person to hold two offices and to enter no protest to the removal of a competent engineer from the superintendency of the Nisqually power project.

Charges were filed January 13, 1912, against Mayor Seymour and Commissioner of Light and Water Weeks, both of whom had been put in at a recall election. The mayor was charged with establishing a spolia system, with neglecting public business and holding star chamber sessions, and Commissioner Weeks was charged with neglecting his duties and with having appointed incompetent men to heads of departments.

After several weeks spent in an effort to get signatures, the recalls were abandoned, Mr. Weeks resigning, but Mayor Seymour being re-elected.

Charges were filed February 9, 1914, against Commissioner of Public Works Woods and Commissioner of Safety Mills. These are still pending, signatures being circulated and an effort is being made to get a recall election. The charges against Mr. Woods are that he has been seen on the public streets in an intoxicated condition, and that he has established open town conditions early in his incumbency in office.

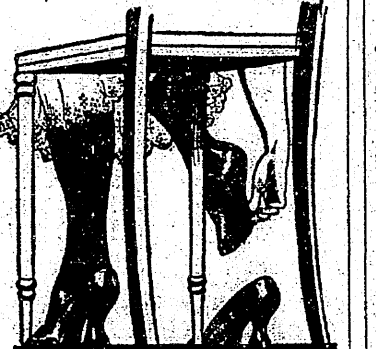

WOULD CHANGE NAME OF PARK DEPARTMENT

Two important steps have been taken by the executive board of the Seattle Recreation and Playground League as a result of the survey now being conducted in the Northwest by Capt. L. H. Weir, secretary for the Playground and Recreation Association of America. These steps are: first, to change the name of the department to "Department of Parks and Recreation," and second, to have authority given this department to cooperate with other public agencies, such as the Board of Education, the Park Commission, the Water Department, etc., in the use of facilities adapted for public play or recreation purposes.

The reason for the first recommendation is stated to be that owing to the assumption by the park department of the maintenance and administration of public play and public recreation, the name "Park Department" does not fully express to the public the true significance of the department's functions.

The second to which the department is committed to public play and public recreational activities may readily be seen when it is understood that twenty-four of the properties now held by the park department are specifically adapted for playgrounds. It conducts municipal band concerts; has erected and is conducting four recreation centers; has a large bathing beach equipped with pavilion, refectory, etc.; has a large swimming pool; has a large center; stands sponsor for the Boy Scout organization of the city and has in its salary rolls a force of recreation workers varying from ten in the winter to twenty-five or more in the summer.

In addition to the above facilities a large public golf course, the first to be opened by any city in the west, will be opened by the department about June 1. Of the forty remaining properties classified as playgrounds, it is estimated that 50 per cent of them have some facilities for the play and recreation of the people already developed.

PARDONED AND THEN HANGED FOR MURDER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Saturday, March 28.—Fred, pardoned by Governor Hayes and freed from an accumulated sentence of life for the murder of Melvina Hatton, a negro, was electrocuted today for the murder of Melvina Hatton.

The governor granted the pardon when the legal question was raised as to whether the man could be executed before he had served his term of 115 years.
