I am just now resting up from a week of one-night stands, and when I get to Seattle, as this is my first visit to this country, I'll get right to work on it. A wonderful revelation. CHANGES IN ANTI-JAP MEASURE COMMENDED

Official Washington Considers Bill Passed by House in State Legislature Less Open to Attack.

CLOSELY FOLLOWS OTHER AND OLDER STATUTES

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, April 16.—The alien land holding bill, as passed yesterday by the lower house of the California legislature in its amended form, is regarded by the officials here as much more difficult than the original measure for the Japanese government.

To lodge an objection to the measure based on strict equity probably it would be unavailing for the Japanese government, by decree, to extend to Americans resident in Japan the right to acquire land in fee simple.

While the situation is in its present state, the Japanese government's action on the part of the administration, though the intention of becoming citizens, at least in part, of the American people, is being set forth to bring the alien land holdings bill into effect.

BILL'S SCOPE BROADENED BY CALIFORNIA HOUSE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Wednesday, April 16.—An anti-alien land ownership bill, designed to prevent Japanese from acquiring title to real property within the state, but so worded as to prohibit any alien from owning land more than one year except upon a declaration of his intention to become a citizen, was passed yesterday by the lower house of the legislature by a vote of 60 to 15.

SOLENS MARK TIME ON LAND OWNERSHIP LAWS

SACRAMENTO, Wednesday, April 16.—The legislature marked time on the anti-alien land ownership legislation today, the Senate bill being at the bottom of the upper house file, and not to be touched until after the assembly bill is passed yesterday by the lower house.
