

BODIES OF DAVIS AND RYAN LIE AT MORGUE

Remains of Brave Seattle Patrolman and Thug Who Fought Amazing Duel With Him Rest Side by Side.

DYING OUTLAW TELLS OF PISTOL BATTLE

With Stamp of Approaching Doom Upon His Brow, Law-breaker Pays Tribute to Cool Courage of Bluecoat.

THE Bodies of Patrolman Judson P. Davis and Bandit John Ford, alias Paddy Ryan, lie side by side in the morgue today, victims of a duel as strange as any other in which two humans ever engaged.

South and Washington Street, last Saturday. "Let's get out on the hills and get some easy money," Ness, who has lived here for years, is alleged by Ford to have said to him.

They established a working criminal partnership. Ford said Ness gave him the automatic pistol he used in the duel. At this juncture, he reiterated that his right name was Paddy Ryan and that he was born in the city of London, England, about thirty years ago.

Started out on Wednesday. On Wednesday night, the two men made their first appearance as highwaymen on the streets of this city, according to Ford. They held up H. H. Farmer, at Ninth Avenue and Terrace Street, and "strong-armed" him, taking \$5. Farmer reported to the police later that a man with an Irish brogue first covered him with a pistol and that a man with a Swedish dialect struck him.
