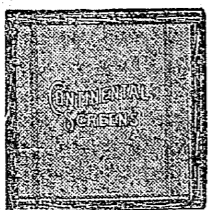

MANY CHANGES IN IMMIGRATION LAW

Radical Amendments to Present Statute Proposed in General Bill Introduced in Senate by Dillingham.

TO REPEAL CHINESE EXCLUSION FEATURE

Provides, However, That Alien Not Capable of Citizenship Shall Not Be Admitted—Chinks Thus Barred Out.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Monday, Aug. 7.—Many radical changes in the immigration laws are provided for by the terms of a general bill introduced in the Senate today by Senator Dillingham, former chairman of the senate committee on immigration and of the joint immigration commission. Most of the innovations suggested are the result of investigations of the commission. The measure proposes to repeal the Chinese exclusion laws except so far as they relate to naturalization. In their place is substituted an amendment to the general immigration laws, which provides for the exclusion from the United States of "persons who are not eligible to become citizens of the United States by naturalization."

The exclusion does not apply, however, to government officers, travelers and members of the learned professions. Various features of the present Chinese exclusion laws are modified to all immigrants, and except the manual laborers not eligible to citizenship by naturalization, the bill proposes to give Asiatic immigrants the legal status accorded to all other immigrants. Not Admitted to Citizenship. The only portion of the various Chinese exclusion laws which is not a section of the act of 1882, which provides that no state or federal court shall admit Chinese to citizenship, is the act of 1907. Senator Dillingham's bill also provides for the exclusion from the United States of "all males over 16 years of age or over, who are physically capable of reading and writing, but unable to read and write in some language or dialect. It provides, however, that an admissible alien may bring in his father or grandfather over 16 years of age, or a son not over 18 years of age, whether such persons are literate or not. The bill makes it unlawful, under the penalty of \$100 for any steamship company to bring to the United States any illiterate alien, except the father or grandfather of an alien not eligible to naturalization. Appointment of Inquiry Board. Senator Dillingham's bill provides that boards of special inquiry regarding the admissibility of aliens shall be appointed by the secretary of commerce and labor. Under the present law the boards are appointed by the immigration commission. The contract labor provision of the immigration law is retained practically in its present form, but the bill adds a new class "and persons who have come in consequence of advertisements for manual labor published in a foreign country," are added. There is provision for the criminal prosecution of corporations, companies or persons who solicit or assist in the importation of contract laborers. To Punish Companies. The provision of the present law which permits the importation of skilled labor by the labor of a foreign country, is not found in this country, amended so as to permit the secretary of commerce and labor to determine the necessity for such importation prior to its accomplishment. A fine of \$400 is imposed by the bill for encouraging or soliciting alien immigration. As a further punishment, the President is authorized to prohibit the landing of passengers at United States ports by steamship companies violating this provision. Authority is given for the deportation of immigrants imprisoned or confined within five years after arrival and of those who become a public charge within three years of landing. Immigrant stations at interior points are provided for as a means of insuring a better distribution of immigrants.

EXPERT DECLARES FRUIT CROP WILL BE SHORT

Commissioner of Horticulture Fixes 1911 Yield at 50 Per Cent Less Than 1910.

TACOMA, Monday, Aug. 7.—Commissioner of Horticulture E. A. Huntley, who has just returned from a tour of the state, announces that this year's fruit crop will not be as large as last year by 40 or 50 per cent, when there was an abnormal yield in all varieties. He said he had submitted his report with the estimate that Washington's total fruit harvest would be 4,225,000 boxes, valued at \$5,765,000. Commissioner Huntley said he had checked his own figures with those submitted to him by assistants in all the fruit growing sections of the state to assure their accuracy. The value of last year's crop was estimated at \$15,000,000, while that of 1909 brought the ranchers of Washington approximately \$6,000,000. Commissioner Huntley said he believes the average price to be received by the ranchers this year will be about 20 per cent higher than in 1910. Mr. Huntley estimates that the ranchers will pack 2,000,000 boxes of apples, for which they will receive an average price of \$3.50 a box, making the total value of the apple crop of the state \$3,000,000. He reported that about 350,000 boxes of pears will be picked and sold at an average price of \$1.50 a box, adding \$525,000 to the wealth of Washington for the 1911 crop. Peaches, he said, will reach a total of 500,000 boxes and sell at 50 cents a box, bringing \$250,000. Plums and prunes combined will furnish 240,000 boxes of fruit and the average price of 60 cents will enrich the ranchers by a total of \$120,000, according to the commissioner. Cherries will increase the fruit crop by 200,000 boxes, to be sold at an average price of \$1 per box, adding \$200,000 to the ranchers' purses. Strawberries were picked to a total of 300,000 boxes and sold at an average price of \$2 per box, making \$600,000, by Mr. Huntley's estimate. Raspberries and blackberries combined show a yield of 475,000 boxes. At an average price of \$2 a box they will bring \$950,000. The grape vines of Washington will furnish 300,000 boxes at an average price of 60 cents a box, making the commissioner's list with a total of \$120,000.

