Governor Lister Announces He Will Have Stone Sent to Washington Immediately.

OLYMPIA, Saturday, April 25.—Completion of the tening stone tablet, to be set in the Washington monument at the national capital to represent the state of Washington, was announced by Governor Lister today. He hopes to make arrangements to have the stone transported at once to Washington, without cost to the state; so that it may be installed while Washington senators and representatives are in the capital in attendance upon the present session of congress.

(Continued from Page One.) There was persistent sniping last night. One outbreak occurred on the plaza while the cafes were full and with diners. There was no casualties, but many a dinner was left unfinished as civilians hurried away to their homes in the hotels, further from the crack of rifles.

## FIRING CONTINUES, SAYS NAVAL REPORT

WASHINGTON, Saturday, April 25.—The navy department tonight received from Admiral Badinger the following telegram dated 5 p. m. April 25: "Last night's firing desultory and continued for a considerable period. One private slightly wounded in forearm. Name not yet ascertained. Admiral Fletcher continues to direct the influential citizens unite and arrange for conduct of municipal affairs by people themselves."

"Quite certain that former officials will not resume office under present conditions, but possibly citizen committee can be formed to influence city's affairs along lines of law and order and create confidence among the people. Meeting of this kind will be held this afternoon. Question of food and water still giving anxiety, but up to present time no actual distress. Seems probable, however, that ultimately government will have to ration poorer classes of inhabitants. Customs house opened and vessels ready to discharge, but much difficulty experienced in obtaining labor."

## 616 TAMPIO REFUGEES ARRIVE AT GALVESTON

GALVESTON, Saturday, April 25.—The tank steamer Trinidadian and the collier Cyclops arrived today from Tampico, Tex., with 616 Mexicans from Tampico. The refugees were in a pitiable plight. During the passage they were crowded together without any covering other than their clothing, and it had rained almost continually since they left Tampico.

Before dark the Ward Line steamer Espinosa and another ship now known as the Albatross, under the name of the Gringos, and Viva Huert! and Viva Carranza were also heard from many sides. The mob thinned out, but came back stronger at 9:30. Active demonstrations against the Americans were begun, and all hotel doors were barricaded. There were 200 Americans in the building, with almost no protection.

Shots began to come through the windows and the women and children were sent to the basement. There were only thirty rifles in the hotel and practically no ammunition. The besieged Americans owe their lives to the Germans. That night, a young German managed to work his way through the Mexican lines and obtained a rowboat. He rowed out to the English cutter Dredge and the officers did not appreciate the situation and he was refused. Then he went to the German cutter Dresden. Shortly after, the Dresden landed a force of marines which went to the hotel and the water front town where there were disturbances.

At 2 o'clock on Wednesday, the United States consul wired all Americans to leave the city and by 3 o'clock all had done so. It was understood that they would be on the water front two days only and all were surprised to learn later that they were bound for Galveston where they would stay for two days and then be sent to the United States and assert that they will return as soon as possible to take care of their property.

One thousand nine hundred and fifty-four refugees have been shipped out of Tampico since last night, according to the wireless operator of the collier Cyclops.

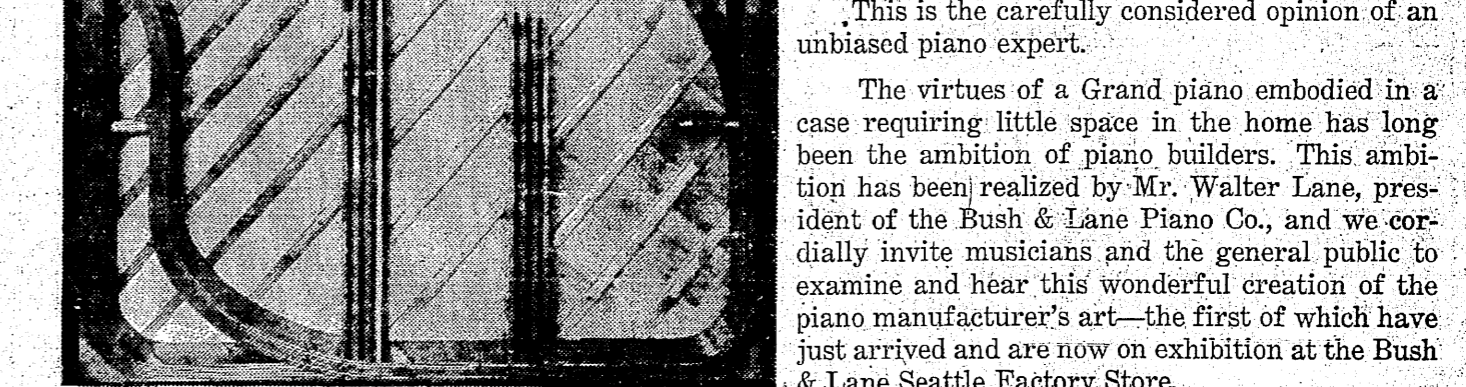

## SEES DANGERS IN JAP CORPORATION

Darwin Tells Orientals That Business Organization for Fishing Will Be in Contravention of State Laws.

Facing practical exclusion from the fishing industry of Washington through stringent enforcement of the law forbidding aliens from engaging in that industry in this state, Japanese fishermen are making an attempt to gain a foothold in the fishing business by organizing a Japanese corporation to engage in that business.

Commissioner Darwin replied that the law forbidding the employment of Japanese in the business of catching fish in Washington waters would be strictly enforced. He also informed the Japanese that under no circumstances would he issue a fishing license to a Japanese corporation unless informed by the supreme court of the state that the law required that he issue such license.

In past years, according to Darwin, Japanese have attempted to gain a foothold in the fishing industry but the laws against alien fishermen have prevented the accomplishment of this purpose. But for the enforcement of this law, Darwin believes, the Japanese would now be in practical control of the fishing industry in this state.

## TURNER TO TALK ON CANAL TOLLS
