SALONIKI CALLED MOTHER OF JEWS They Practically Control Its Trade and Commerce and Lead in Numbers—Emigrated From Spain.

ATHENS, Thursday, Feb. 24.—Saloniki was under rule of the Turks for six centuries before it came into the possession of the Greeks again, but it never has become a Turkish city, although it contains more than forty mosques. More than half of the population consists of Jews, who practically control all trade and commerce. The Jews emigrated from Spain during the sixteenth century and they are still called "Sephardim" at the beginning of the seventeenth century the city had thirty-six Jewish congregations, its high school for rabbis was famous throughout the East. Samuel Usque, a Jewish poet of that time, called the city "a mother of the Jews, a paradise like of which can be found nowhere in the wide world."

PHILADELPHIA'S MAYOR ORGANIZES CAMEL SQUAD Declares Every Person on City Payroll Is Subject to His Anti-Rum Orders.

PHILADELPHIA, Thursday, Feb. 24.—Mayor Thomas B. Smith yesterday made it clear that orders against the use of intoxicants by employees of the city, which have been issued by the heads of several departments of the municipal government, are to apply to all city employees. After a meeting with his departmental directors at which the question was discussed the mayor issued a statement in which he said: "Rum and other public service is impossible. My orders to the heads of all departments are to suspend from duty any employee who is found using liquor while at work, or found to be under the influence of liquor while at work, or who is found to be under the influence of liquor while on duty. The suspension is equivalent to dismissal unless the facts warrant such action. No excuse will save an offending employee, no matter how good his previous record may be."

LOYALTY OF JAPANESE PLEDGED TO AMERICA Will Stick to U. S. Even if They Have to Fight Parents, Says Society President.

HONOLULU, T. H., Thursday, Feb. 24.—Much discussion has been aroused throughout the islands by the declaration of Americanism made at the Washington Birthday celebration at Hilo by President Arawaka of the Japanese-American Society. "American-born Japanese are striving to get away from Japan," Arawaka said, "they have found they cannot serve two masters and they are loyal Americans."

CANADA REFUSES TO LIFT WHEAT TARIFF Proposal to Take Advantage of Countervailing Clause Is Defeated Second Time.

OTTAWA, Ont., Thurs. Feb. 24.—Proposals for the free admission of wheat from the United States into Canada were killed for another year in Parliament yesterday. A resolution proposing that the Canadian duty of 12 cents a bushel on wheat be removed so that under the countervailing clause of the Underwood tariff law Canadian wheat could be freely admitted to the American market where it now faces a tariff of 10 cents.

3 DIE IN WELL DAHLONEGA, Ga., Thursday, Feb. 24.—Jack and Homer Wehant and Charles Caddis were drowned yesterday in the mine of the same name. Federal revenue officers, after destroying an illicit still, had dumped a quantity of four machines from which whisky made. The three men fell into the well Tuesday night, it was said, while they were trying to dip up some of the liquid. Early yesterday, children passing the well, which is in the mountainous ten miles from here, heard cries for help. The men were dead when a rescue party arrived.

SAIL LOFT BURNS PHILADELPHIA, Thursday, Feb. 24.—Workmen in the sail loft at the Philadelphia navy yard were driven from the building yesterday by a fire of undetermined origin that was discovered in a pile of wood in the loft. The blaze had gained considerable headway before it was discovered and for a time threatened the interior of the building. The fire brigade, however, quickly extinguished the flames and the damage was slight.

KILLS SELF AT SEA CHARLESTON, S. C., Thursday, Feb. 24.—Capt. A. Helmer Hansen of the Norwegian steamship "Norge" shot and killed himself at sea February 21. The "Norge" brought the body here yesterday. Captain Hansen was a native of Christiania.

RATTLER BITES HER THOMASVILLE, Ga., Thursday, Feb. 24.—Mrs. John D. Archbold, daughter-in-law of John D. Archbold, of the Standard Oil Company, was bitten by a rattlesnake while hunting on the Archbold estate here here yesterday. Physicians said her wound would not be snake after she had been bitten.
