BROWNE MUST STAND TRIAL ON BRIBERY CHARGE

Illinois Legislative Member Hears Motion to Quash Indictment on Unique Grounds Overruled by Judge McSurely

POSTPONEMENT FOR TWO WEEKS TURNED DOWN

Hearing Will Begin June 6 on Sensational Allegations of Corruption That Attracts Much Attention.

CHICAGO, Wednesday, June 1.—Lee O'Neil Browne, leader of the Democratic minority in the lower house at Springfield, must stand trial on the charge of bribing State Representative C. A. White to vote for William Lorimer for United States senator. This much was assured today when Judge McSurely overruled the motion of the defense to quash the indictment against Browne.

W. S. Forrest, of counsel for the defendant, entered an objection to the ruling. He also sought a postponement of two weeks in placing Browne on trial, but was again overruled, the court setting June 6 as the date for beginning the trial.

While this argument was on State's Attorney Wayman demanded that Browne be arraigned at once. Mr. Forrest interposed sharply: "Mr. Browne pleads not guilty."

The argument of the defense was that bribery of legislators voting to elect a United States senator is not an offense against the state but against the federal government, and that the federal law provides no punishment. Judge McSurely said he believed that the plea unique in the history of the courts. The judge went back to the constitution, saying:

Quotes Constitution.
"The claim is advanced that when members of both houses meet in joint assembly to vote for a senator they cease to be a state Legislature and become a wholly different body. It is therefore important to inquire into who or what elects the senator of the Congress of the United States. The Constitution (article I, section 3) reads: 'The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six years. The federal statute entitled 'Congress' (section 11, election of senators) reads: 'The Legislature shall proceed to elect a senator in a manner again more than once the statute contains the words 'The Legislature shall elect a senator.' This alone would seem sufficiently clear to permit of no further question. But it is said that the members of the Legislature when voting to elect a United States senator, cease to be state officers and are more properly federal officers."

On this point Judge McSurely quoted an authority saying:

Not Federal Officers.
"Although the Legislature when electing a United States senator, is acting under and pursuant to the constitution and statutes of the United States, they are no more officers or agents of the United States than are presidential electors when acting as electors of President and Vice-President, or the people of the state when acting as electors to Congress."

On the point raised by the defense attacking the jurisdiction of the Cook County court, the judge promised that he would render a ruling in a few days.

At the same time the court declared that the payment of money for a vote constitutes bribery and that the statute of Illinois which provides that any person who offers or gives money to any legislator to vote for or against any measure, shall be guilty of bribery. This rule is without prejudice to the jurisdiction of the local courts.

Chicago, Wednesday, June 1.—Mrs. MacMonnies, the sculptor, in March last married a French nobleman, who figured so unpleasantly in the former Mrs. MacMonnies' divorce suit against her husband. The wedding took place very quietly in Lucerne, and only recently MacMonnies and his new wife settled in their beautiful home at Giverny, the charming little Normandy town three hours' ride from Paris.

All went well until the natives of the village discovered that the woman whom they considered had broken up the sculptor's home was now his wife and was living in the home of the woman they had worshiped. Then their rage exceeded all bounds, and they literally tried to drive her out of the village, pelting her with mud and expressing their opinion of her conduct in round terms. The violence of the villagers drove the unhappy bride into the house for safety, and she has not dared since to venture forth. The American colony also has kept strictly aloof from the newly wedded pair and it is the general belief that no one ever will have anything to do with them, especially as long as she persists in forcing herself upon the dear friends and acquaintances of MacMonnies' former wife.

The village tradespeople have joined in the boycott and refuse to furnish provisions. Servants decline to enter the MacMonnies' service, and finally the beautiful MacMonnies' home was offered for sale at \$15,000.

Things have, however, calmed down to a certain extent recently. It is said and the sculptor has withdrawn the offer of sale of the house at a figure at which the boycott literally have been giving it away.

Residents of Little Normandy Town Take Exception to Woman Sculptor Married Following Divorce.

AMERICAN COLONY HOLDS ALOOF FROM NEW WIFE

JORDAN DISCUSSES JAP LABOR PROBLEM

Eminent Scientist of Stanford Thinks Question Not One to Be Decided Solely Through Economics.

ENTRANCE OF ALIEN RACE OPPOSED BY CALIFORNIANS

CHICAGO, Wednesday, June 1.—President David Starr Jordan of Stanford University, who is taking his first real vacation in a quarter of a century, arrived in Chicago yesterday on the way to attend a meeting of the National Fisheries Commission which is a study of labor conditions in California. He was a guest of the Delta Upsilon Fraternity at the University Club in the evening.

Dr. Jordan's attention was called to the report of the California State Labor Commission which offers an exhaustive study of labor conditions in California. He expressed the conviction that either Japanese or Hindu labor must be used in the Western state if agriculture is not to suffer.

"It may be true," said Jordan, "that some fruit growers in California have suffered from want of labor, and this want may have occasioned a certain economic loss, but the question of Asiatic immigration is so complex in character it cannot be disposed of wholly on an economic basis. There is more than one side to the matter.

A number of people of California are strongly opposed to having the state inundated with a race that must remain socially inferior and which cannot be assimilated. These people are content with the arrangement which has been made with Japan. Japan has promised to keep its laboring people from coming to the United States. This arrangement, believe, is better for Japan and better for the state of California."

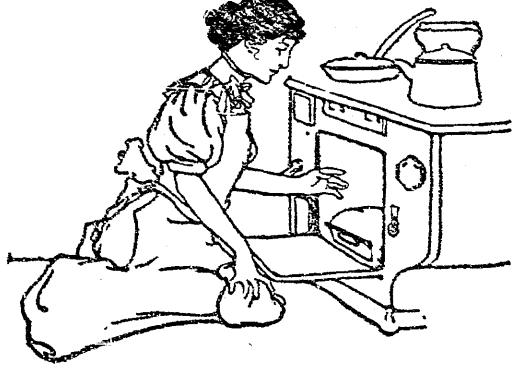
