

NAVAL MILITIA WANTS VESSEL FOR CRUISING

Bremerton Branch Will Try to Get Torpedo Boat From U. S. Navy Yard at Mare Island.

WOULD SPEND HOLIDAYS IN PRACTICE CRUISES

Speculation Rife Who Will Succeed Rear Admiral John A. Rogers in Command of Puget Sound Yard.

PUGET SOUND NAVY YARD, Friday, July 15.—The Bremerton branch of the naval militia will make an effort to obtain a torpedo boat to be used in practice cruises during the summer months. A number of torpedo boats are lying idle at the Mare Island Navy Yard and the local branch of the militia has solicited the aid of the commandant of the Puget Sound yard to have one of these ships brought to Bremerton. Should their efforts prove successful, the militia will spend the Saturday half-holidays and Sundays in practice cruises during the summer months. Speculation is rife at the navy yard regarding who will succeed Rear-Admiral John A. Rogers as commandant. Other vacancies to be filled and for which no officers have been named, are captain of the yard, colonel at the barracks and captain of the cruiser Colorado. Nothing has been heard here regarding the date of the arrival of the gunboat Chattanooga. The cruiser Tennessee, which left Bremerton for the Atlantic a few months ago, has been made flagship of the cruiser division of that coast. The cruiser Albany has left drydock and her place was taken by the Colorado. Capt. R. M. Hughes is due on July 16. He will relieve Capt. J. A. Rogers in command of the cruiser Washington. The Washington is coaling today, preparatory to sailing for the Atlantic coast July 21. Six new speller blades, weighing nearly four tons each, have arrived and will be carried by the Washington during her long voyage.

UNUSUAL REPORT MADE ON JAP EMIGRATION

State Department Furnished With Statement Showing Brightest and Darkest Fields for Nippon's Labor.

BUT 650 NOW LEFT IN PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

WASHINGTON, Friday, July 15.—The "darkest" and "brightest" fields for Japanese labor are shown in a report which the state department has received, surveying the position of Japanese emigrants abroad. Since the strict enforcement of the Japanese-American agreement, the Japanese emigration companies have suffered considerably and several have been disorganized. The Japanese who have gone to the Philippines at their own expense, or were sent to the islands by contract, number about 650 now remain, according to the Japanese statement. As the Philippines constitute a part of the United States, no contract laborers are admitted. In Hawaii the trouble between the planters and laborers has been satisfactorily settled, but only 1,028 Japanese went there during 1909. Here is stamped as the most hopeful locality since the prohibition of immigration into America. New business in this connection but anti-Japanese agitators have made unfavorable conditions in Canada, Mexico has no fresh demand for laborers and there are stated to be less than 250 Japanese there now. Puraury Island, once famous for pearls, has now only fifty-six Japanese; there are 220 Japanese laborers in the Oceanic Islands and the Toyo Emigration Company last year sent twenty-three laborers to Tahiti.

THREE JUSTICES AFTER LOVE LORN COUPLES

Business Poor and Competitors Hang Out Signs Advertising Advantages of Quick Marriages.

KITAMUNING, Pa., Friday, July 15.—This town has the justices of the peace and business has been poor. Their offices are in the same block, and when Justice Jesse Miller, tired of waiting for business, decided to advertise, he put up a sign in his window, reading: "Married Here. You Will." Justice Edward Lee saw the sign and promptly displayed this one: "Married Here. You Will." Justice A. D. Mobery, not to be outdone by his competitors, displayed a more commercial sign with this sign: "Why Wait? Get Married Here." No increase of business at the marriage license office is yet reported.

CANADIAN PACIFIC NOW STARTS IMPROVEMENTS

Spending \$1,000,000 in and About Nelson, B. C., on Tracks and Arisides.

VICTORIA, Friday, July 15.—One million eight hundred thousand dollars will be spent by the Canadian Pacific Railway in repairs and improvements to their system within a short radius of Nelson, the metropolis of the British Columbia interior. Some 300 miles of railway will be built; several new steel bridges are under construction; seventy miles of road will be laid with 45-pound steel rails; wooden bridges will be replaced with retaining walls of stone masonry built; fifty miles of track ballasting done; a brick roundhouse built; a water tower, junction and a multitude of smaller jobs handled. Between 600 and 800 laborers are now at work at the various points and within a few weeks almost as many more will be engaged.

8-YEAR-OLD BOY BESTS LARGE DOG IN BATTLE

WALLA WALLA, Friday, July 15.—When little Roy Danders, son of George Danders, a machinist, who was just moved to this city, was attacked by a large dog yesterday, he showed splendid rough and tumble fighting qualities. The boy, who is but 8 years old, was playing in the street when a strange dog passed. The boy tried to pet the animal, and the dog turned savagely upon him. The lad never gave an inch, however, and grabbing the animal about the neck and chest he hit it in the snout with a half score or so of bricks. The dog was nearly dead when he was interfered and parts of his pants. The lad's wounds will not be serious.
