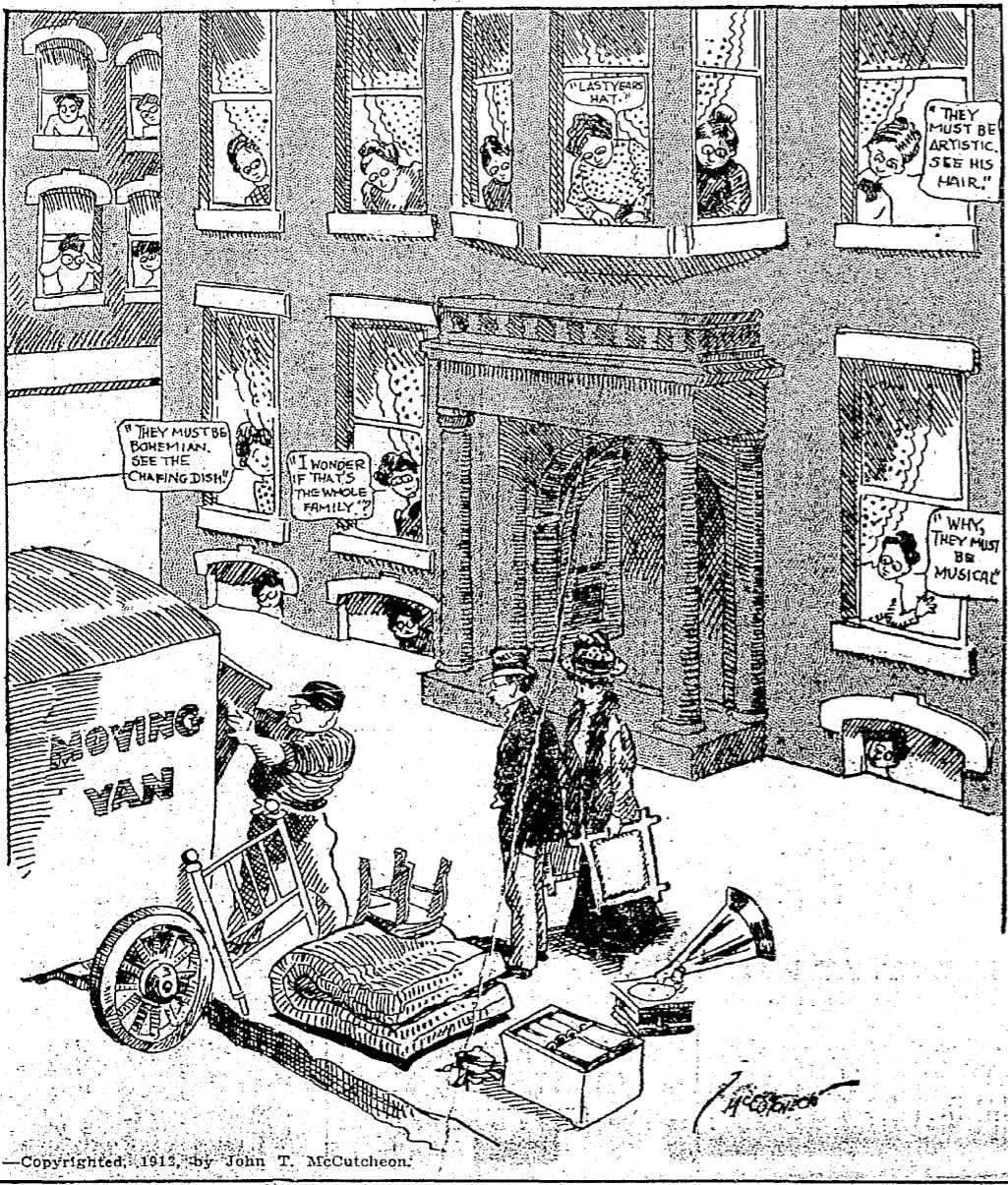

### EXPERTS OF STATE AND CITY INDORSE EXPOSE BY TIMES

State Health Commissioner Eugene E. Kelley Says Facts Bear Out All Allegations About Camp No. 2.

### RESIDENT INSPECTOR MAY PROVE SOLUTION

C. F. Davidson, Chief Inspector of City Health and Sanitation Department, Admits Conditions Are Bad.

COMPLETE substantiation by both state and city health authorities of the Times' expose of sanitary conditions in the Cedar River watershed today was given by Dr. Eugene E. Kelley, state health commissioner, and Dr. C. F. Davidson, chief medical inspector and acting head of the city health and sanitation department.

When approached this morning by a reporter for The Times, each one of these men expressed himself as endorsing the truth of the assertion made in this newspaper relative to the danger of contamination of city water at the source of its supply.

