HOTEL NEWS
WEST LEARNING TO BUILD HOMES

Interior Decoration of Coast Houses Just Emerging From Barbaric State, Says Visitor From East.

WESTERNERS are just beginning to learn how to build their homes, according to S. P. Crosby, superintendent of the Mathews Brothers Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee, Wis. He is at The Savoy. Interior decoration of Western homes, especially those of Washington, Oregon and California, is just beginning to creep out of the barbaric stage, in his opinion, although he admits that enormous strides have been made in the last few years.

Mr. Crosby has just completed supervising the interior finishing of several millionaires' homes in Los Angeles. Although this is his first trip to Seattle he has often been in Washington before. He had charge of the interior finishing of the Hotel Vancouver in Spokane.

"In the larger and more expensive homes I have often seen splendid work here in Washington," said Mr. Crosby, "but it is only in recent years that the home of the laboring man and the middle class home of the Western cities has begun to reflect anything of the artistic and really common features of the matter in the East and Middle West."

It was rare a few years ago that the front doors to Western homes were more than painted barn doors, whereas now you are beginning to use a little better material. The advantage of the beautiful Douglas fir and California red wood, interior decoration is usually well as cheaply as it may be done poorly.

BULLET VICTIM ASKS PAY
OLYMPIA, Wednesday, July 21.—A novel application for compensation has been filed with the industrial insurance commission by Fred Nelson, 19 years old and unemployed, who was struck in the arm by a stray bullet in Seattle recently.
