KEARNS CHARGES TO BE DISMISSED

State's Attorney Says He Will Not Insist Upon Trial in Connection With Industrial Insurance Graft.

OLYMPIA, Wednesday, March 8.—The charge of grand larceny against E. W. Kearns in connection with cashing bogus industrial insurance warrants, for the utterance of which J. F. Gillies was convicted, will be dismissed with consent of the attorney-general's office tomorrow. The sixty days' limitation on which action must be brought after filing complaint will have elapsed and John M. Wilson, assistant attorney-general in charge of insurance graft prosecution, said today that he would consent to a dismissal of the charge against Kearns under the statutory limitation, in argument on a demurrer, as the state could file a new information against Kearns at a later date.

Kearns was indicted by Frank Stone and J. F. Gillies. Stone has confessed and will plead guilty. Gillies has been convicted twice and there is no evident intention of trying him a third time on industrial insurance loot charges.

Kearns was acquitted late last night on a grand larceny charge brought by prosecuting attorney Yantis in connection with a burglary that Harold Lehmann confessed to committing in Tacoma. Arguments on motions for a new trial of the two Gillies cases will be heard tomorrow at the same time that the insurance charge against Kearns will be dismissed. This action will temporarily relieve Kearns of a \$2,500 bond he has given in the Gillies charges.

FRESH SNOW GIVES TROUBLE IN HILLS

Four Feet Falls on Crust of Last Storm and Frequent Slides Block Rails—Rotaries Clearing Routes.

Four feet of snow in the mountains, followed by rain which caused innumerable small slides in the already snow-covered districts, caused serious difficulty for the Great Northern Railway the last thirty-six hours and for the remainder of the day all Great Northern business will be detained over the Northern Pacific tracks.

Railroad men said today that the principal difficulty with the new snowfall is chargeable to the storm of February 2 to 14. Cuts ten to fifteen feet deep were made through the huge snow bank along the right-of-way and normal movement had begun under freighting conditions again when the new snowfall came. Forty-eight inches fell in thirty-six hours, followed immediately by rain which soaked through the new snow to the crust on the former fall, and permitted the more recent precipitation to slide down into the cuts. Partly work by rotary plows has cleared the larger part of the line, however, and it is expected that the route will be open for traffic again before tomorrow morning.

The Milwaukee line reported but little trouble last night and today, and all trains are running near to schedule. The maximum delay yesterday was seven hours. The Oregon-Washington line between Seattle and Portland has had no trouble as yet. Continued rains with moderate southerly winds is the official prediction of the United States weather bureau for the district. It is believed that, with continued high temperatures in the mountains, there will be no further snow troubles.

ASH WEDNESDAY TODAY; LENTEN SEASON OPENS

Observance of Period Foreshadowing Easteride Observed in Seattle Churches.

Observance of the Lenten season, foreshadowing the approach of Easteride, was begun in Seattle today—Ash Wednesday—at various Catholic and Episcopal churches. The Lenten period covers forty days and includes Palm Sunday, April 9; Good Friday, April 14; Easter Sunday, April 16.

At St. Mark's this morning holy communion was held at 7:30 o'clock, followed by morning service at 11 o'clock and 8 o'clock an evening service at 7:30.

At St. John's, West Seattle, the program for the day included: Penitential office with holy communion and singing of Stainer's "Miserere," 10 o'clock; 7:45 o'clock, vespers and address by the rector, the Rev. Maurice J. Bywater. After the vespers service tonight the vestry of the parish will hold its regular meeting.

During Lent and Holy Week the following women will assist at the organ: Mrs. J. D. Farmer, Mrs. Claude Stanley, Miss Helen Gardner and Miss Evelyn Forster.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Wednesday, March 8.—C. L. Dillon was instantly killed and his son, George Barrett, was probably fatally injured yesterday afternoon when an automobile in which they were riding was hit by an "extra" freight train on the Southern Pacific Railroad crossing at Grants Pass. Dillon came from Kansas three years ago. He was 85 years old. Barrett is from Fort Rupert, Idaho.