Dr. Kelley and Dr. Davidson further declared that the result of the investigation placed in the Times, published last Sunday, is confirmed by the facts, and that they do not hesitate to subscribe to the statement that the present situation in the watershed is one which needs immediate and thorough attention.

The health authorities also gave their emphatic approval of the remedy proposed as a prevention of the possible pollution of city water as pointed out in the Times—which is that an authorized medical officer be placed in residence at Camp No. 2, and that the sanitation work there be under his supervision.

If such an official is appointed and the remainder of the plans of the department are carried out—as they will be with half a dozen more—there is no possibility of contamination will be prevented, and Seattle's water, the purity of which has long been a boast, and that the sanitation work there be under his supervision.

Dr. Kelley emphatic. "Do you believe a medical official should be placed in residence in the watershed—that is a necessity?" Dr. Kelley was asked.

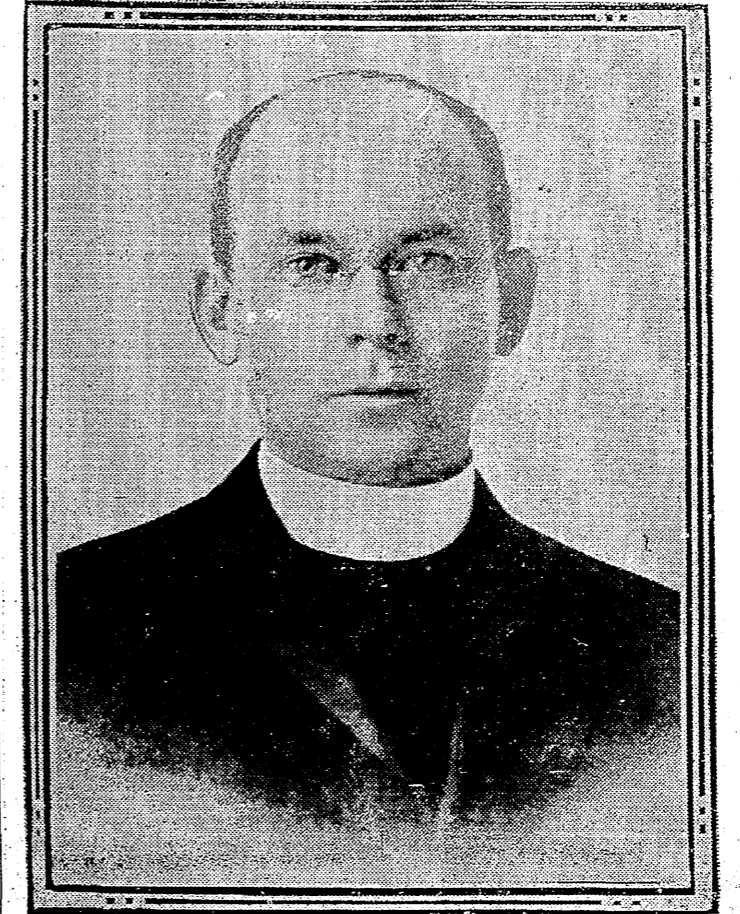
"I am certain," the commissioner replied. "Without such a man there is always danger—a menace to public health."

### CLARK INDORSED, BUT FOSS CAPTURES VOTES

Although He Outdistances Gov. Woodrow Wilson, Missouriian Does Not Gain Single Ballot at Baltimore.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Wednesday, May 1.—Colonel Roosevelt today renounced his claim to the eight delegates-at-large to the Republican national convention elected for him in Massachusetts yesterday.

He telegraphed that he would expect them to vote for President Taft, taking this action, he said, because President Taft carried the state on the presidential preferential vote.

BOSTON, Wednesday, May 1.—Massachusetts emerged today from her first presidential preferential primary election to find that the Republican voters had expressed a preference for the renomination of President Taft, but, notwithstanding, had given Colonel Roosevelt thirty-six delegates to the national convention.

Roosevelt leaders said the Taft preference would have no effect on the sixteen delegates chosen for Roosevelt, and that the expression of the voters for Taft would be disregarded.

Democratic voters of the state expressed a preference for Speaker Champ Clark, although a majority of the delegates at Baltimore will go pledged to Governor Foss.

Just how Massachusetts could send an evenly divided delegation to Chicago while on the preference vote Taft has a plurality of 3,600 over Roosevelt is partly explained by the wording of the state presidential preferential primary law, enacted two months ago.

By that law every voter, to have his vote recorded, had to vote for one of each delegate-at-large of his party, there being no circle for voting by groups.

### GOVERNMENT BEGINS SUIT TO TAKE AWAY CITIZENSHIP PAPERS

Action Is Instituted in United States District Court in Tacoma Against Naturalized American.

