SPOKANE BANK ROBBERED

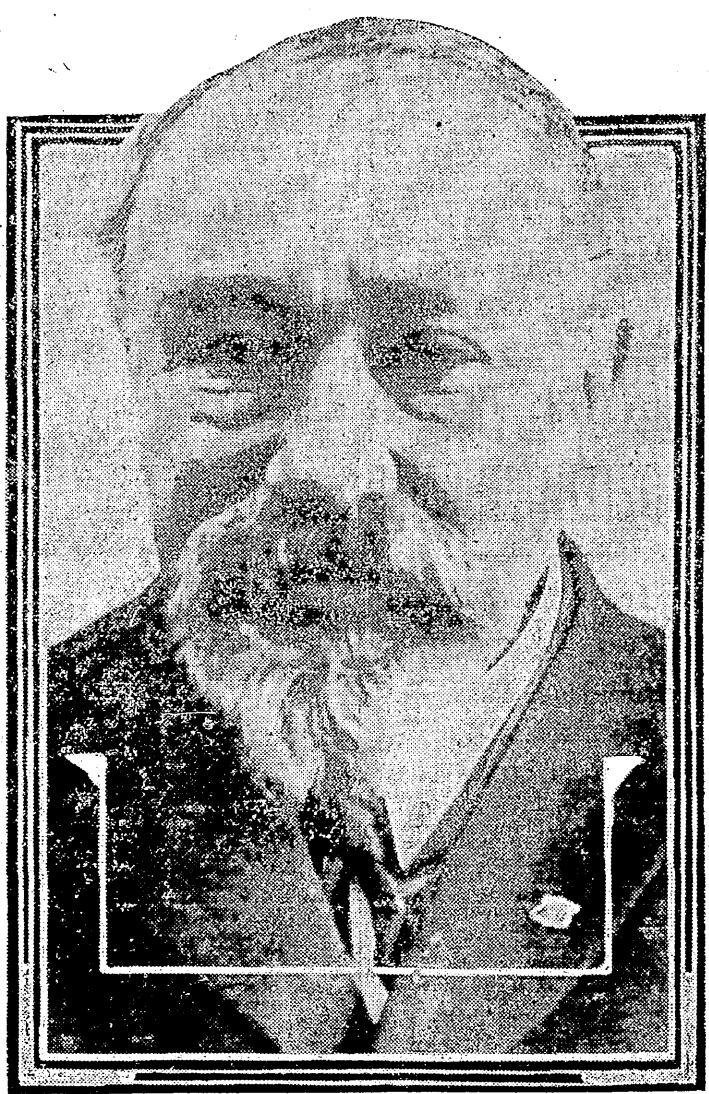

The reason the newspaper reporters and others couldn't find me," he said last night, "is very simple. I retired to my room at the hotel in the evening. JAPS PLANNING TO COLONIZE BRAZIL

REAL ESTATE

OUTSIDE ACREAGE INQUIRY HEAVY DURING WEEK STOCKMEN GOING TO SEE BIG EXHIBIT

City Deals Transacted Have Been Strictly on Income Producing Basis, Little Speculation Being Noted.

Inquiries for outside acreage and offers to transfer substantial city properties for first-class farm lands were features of the past week in local real estate circles. City real estate has remained rigid, the rental situation has been more favorable, but the "back to the farm" movement registered a noticeable stir. Several large deals in Eastern Washington wheat lands are pending through local offices.

Small Property Sales.

The usual number of small home-property sales were transacted during the week. More attention has been paid to the class of business than perhaps ever before.

Industrial Projects.

Further north toward Lake Union, in this same district, industrial projects are being fostered. The Northern Pacific group in the heart of the district has awakened property owners and attracted the attention of a number of large concerns. Two warehouses have already been contracted for in this section and tentative plans are under way for the construction of a large building.

NEW MARKET WILL OPEN IN SEATTLE

C. R. Strong, Leading Grocer in Westlake, Takes Lease on Ground Floor of Building for Enterprise.

A new market, to be known as the White Public Market, will open in Seattle March 20. C. R. Strong, the leading grocer in the Westlake Market, has taken a lease on the ground floor of the new four-story O'Shea Building, at the southeast corner of Fifth Avenue and Pine Street, where the new market will be opened.

Promoters of the project declare that it should be one of the most attractive markets in the city. The building in which it is situated is of class A construction, beautifully trimmed in brick and granite, with a fine architectural exterior, and all the fixtures will be decorated in white. One of the features of this market that will be noticeable will be the white jackets which all of the clerks will wear.

EMBARGO ON BOXED APPLES FOR EUROPE

An embargo has been placed by railroads on shipments of boxed apples from the Northwest to the Eastern seaboard by the Pacific coast route to Europe. They will not accept through bills of lading not protected by some form of insurance against loss by fire or water transportation is unavailable.

FOUNDATIONS LAID FOR BIG \$60,000 WAREHOUSE

Foundations were laid during the past week for the \$60,000 seven-story concrete E. S. Simpson warehouse at Pike Street and Western Avenue. Contract for the construction was let by the Coast Construction Company and the building is expected to be ready for occupancy by May 10.

More Than 2,000 Farmers and Their Families Will Attend Exposition to See Animals on Display.

More than 2,000 farmers, stockmen and their families from different parts of this state will attend the livestock exhibit of Washington at the Panama-Pacific Exhibition for ten days during the latter part of October, according to plans perfected by Robert Burt, livestock commissioner for the Washington State exposition commission with headquarters at 100 Western Avenue, Seattle.

Invitation Issued.

Burt has recently issued an invitation card and whenever presented, has met with the highest enthusiasm. "Washington stockmen want you in San Francisco next fall from October 15 to the 25th of the month, to help boost the state, as a place for growing the best livestock in the world, and to see the animals on display. The commission have copyrighted the word hospitality and will entertain you with smooches, vaudeville and musicals at various times during your visit. Two thousand or more stockmen from this state will go to San Francisco, and by so doing will take advantage of this opportunity to get acquainted, to enjoy the state's products and to reduce the expense of the trip. Be with us."

LUMBER USED IN MAIN AT ERISCO

Big Fair Constructs Buildings of Temporary Character—Plans Elaborately to Meet Any Fire Danger.

Owing to the close proximity of San Francisco to the large lumber producing centers and considering the temporary nature of Exposition structures, the general character of building materials as brick, steel, stone and concrete was largely eliminated in the erection of the main building at Erisco. That make up the central portion of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, says Alexander Stevens, a Fifth Avenue and Virginia Street, through the offices of H. B. Dornay & Co. Guy require the use of more permanent materials, particularly of steel and concrete.

Together there are the neighborhood of 200 buildings of all kinds on the 535 acres of the exposition site. It is estimated that with the exception of the Palace of Fine Arts, the dome and dome structure of the Palace of the Legion of Honor, the Tower of Jewels, the frames of all buildings, including the wall studding and sheathing are of timber. It will be realized that there is a tremendous fire risk. The fires at the Chicago Exposition and the burning of the Exposition at Erisco indicated to this Exposition that fire protection and fire prevention must be made a part of the construction program.

In this direction several extraordinary measures have been introduced for fire protection. These measures include a complete fire-fighting apparatus, both in the buildings and in the grounds, and automatic water systems, wheeled and hand chemical extinguishers, etc.
