RACE MINGLING NOT SOLUTION, SAYS DR. STARR

Japanese of Pacific Coast Should Not Be Made Over Into Americans, Asserts Chicago Anthropologist.

"The solution of the Oriental question on the Pacific Coast does not lie in mingling of races or the making over of Japanese into Americans," said Dr. Frederick Starr, professor of anthropology at the University of Chicago, today. Doctor Starr is in Seattle on his way to the Orient, where he will complete scientific investigations begun on former trips. He addressed the New Seattle Chamber of Commerce at noon today at The Butler at a luncheon given in his honor. He will make a number of addresses before leaving Seattle Friday.

"Racial differences are too deep-seated to be easily eliminated," said Doctor Starr. "It is not even that differences are not irreconcilable. Other ways of doing things may not need to be changed, but they may need to be changed. I believe a good Japanese is better than a Japanese aping an Englishman or American."

"The Japanese themselves are modernizing their country, but Japan is in no sense an Occidental nation. It is as much Japanese as it was two centuries ago. Therein lies its strength. If Japan were suddenly to become Occidental, I would believe that it was a bubble growth which would soon burst. It would have no future."

Forced to Make Changes.
"The Japanese have been forced to adopt some things from the Occident in order to change themselves from an inferior to a superior race. I do not believe they are as happy as they would have been without these changes, but any change necessary to protect themselves from extinction is justifiable."

Professor Starr will address the students of the University of Washington in Meany Hall at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, speaking at the University Club at luncheon tomorrow noon. He will sail Friday for Yokohama on the Yokohama Maru.

Long Active in Science.
Professor Starr was born in Auburn, N. Y., in 1858. He was graduated from Lafayette College in 1882, and received the degree of doctor of philosophy in 1885. He first offered a course in Japanese culture at the University of Chicago in 1893, and has repeated the course a number of times since. His work has taken him on numerous scientific expeditions, especially to Japan, Korea and the Congo. He prepared the Ainu group at the St. Louis exposition, and has been honored by decorations from several foreign governments, being a chevalier of the Order of the Crown of Italy, commander of the Order of Leopold II, and knight commander of the Order of African Redemption.

U. OF W. ENDORSES SURVEY'S REPORT

Unqualified approval of the work of the legislative educational survey commission, and a request that the commission's recommendations be enacted into law is embodied in the fourteenth biennial report of the University of Washington made public yesterday. In addition, the report asks for \$1,777,210 for running expenses and maintenance of the appropriation from tuition, matriculation fees and rentals amounting to \$262,000 for building purposes.

The recommendations are summarized in the report as follows:
That instruction in fisheries be inaugurated, that marine, aeronautical and graduate engineering be developed, that a ceramic expert be assistant be added to the college of mines.
For College of Commerce.
That a college of commerce be established with the necessary supporting subjects.
That the present medical preparatory courses be made efficient.
That provision be made for practice and observation facilities in connection with the college of education.
That forestry instruction be strengthened by the addition of a department of milling and marketing, and the negotiations with reference to the demonstration forest be carried out.
That additional library equipment be provided for the school of law.
That provision be made for the extension of the summer session to twelve weeks.

Support for Extension.
That the extension division be supported that its services may be brought to the assistance of larger numbers of the people of the state.
That the college of mines be enabled to cooperate with the U. S. bureau of mines in investigating the mining problems of the Northwest.
That the graduate school should be encouraged by allowance for more adequate research facilities.
That a forest products laboratory be provided and maintained.
That the Forest Sound marine station be developed.
That continuation of the building development be provided to relieve the classroom congestion and provide adequate quarters for military and physical training, and
That the bureau of industrial research be supported for the investigation of important industrial problems.

SUPREME COURT CUTS DOWN JAIL SENTENCE

Levitt County Attorney Must Spend Twenty-four Hours Behind Bars.

OLYMPIA, Wednesday, Jan. 3.—Twenty-four hours in jail instead of ninety days, and a fine of \$100 instead of \$200 are the punishments for all the contempt Attorney J. E. Willis offered Judge A. E. Rice, formerly superior court judge of Lewis County, the offense for which Willis was sentenced by Judge Rice last April was Willis' distribution of a pamphlet entitled "The Crimes and Misdemeanors of Hon. Alonzo E. Rice," in the court room at Chehalis when Judge Rice was presiding. The supreme court accepts without question Judge Rice's statement of the case, in which Willis is reported to have handed a copy of the pamphlet to an attorney in court, by whom, upon request of the court, the pamphlet was handed to the judge. The court was in session on another matter at the time, but Willis interrupted by exclaiming:
"If you have anything to say or do to me, do it, don't treat me like a dog on the court sending for the sheriff to preserve order. Willis left the court room, but was apprehended and summarily sentenced. The supreme court upholds summary punishment without trial for the offense of distributing the pamphlet in court and interrupting the court, but does not include publication of Lewis County Willis made in this category, as this did not happen in the presence of the court. Willis' conviction on being sentenced without trial.
Judge Rice was defeated for re-nomination in the last primary election.

FIGHT OVER BANK LOOT

A motion asking that the State Bank of Bothell be asked to state specifically what amount P. J. Dusky received from J. Rounds, Oscar Lowe and Walter McDonald, was filed in superior court yesterday by counsel for Dusky, who is accused of being an accessory after the fact in the alleged robbery of the bank by Rounds, Lowe and McDonald. The bank has been a civil action against all four men to recover funds stolen on the day of the robbery. Dusky's counsel also filed an application for an order quashing a writ of attachment obtained by the bank.