### LEONARD OLLSEN MUST DEFEND UTTERANCES

IN the first case ever brought for cancellation of citizenship rights because of avowed opposition to the principles embodied in the constitution of the United States, so far as is known by government officials, Chief Naturalization Examiner John Spindler Smith and W. G. McLaren, assistant United States attorney, this afternoon brought suit in the federal court in Tacoma, before Judge C. H. Hanford, to disbar Leonard Ollsen from exercising the rights of an American citizen.

The action, because of the measures involved and the probability that it will be used as a precedent for future cases involving respect for the flag and for the constitution, is regarded as one of the most important ever tried in the Western District of Washington. It will be tried in the Tacoma court because Ollsen is a resident of that city.

According to the evidence said to be in the possession of the government, Leonard Ollsen was naturalized two years ago, in the early spring of 1910. At that time there was no testimony in court to indicate on his part any wrong ideas concerning government.

In September, 1910, Ollsen appeared in court as witness for another applicant, who declared that he was opposed to the principles set forth in the

W. R. Crawford's Application for Receivership Filed With Superior Court and Scott Calhoun Appointed.

### JAMES A. KERR DECLINES TO FURNISH HIM PAPERS

SUIT brought by W. R. Crawford, former president of the Seattle, Renton & Southern Railway, in the superior court of King County asking for the appointment of a receiver for the corporation, yesterday added a new chapter to the long and troubled history of that company. Judge King Dykeman appointed Scott Calhoun as temporary receiver and Calhoun this morning made demand on James A. Kerr, of counsel for the railroad and for the bondholders, for certain papers involved in the case, which Kerr refused.

Crawford's suit has started a bitter fight for control of the affairs of the corporation. Kerr, speaking for his law firm and for the bondholders, Peabody, Houghtaling & Co., of Chicago, this morning said that he would ask Judge Dykeman as early as possible and probably Friday, to rescind his order appointing the receiver and to dismiss the complaint.

"Crawford's complaint has not a leg to stand on," said Kerr today. "Every step taken in the reorganization of the company has been with Crawford's knowledge and voluntary consent, notwithstanding anything he may allege to the contrary. President Taft Submits to Senate Statement by Knox Announcing Attitude Assumed by United States.

"There is nothing on file in the department of state," said the secretary, "that has justified any inference that the Mexican government or the Imperial Japanese government has been occupied with any disposition of land near Magdalena Bay by which the latter govern-

Seattle assay office will be abolished by the simple expedient of failing to provide any money for its maintenance.

