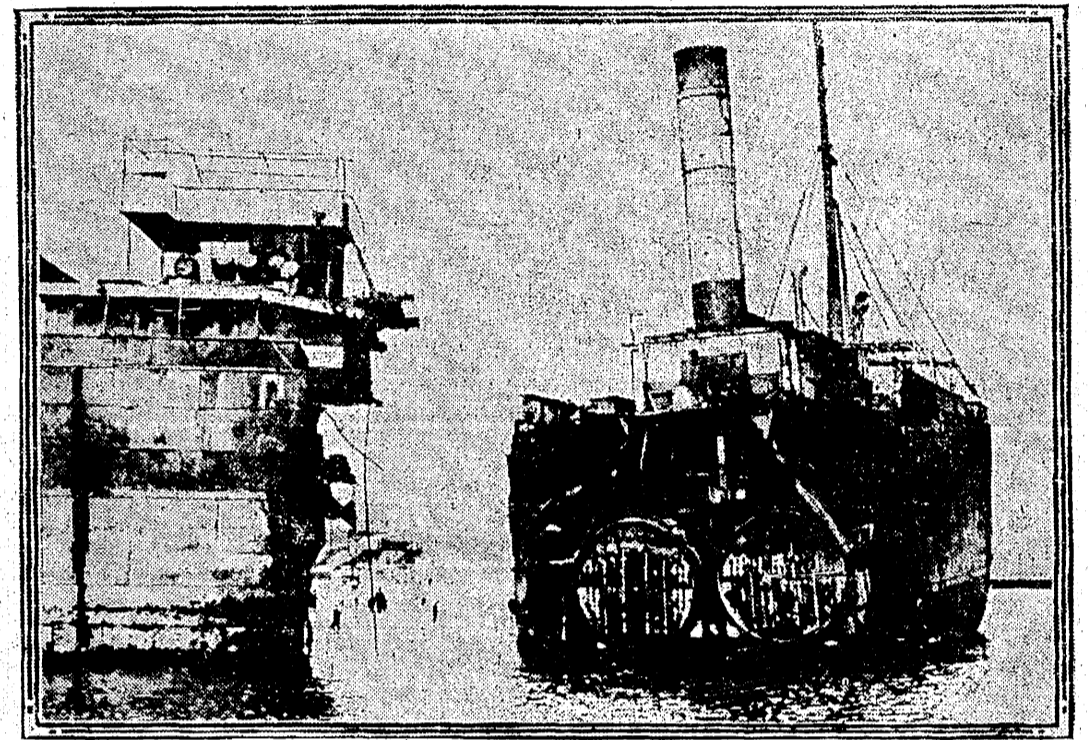

Miss Anne Kenney, One of Most Prominent of English Fighting Suffragists, Is Remanded Without Bail.

WOMEN CONTINUE TO DESTROY PROPERTY

In Spite of Warning by Government Counsel, Band Issues Its Paper, but Few Numbers Are Sold.

LONDON, Thursday, May 1.—Miss Anne Kenney, one of the most prominent of the militant suffragettes, was arrested today as soon as she set foot in England on her arrival from the continent. A detective had accompanied her from Paris bearing a warrant charging her with conspiracy. She was arraigned later and remanded until tomorrow without bail.

Mrs. O. H. Belmont, of New York left for Paris today. Before leaving she said: "The British government learns nothing from history." The present course measures against the suffragettes are but a silver cup of poison to the British people. I intend to attend a meeting of protest to the Duchess of Bedford. Disfranchisement was levied on the property of the duchess on April 21 and a silver cup belonging to her was taken by the tax collectors to satisfy the claim. Tomorrow Mrs. Catt will make her first public speech in England at a meeting of the Actresses' Franchise League. The suffragettes managed this afternoon to issue their paper, The Suffragette, in spite of the warning of the government counsel. The number consisted of eight pages, the front page containing only one word, "Raided." In large type. Most London news dealers refused to handle the publication and only a few women were selling it on the streets. A bathhouse on the Thames opposite Hampton Court Palace, together with a number of boats, were destroyed by suffragettes early today.

EASTERN RAILROADS DENY WAGE INCREASE PETITION

Inform Conductors and Other Trainmen That Present Scale is Liberal, Even Excessive. NEW YORK, Thursday, May 1.—Managers of Eastern railroads declined today to grant a wage increase to conductors and trainmen. The managers, in a reply sent to the Order of Railway Conductors and Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, say that the present wages are liberal and in many cases excessively large, and that the request for an increase is declined "in the interests of owners of railroad securities—in the interests of all railroad employees—in the interests of the public as a whole."

ANNUAL CITIZENSHIP DAY PLAN LAUNCHED

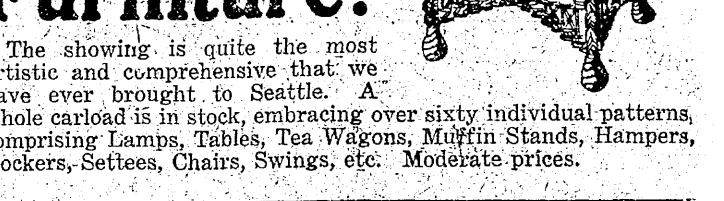

GRADUATE NURSES GIVEN DIPLOMAS

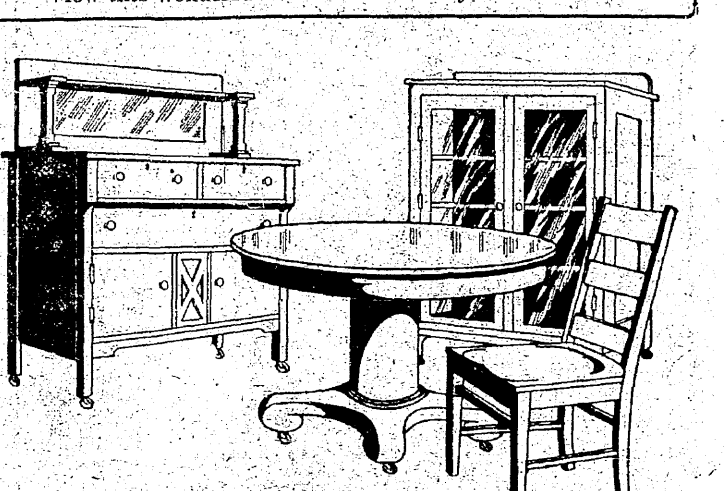
