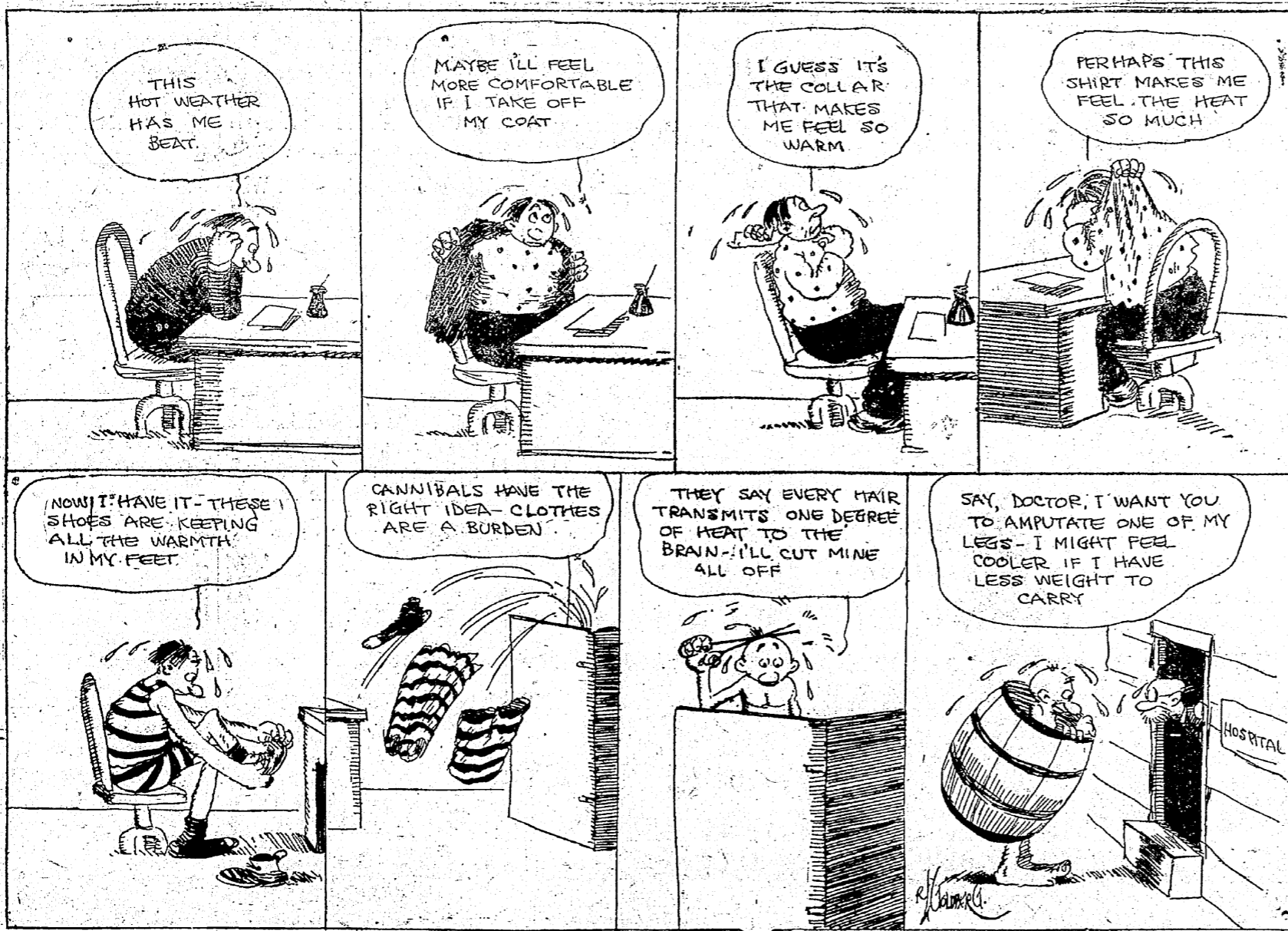

### THE GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW

THE greatest play ever made in baseball was made by Charles W. Murphy when he acquired the Chicago club. But if you ask me the greatest play ever made on the diamond, I believe it was one that Hans Wagner made against me when I was a member of the Brooklyn team. I have seen a lot of plays that I considered great, but never one to equal that which the big Dutchman pulled off, and it is hard to understand even now how he managed to do it.

I always have considered Wagner the greatest ball player I ever saw and have given him credit for doing more than any other shortstop in the world, with the possible exception of Herman Long, but this play of which I'm telling comes under the head of the miracles.

It happened on the old Pittsburg Park down at the head of the Ohio River. We had been giving the Pirates a hard fight, but in the ninth inning they were leading us by a score of 1 to 1. Lefty Leifeld, who is one of the

to catch the ball. But Wagner evidently had been in motion before the ball was pitched. Possibly he anticipated what was trying to do, for as the ball was dropping to the ground, not more than ten feet back of third base, Wagner lurched forward, stuck out one hand and scooped the ball before it could touch the dirt. His plunge caused him to turn a somersault onto foul ground, but he sat up quickly and, still sitting, tossed the ball to second, completing the double play, and the runner coming down from first had to scramble to get back to the bag and avoid a triple play.

SAN FRANCISCO, Wednesday, July 19.—Harriet Stanton Blatch, of New York, suffragist leader and daughter of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, is president of the New York, son-in-law, Dr. Lee De Forest, scientist and wireless inventor, to be divorced. Y., July 17. The grounds named in the San Francisco suit have not been made public.

De Forest declares Mrs. Blatch is responsible for his marital unhappiness; that she has prevented a reconciliation with his wife and has nullified all his efforts to induce Mrs. De Forest to join him in California.

De Forest established a laboratory for wireless experiments here some time ago. Mrs. Blatch is president of the League for Self-Supporting Women. Mrs. De Forest is a fully qualified hydraulic engineer.

### SWINDLER VICTIMIZES CENTRALIA MERCHANTS.

**Posing as Drummer, He Makes Small Kiddy-up "Touches" From Business Men.**

**CENTRALIA, Wednesday, July 19.—**H. S. Turner, the man who was arraigned before Judge H. J. Jones yesterday afternoon and who is being held on a suspended judgment, has the distinction of working the smallest and swiftest swindling games ever operated in either Centralia or Chehalis.

Turner was in a business house, and pretend to use the telephone, taking down the receiver but holding the hook in place with his finger. He would call up an imaginary telegraph office, representing himself as a traveling salesman from some well known house, and inquire if his draft had arrived. When told that it had not he would excitedly turn to the proprietor of the store and inquire if his draft had a tender feeling for drummers in difficulty, and ask for the loan of a small sum of money.

Turner invariably received it, but he met his Waterloo in Messrs. Stoklin and C. P. Steeger, who did not make \$1 and 65 cents respectively, but who did hate to be swindled. The amount asked was always a small one, but it is believed by local authorities that the extent of his operations will amount to a considerable sum.

### JAPANESE GAMBLERS FLEECE WHITE MEN

**SPOKANE, Wednesday, July 19.—**In one of the most exclusive cells imaginable, the Spokane police here conveyed from a business gambling den in which it is believed the wily Orientals have fleeced the unwary out of many thousands of dollars.

Complaints have been made repeatedly to the police of a gang of Japanese who have been operating a gambling den in liquor, often enticing them to enter a gambling den. Repeatedly, the victims have tried to lead the officers to the room, but the attempts always proved futile, till the police sent out a decoy. Then a raid followed, but not till the police had been led to the third story of a building and then clear back to the basement, through a series of stairways and doors.

They found a complete gambling outfit, and in the raid arrested six Japanese, who were found in the place.
