DIVIDEND JUSTIFIES

Stockholders in the Alaska Development Company, organized in Seattle infteen years ago and controlling nearly \$,000 acres of oil lands near Katalla, Alaska, were yesterday gladdened by the declaration of a dividend on a basis of \$1 per share, amounting in all to \$25,000. Oil claims located in the Katalla fields by more than fifty individuals were taken over by the corporation. Before the days of the Klondike rush the oil-bearing fields of Alaska had been covered by hardy prospectors, and preliminary work indicated the existence of immense tracts of oil lands in that part of Alaska.

For many years following the preliminary work, the enterprise lagged, but the original stockholders held to their belief that in time the richness of the district would be proved. Less than two years ago an option was given covering one-half the properties to Clark Davis who assigned his rights to the Amalgamated Development Company, in which McKenzle & Mann an immensely wealthy Canadian rairoad contracting firm, and others in Canada, became interested.

Mr. Munday said last night that approximately \$175.000 had been paid on the properties, of which a considerable part had gone to pay old debts and to enable the purchasers to continue development work. Two weeks ago another payment of the Alaska Development Company, on the basis of \$1 per share.
