PROBE BY STATE SOLONS FINISHED

Said Contractors of Normal School and Institution for Feeble-Minded Will Be Favored in Report.

SPOKANE, Saturday, Feb. 6.—The state investigation into alleged irregularities in the construction of the new administration building for the Normal School at Cheney and the five buildings for the state Institution for Feeble-Minded at Medical Lake is finished. The report of the Legislative committee will now be made up for consideration by the proper committees of the legislature, and by the legislature. The main investigation was into the manner in which Architect Julius A. Zittel of Spokane conducted his work at both institutions, and of the manner in which Contractor John T. Huetter is constructing the Cheney Normal and in which Contractor S. G. Morin built the five buildings for the feeble minded.
