BIG LINERS IN RACE TO PACIFIC COAST

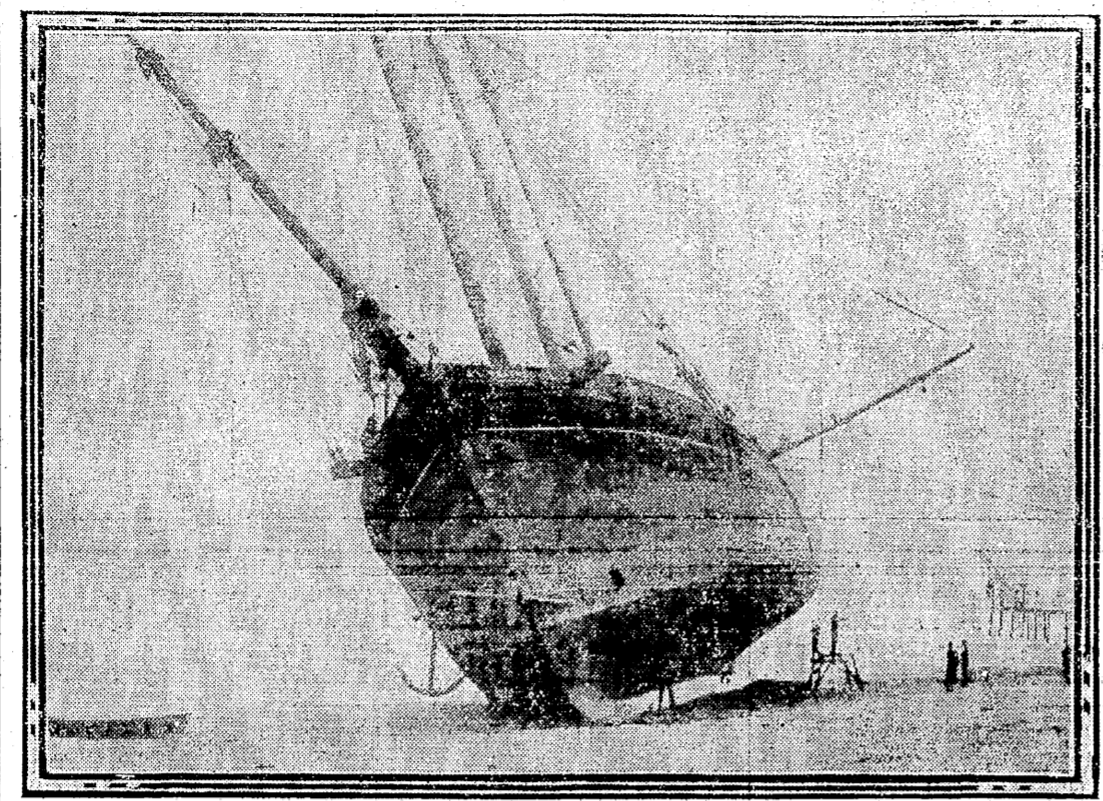

OLD SCHOONER LEAVES RESTING PLACE ON BEACH FAMOUS CRAFT TO BE REBUILT FOR HALIBUT TRADE



Schooner J. M. Weatherwax which, after lying at Port Hadlock for three years, is sold and will be rebuilt for the halibut trade.

AFTER lying for three years near Port Hadlock the old time schooner J. M. Weatherwax will be brought to Seattle to be repaired and remodeled into a halibut fishing vessel.

Today she will be practically rebuilt before going into commission. At present she is a three-masted schooner of 365 tons register, but her sticks will be lowered or taken out and gasoline power installed.

Three years ago the Weatherwax became water-logged while towing to sea and was taken to Port Hadlock where her lumber cargo was discharged.
