



CONCERT PLEASES LOVERS OF MUSIC

Well - Balanced Reading of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony and Mme. Sammis-MacDermid Features.

Conductor John Spargur's finely balanced and reverential reading of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony and the first hearing in this city of a dramatic soprano gifted with a voice of rarely lovely quality—Mme. Sibyl Sammis-MacDermid—were two of the principal features of the third Philharmonic Orchestra concert at the Metropolitan Theatre last night. Another was the splendid performance of Berlloz. Carnaval Romain by the Philharmonic players, the musicianly value of which was by no means overlooked by the audience which, as was also the case with the symphony, was generous in its appreciation and applease.

with the symphony, was generous in its appreciation and applause.

The Metropolitan contained all the followers of the Philharmonic organization and in addition a fair sized crowd of music lovers not on the subscription list. There should have been more of these, for Conductor Spargur's offerings were of the most attractive kind, and his program typical of the director of the Philharmonic organization, containing besides the numbers mentioned and the songs for soprano, Von Weber's "Invitation to the Dance," heard with rapt attention and evident liking by the audience which demanded its repetition.

The Beriloz "Carnaval" was given in brilliant style, with a fine and substantial body of tone, well maintained throughout and skilifully handled in every division, especially with the wood wind and horns. The strings were conspicuously capable in the symphony, particularly so in the second and third movements. One cannot but praise Spargur's concept of the symphony, a searching and sympathetic understanding of its beauty which he conveyed to his men, and which resulted in a well finished and wholly delightful performance.

This, by the way, was not to fall on deaf ears, for it seemed that when the orchestra had finished the symphony, its appeal had found favor with every part of the audience as effectively as anything which the Philharmonic organization has done this season.

Soloist Pleases Andlence.

Mme. MacDermid quite justified all the expectations entertained concerning her voice and talents in advance of her coming. The voice itself is very rare in quality, having a certain richness and color in every register which makes it not an easy matter to classify. The middle and lower registers have a contrait oquality, yet with a buoyancy and brightness not, as a rule, possessed by contraito singers. In the upper register, as was evidenced in the Wagner aria, Mme. MacDermid's voice is not so very powerful, being better displayed in the aria from Massenet's "Thais." This was superby sung.

Following came a group of songs by Mr. MacDermid, who was at the plano and which pleased as much as anything during the program. Indeed, there was an evident desire to hear both more of Mme. MacDermid's charming voice and more of her husband's songs. These, given at the close of the concert, were: Fulfillment," "Charity," "If I Knew You and You Knew Me?" and "Sacrament."
