HEAVY DAMAGES CLAIMED FOR JITNEY ACCIDENT

Catherine McDonald Asks for \$13,000 From Owners and Pacific Casualty Company.

Alleging that she has suffered permanent injuries as a result of being struck by a jitney bus, Mrs. Catherine McDonald, 1006 East Denny Way, this morning brought suit in superior court for \$13,000 damages against Mr. and J. A. Lawrence, owner of the bus,

and the Pacific Coast Casualty Company, which bonded it. The complaint says Mrs. McDonald was hit by the jitney, driven by H. P. Kruger, an employee of the defendant, April 18 last, at Broadway and East Denny Way, suffering serious bruises and a fracture of the femur bone, near the hip joint. She alleges the accident was due to a violation of the traffic laws by Kruger.

The plaintiff asks for a judgment of \$10,000 against the Lawrence and \$3,000, the amount the jitney was bonded for, against the casualty company.

POLICE IN FIST FIGHT OVER TIP ON GERALD RAID

Sergt. V. R. Putnam Accuses Patrolman E. J. Margett With Attempting to Signal Proprietor—Charge Denied.

ler's desk in Gerald's Cafe Tuesday night when Patrolman A. H. Ford, C. E. Peterson and C. V. Harvey, of the dry squad, entered the cafe. Sergeant Putnam and Patrolmen J. O. Reveille and J. H. Bayh had previously entered the part of the establishment in which soft drinks were dispensed.

"When Patrolman Margett saw Patrolman Peterson and myself," Putnam, "he began signaling by flapping the lapel of his coat to the cafe cashier. Beneath the cashier's desk is a push button connected with a bell in the rear of the restaurant by which warning could be given of an attempted raid. Patrolmen Peterson and Ford grabbed Patrolman Margett and a fight ensued. Margett resisted the officers and struck both Ford and Harvey, who came to the assistance of the two other members of the squad."

While the officers were searching Gerald's, Sergeant Putnam declares, Margett came to him in the rear of the cafe and protested against the raid. Putnam declares he told Margett to "get out and quit interfering or I'll throw you in the patrol wagon."

Margett Reports to Chief. After the occurrence at Gerald's Margett came to the police station and reported to Chief Beckingham. The chief says Margett told him that he had just finished a meal in Gerald's and was paying his check at the cashier's stand when the members of the dry squad entered. Ford, the chief says Margett told him, grabbed him and he resisted. Ford, the chief says, as an officer, Margett admitted, the chief says, that he struck Ford and Harvey, but declared that he did so because he resented the alleged attempts of the officers to search him.

Investigation of Sergeant Putnam's charges is held in abeyance by the absence of Margett from the city. After he had reported to Chief Beckingham, Margett asked leave of absence for several days because of illness in his family. Chief Beckingham said today that Margett had gone to Oregon, where his relatives live. Margett's request for leave of absence was made before the Gerald raid, in the form of a statement to the chief of police, that illness in his family would make it necessary for him to lay off for a few days.

Margett Not in Uniform. Margett was not in uniform, but was off shift and dressed in civilian clothes when the raid at Gerald's took place. Sergeant Putnam asserts that Margett habitually spent several hours of his leisure time each day in Gerald's cafe, and even one of them has been tipped off. Raids which we had planned for other places have been frustrated because members of the police department interfered. Now I am going down the line with these men who have been warning dry law violators of our intention and somebody is going to get punished."

Pictures removed from Gerald's cafe yesterday are stored in the city garage where they will be held as evidence against Gerald. 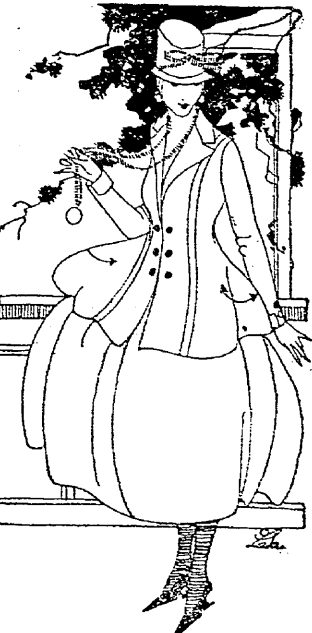

AMERICANS BARRED WHERE JAPANESE MAY ENTER

The police declare that much of the liquor found in the raid was concealed in secret hiding places. The barrels of beer, the police say, were found in a sub-basement and in a rooming house. Sergeant Putnam declares that he found in Gerald's cafe apparatus for the testing of whiskey and a thermometer, such as distillers use, showing the test which whiskey should undergo before it is bottled. The real article, he claims, is a standard grade. Nothing to indicate that any liquor had been manufactured on the premises was found, Putnam said.

