PARIS CLAIMS ALLIES HAVE MADE ADVANCE

PARIS, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The French official announcement given this afternoon says that the Allies have made slight progress to the east of Neupont on the right bank of the Yser.

"On our left wing the allied forces have made slight progress to the east of Neupont, on the right bank of the Yser. From Dixmude to the Lys, the German attacks were renewed yesterday, but at a number of points, with lessened energy, particularly with regard to the actions of their infantry.

"The Franco-British lines have at no point drawn back and our troops, progressing, notably towards Hollebecke and Wytschaete.

GREAT BRITAIN ANNEXES TURK ISLAND OF CYPRUS

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—Great Britain today formally annexed the island of Cyprus, in the Mediterranean, which nominally formed a part of the Turkish empire.

The defensive alliance between Great Britain and Turkey having become annulled at the outbreak of war, the British government decided that it was necessary to appropriate the island in order that proper provision might be made for its government and for its protection. The island, since the Anglo-Turkish convention of 1878 had been occupied and administered by Great Britain, though it had remained under the suzerainty of the Sultan.

CRUISER KONIGSBERG REPORTED OUT OF ACTION

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The Times prints a report today that the German cruiser Konigsberg has been out of action in the Indian Ocean. The Konigsberg is a protected cruiser and was laid down in 1905. She is 3,348 tons, is 354 feet long and has a speed of 25 1/2 knots. Her main battery consists of ten 4.1-inch guns.

WHITE STAR LINER GIVES UP SAILINGS

BELFAST, Ireland, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The winter sailings of the White Star steamship Olympic have been canceled and today the crew was paid off. Mystery has attended the last trip of the Olympic from New York to Belfast, and this unexpected announcement that her winter sailings are to be canceled adds to the curiosity regard-

ing what circumstances made this measure necessary.

The Olympic left New York October 21 for Glasgow. Eight days later, while off the coast of Ireland, she was warned by wireless of the danger from German mines. She at once put into Londonderry, where she was refueled and stayed there for five days.

During this time her passengers, with one exception, were kept on board and not even allowed to hold communion services. The exception was Charles M. S. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, who was permitted to go to Londonderry.

The Olympic left Londonderry November 1 and went to Belfast, where her passengers and mails were disembarked.

The Cunard liner Lusitania is the only one of the larger transatlantic liners now in service.

INDUSTRIAL POLAND RETAKEN BY RUSSIANS

PETROGRAD, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The new position of the German army front along the River Warthe, seventy-five miles west of the Vistula River, which they reached at the time of the attempted attack on Warsaw, indicated the tremendous retreat of General von Ludendorff's army in Poland during the last two weeks. This retreat is regarded as especially important since it has cut off industrial centers as Lodz, Piotrkow, Radom and Kielce were recaptured by the Russians. The situation in Poland, which is at the junction of the San and Vistula Rivers, has also been retaken.

On the East Prussian frontier, the Germans have met with no success in their aggressive, and at some points the Russians have even crossed into German territory. In this region, however, the German retreat was not marked as serious losses.

While the retreat of the Austrians operating in South Poland and Galicia is not marked as that of the Germans, the official reports here indicate that they have moved perceptibly backwards.

ENGLISH QUESTION REPORT OF DEFEAT

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The admiralty has issued a statement which it says it has received from German sources details of a naval engagement which took place in which the British cruiser Monmouth was sunk and the cruiser Good Hope severely damaged. The statement says the admiralty has no confirmation of the report.

The statement was issued through the official press bureau of the admiralty, and says: "The admiralty cannot accept the facts given in dispatches as accurate at present, for the battleship Canopus, which was specially sent to strengthen Rear Admiral Craddock's command, and which would have given him a decided superiority, was not mentioned in them. Further, although five German ships concentrated in Chilean waters, only three entered the harbor.

"It is possible, therefore, that when the full account of the action is received it may considerably modify the German version. Effective measures have been taken to deal with the situation in any event."

KING GEORGE FORMALLY DECLARES WAR ON TURKS

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—It is officially announced in London today that the state of war between Great Britain and Turkey. The proclamation to this effect, which subsequently was gazetted, reads as follows: "Owing to hostile acts committed by Turkish forces under German officers, a state of war exists between Great Britain and Turkey from today and all proclamations and orders in council heretofore issued in relation to the war between Great Britain and Austria shall apply to the state of war between Great Britain and Turkey."

The British council, meeting at Buckingham Palace this morning to discuss the question. At its conclusion King George signed the documents proclaiming the state of war, and the announcement was made.

The British cruiser Minerva has bombarded the Arabian town of Djeddah (Jiddah) on the Red Sea.

The Turkish ambassador who was handed his passports by the foreign office yesterday, left the embassy this morning, and is en route for the Charing Cross station en route to Constantinople.

The official press bureau in a statement pays tribute to the bravery and adaptability of the Indian troops now serving in France and Belgium. General French has sent a congratulatory message to their commander.

GERMAN CRUISER YORCK SUNK BY MINE IN BAY

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—The German cruiser Yorck struck a mine in Jade Bay and sank.

The information regarding the loss of the Yorck reached London in an Amsterdam dispatch to the Reuters Telegram Company. It states that an official dispatch from Berlin said that the Yorck, on the forenoon of November 1, struck a mine, blowing the entrance to Jade Bay and sank.

Late reports declare that 382 men, more than half of the crew, had already been saved but that the rescue work was hampered by a thick fog.

The Yorck was an armored cruiser, 403 feet long and had a complement of 557 men. She was built in 1904 and displaced 1,950 tons.

UNITED STATES CONSUL AIDS BRITISH SUBJECTS

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—Telegraphing from Alexandria, Egypt, under date of Tuesday, the correspondent of Reuters Telegram Company, says: "The Turkish authorities tried to prevent the departure of the British officials and foreign officials from Beirut but intervention of the American consul in their behalf was successful. It was explained, however, that the idea of the detention was not to keep them as hostages, but to avoid the semblance of a final rupture as the feeling there is resentful towards the Germans for plunging Turkey into war."

"The presence of the American cruiser with Carolina is expected to exercise a salutary influence on popular feeling."

HONOLULU JAPANESE CAUGHT SIGNALING

WASHINGTON, Thursday, Nov. 5.—Japanese warships lying outside of Honolulu waiting for the little German cruiser Gelebe have been receiving secret signals from a Japanese civilian ashore.

Official reports yesterday said an American naval officer had caught the Japanese signaling and had warned him not to repeat the offense.

A date has not yet been set for the departure of the Gelebe, which has been repairing at Honolulu, unless the commander elects to intern his ship for the rest of the war.

BUILDINGS BURNED IN STRIKE TROUBLE ZONE

Miners or Their Sympathizers Apply Torch to Big Boarding House, Scene of Disturbances.

FORT SMITH, Ark., Thursday, Nov. 5.—Reports were received at the United States marshal's office shortly before noon today that miners, or their sympathizers, burned a number of houses at Prairie Creek early today. The burned buildings are said to include the big boarding house which has been the scene of numerous disturbances.

The federal grand jury summoned to investigate the riot in the mining regions, where miners are alleged to have prevented court officers from performing their duties, was empaneled yesterday and immediately adjourned until tomorrow, when Judge Frank Youmans will deliver his charge.
