CHANGES IN ANTI-JAP MEASURE COMMENDED

Official Washington Considers Bill Passed by House in State Legislature Less Open to Attack

CLOSELY FOLLOWS OTHER AND OLDER STATUTES

Washington, Wednesday, April 15.

The alien land holding bill, as passed yesterday by the lower house of the California legislature in its amended form, is regarded by the officials here as much more difficult than the original measure for the Japanese government.

The attitude of the administration and of the Japanese embassy here, in spite of yesterday's action of the California assembly, must continue to be one of observation at this stage.

No Official Ground for Action. While the situation is in its present state of uncertainty, no official action on the part of the administration or the Japanese embassy, though the intention of becoming citizens, is privately every effort is being set forth to bring the alien land holdings bill to a speedy conclusion.

Secretary Bryan conferred with President Wilson today about the development of California. No announcement was made, but the President arranged to see Mr. Johnson, the interior department and Houston of the agricultural department in the state, the committee made the American Asiatic Association of Japan, from its headquarters at Yokohama, has cables and the American Asiatic Association in this country.

Urged Concerted Action. "On account of serious unfriendly agitation throughout Japan, due to proposed California legislation, strongly recommending the Japanese ambassador, also concerted action against legislation adverse to Japanese interests. American interests will suffer seriously."

BILL'S SCOPE BROADENED BY CALIFORNIA HOUSE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Wednesday, April 16.

An anti-alien land ownership bill, designed primarily to bar Japanese from acquiring title to real property within the state, but so worded as to prohibit any alien from owning land more than one year except upon a declaration of his intention to become a citizen, was passed yesterday by the lower house of the legislature by a vote of 60 to 35.

The committee broadened the measure to include all aliens who had not declared their intention of becoming citizens in order not to embarrass foreign corporations of large interest in the state, the committee made the corporation clause of the bill, section 8, apply only to "aliens not eligible to citizenship," although Assemblyman Sutherland, one of the committee, advocated the striking out of the section entirely.

SOLENS MARK TIME ON LAND OWNERSHIP LAWS

SACRAMENTO, Wednesday, April 15.

The Legislature marked time on the anti-alien land ownership legislation today, the Senate bill being at the bottom of the upper house file, and not to be touched until after the adjournment. The bill passed yesterday by the lower house was sent to the Senate committee on judiciary today.

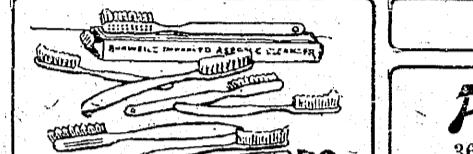