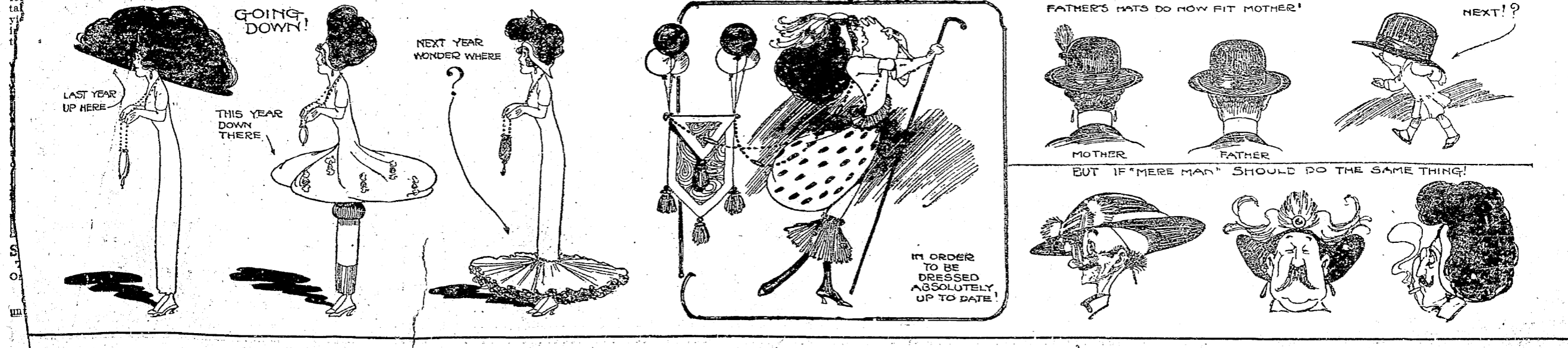

Individually; therefore, he respectfully submits this condition to this honorable board and invites consideration and action upon the same.  
"Dr. Crichton came to me some time before his departure from the city," said the commissioner, "and he told me that he felt rather dubious about sanitary conditions in the watershed. He declared at the same time that he intended to make a vigorous protest against these conditions to the Board of Public Works. It was during this interview that Dr. Crichton asked me to make an inspection of the watershed myself. I knew that the city health official was not satisfied with the state of things as they exist."  
"Dr. Davidson informed me of the conditions referred to by The Times reporter at city camp No. 2, and was questioned as to whether this condition would not create a danger."  
"They admit the possibility of pollution," Dr. Davidson answered quickly. "That is what we must guard against—the possibility of danger. As I have repeatedly said every precaution humanly possible to prevent contamination of the water supply should be taken."  
"Was not The Times' story of last Sunday based on facts?" queried.  
"The story is substantiated by the facts," said Dr. Davidson. "Unfortunately many persons grew from the article the inference that Cedar River water had been polluted. This was not so. The Times' story was a misstatement, which does exist; pointed out that menace and mentioned the remedy which should be made."  
"I might add that the health department already has decided upon a medical man to go to the site of the health residence there and supervise the sanitation aspect of the work now in progress. A laboratory will be established and not only will all men be closely inspected, but they will be made to take typhoid vaccine."  
"New Plan Should Help."  
"The health department has done all that it could do under the circumstances to protect public health by taking preliminary measures at the source of the water supply, and I may say that when a medical officer and a laboratory are established at the source of the practically the last move to eliminate any form of menace to health through this channel will have been made."  
"I am as reasonably certain as one can be without positive present knowledge of the facts that Cedar River has not been polluted, but I cannot say there is no chance that such pollution has taken place in the future, which has to be removed if the people of Seattle are to be enabled to be and health department."  
"It is for the elimination of these possibilities and dangers that The Times has fought. That the expose of last Sunday will bear the fruit desired, and prompt steps may be taken as will absolutely protect the public health, now seems assured."  
"The news discovered that the health department is doing all that it can do to protect the public health, and quickly leaped into the breach in an effort to avert a serious calamity."  
"State and city health authorities declare today that The Times is in the right, that something must be done to correct the conditions existing, and the struggle for the good of the many thus has not been vain."

### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL INVESTIGATE ALSO

Trustees of the New Chamber of Commerce yesterday named Dr. Park Ward Willis, Dr. O. J. West and Dr. Grant Calhoun as members of a special medical committee to investigate and report on the city's water supply immediately. The three physicians signified their willingness to act in such a capacity.

The appointment of the investigating committee came as the result of an expose in The Times that, owing to conditions existing at city camp No. 2 in the Cedar River watershed, there was grave danger of a contamination of city water, and the adoption of a resolution introduced by Kenneth Mackintosh.

### Department of State Intimates to Interested Parties That Action Would Be Likely to Promote Bad Feeling.

ment would acquire land there for any purpose. To these circumstances the department of state felt no necessity for further steps in the matter of any of these rumors, which are of a kind that all too frequently occur to the detriment of public opinion in the respective countries and are an alien to the cordial relations of the governments concerned.  
"Unreserved Denial Made."  
Mr. Knox said the Japanese ambassador had informed the department that he had apprised his government of the rumors in question, which had come to him through the public press and subsequently the ambassador made, with his government's authorization, an unreserved and categorical denial of the rumored purchase of land by the Japanese government, characterizing the same as entirely sensational and utterly without any foundation whatever. The Japanese government having never, the Japanese ambassador stated, directly attempted or contemplated the acquisition of land at Magdalena Bay for any purpose.  
"Secretary Knox said the rumors regarding a Japanese purchase evidently arose from efforts by an American syndicate to dispose of certain lands near Magdalena Bay."  
"This American syndicate, according to the department's information, given in Secretary Knox's report, entered upon negotiations for a sale to a Japanese syndicate. Meantime a Japanese syndicate was formed to acquire the lands. Secretary Knox said that the American syndicate knew that Japanese capitalists would not give their approval to the purchase without the approval of the Japanese government and that the latter would not give its approval unless assured the transaction would be unobjectionable to the United States."  
"American Syndicate Warned."  
"The department of state made it plain to the American syndicate that such a transfer of lands would be interpreted in some quarters in a manner to cause a great outcry, and that such a result would be so obviously a cause of regret to the government of the United States that it would advise the syndicate to comment on the disposition of the federal government in the premises."  
"The American syndicate, it appears, then sought to ascertain the attitude of the American government toward a company formed in part of Japanese investors, Americans retaining control of the property. To this proposition, the department replied that it would add nothing to its former statement. Since this reply, the files of the department disclose no further communication with the Americans interested in the matter."  
"Under these circumstances, Secretary Knox declared:  
"The department cannot assume there is any project on foot calling for action on the part of the United States."  
"The message precipitated a debate in the Senate. Senators Bacon and Lodge concurred in the opinion that if the

Monroe doctrine did not cover the situation a new doctrine covering it could not be formulated. Explaining his reasons for calling for the correspondence, Lodge said it was to prevent the development of any embarrassing situation with reference to Mexico and Japan. He said the time had come when the United States should regard the act as a declaration of war, or indirectly could any foreign government obtain control of land in this hemisphere that might constitute a menace to the United States.

Senator Rayner said that if Japan established a base of supplies or coaling stations in Mexico, he would regard the act as a declaration of war.