Inspector Thad Sweek of the United States internal revenue service, who was present when the raid was made, said this morning that the barrels found at Gerald's were for the purpose of reducing the proof of the liquor on hand. "I found simply good whiskey," said Sweek, "and by adding considerable water to it made it last much longer. In a recent trial in the superior court, in which Margett was accused of defrauding Mrs. Maude James and her husband, Al James, out of an automobile and jewelry valued at several thousand dollars, the patrolman conducted his own defense and the jury acquitted him."

HE SOLD WHISKEY, GIVEN HEAVY FINE

J. J. Eckel, a clerk in Boyd's Pharmacy, 70 Union Street, yesterday was convicted of violating the liquor law and fined \$250 and costs by Judge J. T. Ronald. The superior court jury had previously found Eckel guilty of selling whiskey to thirty days in jail by a jury in Justice Otto Erickson's court. The sentence imposed on Eckel is the heaviest yet assessed in King County since prohibition became effective.

THINK OF IT, BEER IN CONFECTIONERY

Two barrels of beer and one of whiskey were seized by deputy sheriffs yesterday in a raid on the Walker Pharmacy and the Palace of Sweets, a confectionery, at Renton.

J. T. Viere, proprietor of the confectionery, and J. E. Walker, owner of the drug store, were arrested but released on recognizance.

SING SING MURDERER ATTEMPTS TO ESCAPE

Orestes Shillitani, Under Sentence of Death, Wounds Two Guards, but Is Captured in Hospital.

SING SING, N. Y., Thursday, June 22.—Orestes Shillitani, a convict who was sentenced to be executed June 30, shot and wounded two keepers in the state prison, escaped from the death house early today and fled to the Ossining hospital, where he was recaptured and taken back to prison.

AMERICANS BARRED WHERE JAPANESE MAY ENTER

Citizens of United States Cannot Get Hotel or Saloon Licenses in Vancouver, B. C.—Case of Nipponese.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Thursday, June 22.—The days of the American-born bartender and hotelier in British Columbia are numbered, but the Oriental will be permitted to hold his own working alongside British-born, thus forming a peculiar situation as brought out at the meeting of the license commission here last night.

A resolution had been passed making it impossible for Americans to obtain licenses here and a further resolution was all prepared aimed at Asiatic labor as well and ready to slide down the greased ways of the commission when Consul Abe of Japan, interfered. This did not seem to loosen up the feelings of the commission to any extent and the day was won for the Nipponese. It so happens, therefore, that Japanese may work in British Columbia where Americans may not.

WASHINGTON MEMBERS TO WORK FOR COAST SURVEY

C. B. Vandell Telegraphs From Capital That Congressmen From This State Are Pledged.

C. B. Vandell, executive secretary of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, telegraphed today from Washington, D. C., that as a result of the message sent by the chamber last week all members of the Washington delegation will work untiringly for the re-instatement of the sundry civil bill of the coast and geodetic survey appropriation, which has been stricken in committee.

Upon receiving advices last week from the national capital that provision for this item had been eliminated by the appropriations committee, the chamber at once communicated with Mr. Vandell, then in Washington, asking him to arrange with the Washington state delegation to seek to restore the appropriation on the floor. It provided for necessary charts, many of which cannot now be obtained by mariners going to sea. In addition to communicating with Mr. Vandell, the Seattle chamber likewise called upon the San Francisco and Portland Chambers of Commerce to join in a similar appeal to the legislature of the state.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR ELECT

LOS ANGELES, Thursday, June 22.—Lee S. Smith, of Pittsburg, was elected today grand master of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States at the thirty-third triennial convocation.
