Lewis is that he diverted funds of the estate for his own benefit and to the detriment of the interests of the heirs. His wife is a daughter of Mrs. Alice S. Hill and William C. Hill, now both deceased. Lewis will be on the stand the remainder of the day, going over his correspondence and accounts.

Princeton Man Deserts Study for Pulpit to Commit Suicide by Drowning.

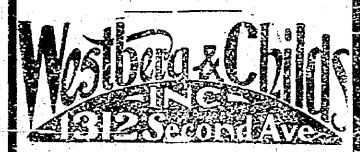

ROYALTY WEDS IN SOUTH SEAS

American Barkentine Brings News of Recent Nuptials of King Raramuga Taquamaunu of Tonga.

MONARCH SPORTS BELL-TOWER HAT

Shell-Bedecked Savages From Leagues Around and Melealeucca-Leucadendrons Add Pomp to Occasion.

Amid all the pomp and splendor which a few scattered melealeucca-leucadendrons and shell-bedecked savages could produce, His Majesty King Raramuga Taquamaunu of Tonga, was married at Tongatabu, in the Friendly Islands, January 30. The inhabitants were still singing, "All Hail," etc., or as much as they knew of the Tonga equivalent, while staggering beneath the date palms, when the American barkentine, Mary E. Winkelman, arrived at Tongatabu two days after the glorious event.

Pomp and Splendor King. Captain John Patz, master of the Mary E. Winkelman, just in at Muttika from the South Sea Islands last night, brought news to Seattle of the royal marriage. According to those on the barkentine, all islands for leagues around turned out to view the regal splendor. King Raramuga Taquamaunu, according to those who saw the ceremony, appeared resplendent in a British bell-topper, a red flannel ankleband and a historic belt of valuable pearl-shells, which are said to have been heirlooms in the royal household for many centuries. The dusky bride wore a wreath of date flowers, the date palms in bloom in Tonga, and had her hair dressed in red calico and mother-of-pearl.

After the regal hitching, which was done to the accompaniment of a popoi dance, the new king, with his newly wedded wife, spent the honeymoon in his state bungalow at the entrance to Tongatabu Harbor. When the Mary E. Winkelman arrived, Taquamaunu, with his wife, was on the beach. The king was never more pleased than when sailors raised the hats to him as he then had legitimate excuse for returning the salute by waving his new British bell-topper, which recently had been acquired as a wedding present from a humorous French skipper.

FIRE DESTROYS MILL, THREATENS TWO TOWNS

Lumber Yard at Sand Point, Idaho, Burns—Pond d'Oreille and Kootenai in Danger.

SAND POINT, Idaho, Friday, April 29.—The lumber yard of the Humboldt Lumber Company, on the outskirts of this town, was destroyed by fire last night, and the spreading flames are threatening the towns of Sand Point, Kootenai and Kootenai. It is estimated that the Humboldt yards contained between 50,000 and 60,000 feet of lumber. The fire started about 7:30 Thursday evening. Its origin is unknown. The flames crept steadily upward into the heart of one of the largest lumber yards in the West. Estimates of the loss run as high as \$150,000.

The plant of the Saginaw match block factory, just at the north end of the town, was in the path of the flames. Dynamite was used to check the fire.

At 12:05 a. m. the wind was increasing, and the inhabitants of Sand Point and Kootenai were ready to save their household effects by testing them in strength every minute. Wires were burned out and no news has been received from the threatened towns since early morning.

HEINZE NOTES UNPAID AT MERCANTILE BANK

Witness Declares National Depository Holds Demand Paper Given by Company Years Ago.

NEW YORK, Friday, April 29.—Demand notes given years ago by Otto Heinze & Co., as the chief collateral for loans aggregating \$431,000, are still held by the Mercantile National Bank of New York, according to testimony introduced Thursday at the trial of F. Augustus Heinze.

He is charged with misappropriating the funds of the institution and with over-certification of checks of Otto Heinze & Co.

Emil Klein, the bank's cashier, was the only witness today.

Mr. Wise, in his redirect examination of the witness brought out that Charles W. Morse, now serving a fifteen-year sentence at Atlanta, was chairman of the bank's board of directors when the loan was made and that the ample collateral put up by Heinze was not obtained by the bank until two days after the loan was made.

VALDEZ PROTESTS AGAINST REMOVALS

Committeeman Shackelford and Former Governor Hoggatt Bitterly Criticized at Meeting.

VALDEZ, Alaska, Friday, April 29.—Valdez joined with other places in Southeastern Alaska in protesting against removal by President Taft of District Attorney John H. Boyce and Marshal Daniel A. Sutherland, at a meeting last night.

Committeeman Louis B. Shackelford and former Territorial Governor W. B. Hoggatt were bitterly criticized for the part they have played in obtaining removal of these officials. Telegrams were dispatched to several senators protesting against action taken.

The sentiment of the meeting was bitter and unanimous in its opposition.

TAFT STARTS ON TRIP

WASHINGTON, D. C., Friday, April 29.—President William H. Taft, accompanied by Secretary Knox, leaves Washington tonight on a week's trip to Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and St. Louis.

The President and the secretary of state are to be speakers at the banquet of the Chamber of Commerce in Buffalo tomorrow night. On Monday they will attend the opening of the Carnegie art exhibition at the hotel where they will spend the afternoon, and speak at the banquet of the American Republic Club in the evening.

From St. Louis the President will proceed to St. Louis and after addressing a banquet in that city will return direct to Washington.