ALL TACOMA SALOONS NOW CLOSE AT MIDNIGHT

New Liquor Ordinance Goes Into Effect and Cafes and Bars Feel Pressure.

TACOMA, Monday, Aug. 7.—The new liquor ordinance passed by the municipal commission two weeks ago, was enforced for the first time last night, particularly by the closing of saloons at midnight. Although yesterday was Sunday, many saloon proprietors began opening their establishments shortly after midnight. They were open but a short time, however, as the police department closed the saloon men of the ordinance's provisions. Cafes also were notified that no liquor was to be served. The effect of the midnight closing provision will be felt more fully tonight. Under the new ordinance also the cafes are given until Saturday to remove their boxes, as the new measure provides that where liquor is served the tables must be so placed that the diners can be viewed by anybody in the room. BALFOUR ASKS FOR VOTE OF CENSURE

Latest Phase of Fight on Veto Bill Springs From House of Commons When Leader Offers Resolution.

CROWDS CHEER WHEN HE ADDRESSES CHAIR

Denounces Ministers and Declares They Have Abused Privilege of Giving Advice to Country's King.

LONDON, Monday, Aug. 7.—The last phase of the fight over the veto bill was entered on in the House of Commons this afternoon, when A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition, moved a vote of censure for the government. The chamber was filled to its capacity. Peers and distinguished strangers were present in large numbers. The diplomatic and ladies' galleries were filled, the occupants, including American Ambassador Field, and other diplomats. Mr. Balfour's motion, of which he gave notice on August 2, follows: "That the advice given his majesty by his majesty's ministers, whereby they obtained from his majesty a pledge that a sufficient number of peers would be created to pass the Parliament bill in the shape in which it left this House, is a gross violation of the constitutional liberty by which, among other ill-consequences, the people will be prejudiced from again pronouncing on the policy of home rule."

Leaders loudly cheered. The rival leaders were loudly cheered as they entered the room, and Mr. Balfour received an ovation as he rose to present his motion. The former Unionist premier emphasized that he was conscious of the gravity of the situation and the seriousness of the step which he asked the House to take. He thought that it would be admitted that never in history had there been a more serious case or one which more urgently deserved the consideration of Parliament and the emphatic condemnation of the ministers. Contempts Ministers. "The ministers," said Mr. Balfour, "have grossly abused their rights of advising the crown, and by abusing those rights put themselves above the constitution. They have acted wholly without precedent," not, as Mr. Balfour contended, in order to meet any great question of state, "but in order to further a party agreement between different sections which support them, and in order to prevent the people of the country from pronouncing their opinion on home rule." The Unionist leader asserted that the ministry had placed the sovereign who had just come to the throne in a cruel position. The King was a count of honor, but the government, by their advice, had poisoned and corrupted the stream of its royalty. He dubbed the proposed new peers "supers in this sordid drama."

WARM WEATHER CAUSES GLACIERS TO MELT FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Monday, Aug. 7.—Never since this camp was started has the Tanana River been so muddy, the warm weather of the past few weeks having started the glaciers to grinding up in the Alaska range with the result that the stream is thick with the white siltal silt. This is building up new bars very rapidly, some of the new formed ones being so soft that the lowering of the water when a passing steamboat wheel pulls it away will cause one of the bars to settle fifteen or sixteen inches. A part of the water taken from the Tanana and allowed to settle will show an inch of white mud in the bottom. "Because of the warm weather, which is affecting the snow that was piled up so deeply last winter the water of the Tanana is also very high. At some places on the Upper Delta River, there are several feet of ice in the timber even now, and it is not likely that this will all be melted this summer."

ROAD TO BE WIDENED AUBURN, Monday, Aug. 7.—Road Supervisor W. N. Hemphill today will start the regrading of the county road between here and Enumclaw. About fifteen miles will be widened to the statutory limit of sixty feet.
