





EAVY DAMAGES CLAIMED FOR JITNEY ACCIDENT

Catherine McDonald Asks for \$13,-100 From Owners and Pacific

lleging that she has suffered permatinjuries as a result of being struck a jitney bus, Mrs. Catherine Modald, 1006 East Denny Way, this ming brought suit in superior court \$13,100 damages against Mr. and s. J. A. Lawrence, owner of the bus,

and the Pacific Coast Casualty Company, which bonded it.

The complaint says Mrs. McDonald was hit by the Jitney, driven by H. F. Kruger, an employe of the defendants, April 18 last, at Broadway and East Denny Way, suffering serious bruises and a fracture of the femur bone, near the hip joint. She alleges the accident was due to a violation of the traffic laws by Kruger.

The plaintiff asks for a judgment of \$10,600 against the Lawrences and \$2,500, the amount the Jitney was bonded for, against the casualty company.

ON GERALD RAID

Sergt. V. R. Putnam Accuses Patrolman E. J. Margett With Attempting to Signal Proprietor—Charge Denied.

ier's desk in Gerald's Cafe Tuesday night when Patrolmen A. M. Frond, C. M. Peterson and C. V. Harvey, of the dry squad, entered the case Sergeant Putnam and Patrolmen J. O. Revelle and J. H. Bayli had previously entered the part of the establishment in which soft drinks were dispensed.

"When Patrolmen Margett saw Patrolman Peterson," said Sergeant Putnam, "be began signaling by flapping the lapel of his cout to the cafe cashier. Hencar of the establer's desk is a pushbutton connected with a bell in the rear of the restaurant by which warning could be given of any attempted raid. Patrolmen Peterson and Ford grabbed Patrolman Margett and a flight onsued, Margett resisted the officers and struck both Ford and Harvey, who other members of the squai."

While the officers were searching Gerald's, Sergeant Putnam declares, Margett came to him in the rear of the cafe and protested against the raid. Putnam declares he told Margett to "get out and quit interfering or I'll throw you in the patrol wagon."

Margett Reports to Chief.

After the occurrence at Gerald's Margett came to the police station and reported to Chief Beckingham. The chief says Margett told him that he had just finished a meal in Gerald's and was paying his check at the cashier's stand when the members of the dry squad entered. Ford, the chief says Margett told him, grabbed him and he resisted, not recognizing Ford as mosflicer. Margett admitted, the chief says, that he struck Ford and Harvey, but declared that he did so because he resented that the did so because he officers is held in abeyance by the absence of Margett from the city. After he had reported to Chief Beckingham. Margett asked leave of absence for several days because of tilness in his family. Lieut. C. E. Dolphin said today that Margett had gone to Oregon, where his relatives live. Margett's request for leave of absence was made of Chief Beckingham several days because of these was redered to the form of a statement to the chief that he expected that illness in his family would make it necessary for him to lay off for a few days.

Murgett Not in Uniform.

Margett was not in uniform, but was off shift and dressed in civilian clothes when the raid at Geraid's took place. Sergeant Putnam asserts that Margett habitually spent several hours of his leisure time each day in Geraid's cafe. "I have had three raids on Geraid's place planned before the one of Tuesday night," said Sergeant Putnam today, "and every one of them has been tipped off, Raids which we had planned for other places have been frustrated because members of the police department interfered. Now I am going down the line with these men who have been warning dry law violators of our intention and somebody is going to get punished."

Fixtures removed from Gerald's cafe yesterday are stored in the city garage where they will be held as evidence against Gerald. The liquor seized in the raid is at the public safety building and also will be held as evidence. Chief Beckingham said today that none of the liquor has been destroyed.

Two charges have been lodged against Gerald. One is under the city ordinance and charges him with violating the dry law. The second was filed yesterday in the superior court by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney T. H. Patterson, and accuses Gerald of having more than the legal quantity of liquor in his possession. Gerald is at liberty under \$1,000 bond.





"Gerald simply took good whiskey." said Sweek, "and by adding considerable water to it made it last much longer. Some of it had so much additional water that it must have been necessary to use coloring matter to make it resemble the real article."

Margett, according to Inspector M. T. Fowers, is one of the most efficient men on the police force. Powers gives Margett credit for breaking up, single handed, the notorious morphine ring which existed in Seattle several years ago. In a recent trial in the superior court, in which Margett was accused of defrauding Mrs. Maude James and her husband. Al James, out of an automobile and jewelry valued at several thousand dollars, the patrolman conducted his own defense and the jury acquitted him.
