

FIX RATE FOR NEW RUBLE

Exchange Plans at Forty to One Pound By British.

LONDON, Monday, Jan. 20.—Northern Russia's new ruble currency, that is, the currency arranged by the British government to assist the Archangel Provisional government in stabilizing finances, has a fixed rate of exchange of forty rubles to one pound. That places the ruble at six pence, roughly twelve cents in American money.

Exchange on the old rubles, both those issued under the imperial government, has been extremely unstable throughout the Bolshevilk regime in all parts of Russia. The distribution of money is uneven Money famines are constantly appearingin many sections, regardless of the fact that

E. M. Harvey, an English banker, has been named head of the bureau of the Archangel Provisional government intrusted with controlling the new rubles, At a later date agreements may be reached with American and French banks to keep deposits of francs and dollars and thus facilitate business between those countries and the Northern Russian government.

Open and Unfortified.

Archbishop Cerretti, Vatican Henry Morgenthau Declares Under Secretary of State, on Special Mission.

BRINGS POPE'S MESSAGE

NEW YORK, Monday, Jan. 20.—Archbishop Bonaventure Cerretti, papal undersecretary of state, and the highest Vatican official ever to visit the United States, arrived here yesterday on the transport Lapland. The Lapland carried 2.065 American solders and just before the steamship lieaded up the North River, the archbishop celebrated mass in the reading room, which was crowded with officers and enlisted men.

Archbishop Cerretti's mission to the United States has been a matter of speculation since it was announced last fall and it is said he is clothed with extraordinary authority. Before embarking the archbishop conferred with President Wilson in Paris. Interest in the visit is increased by belief that he brings with him the official announcement of the Pope's selection for a successor to the late Cardinal Farley as archbishop of New York.

Brings Message From Pope.

Archbishop Cerretti, through his secretary, the Rev. Dr. Roderick MacBachen of the Catholic University of Washington, gave out the statement that the holy father, when asked by the archbishop what he should say to the Americans, said:

"Tell them I love and adore them. Tell them that I love their ardor and spirit. Tell them that I am in full accord with their noble ideals and their high principles of freedom and justice!"

"In Paris I had the pleasure of meeting President Wilson," said the archbishop. "He was very kind and simple in his manner. As the European press said, it was a historic day when the head of the great American republic met the head of that old democratic institution founded by Christ nineteen centuries ago. America is looked upon today as the hope of the world. May God bless and prosper this good people."

NEW YORK, Monday, Jan. 20.—Asserting that almost every country in the world has "foolishly or selfishly helped to keep the Turk alive as a nation." Henry Morganthau, former ambassador to Turkey delared in an address here yesterday that the mistake of the past "in permitting Turke yto continue because of the balance of power," must not be made at the peace conference.

"The Dardanelles must remain open and unfortified." he said. "They are the great waterway between Asia and Africa and are as vital to commerce as the mouth of the Mississippi. "Turkish Mohammedan rule over Christian people must cease. These old nations now under Turkish misrule must have their rights restored.

"No district of the size of Turkey can remain ungoverned in the midst of civilized nations. Government for this is one of the tasks of the league of nations." Now that almost every nation in are now putting out emphasizes the fact that he has not said he would not be.

In point of personal popularity, he equaled and perhaps exceeded, the McKinley record. The two were alike in temperament. They made friends and held them. Like McKinley, Tatt had no animosities, no axes to grind. He approached every question with an open mind. took public men freely into his confidence and gave the impression all the time that he was sincerely anxious to do the right thing. It is perhaps not too much to say that of all the presidents he was the best mixer. More promptness in reaching decisions, both as to appointments and public policies, would have made him a great president. The public has his finely balanced mentality in mind when it refers to him as the best loser in the history of American politics. The reference, of course, is to 1912, when he carried only two small states. He accepted the result with a smile, said no bitter word about his fate, and when the time came retired from office with Rosecvelt.

His Breach With Rossevett.

He always regretted his falling out with Roosevelt, for which he was in nowise responsible. The breach would have been closed long before it was had Roosevelt been willing.

On the personal side he was thoroughly likable and lovable, and in strong contrast with Mr. Wilson, who is of the negative type represented in recent times by Benjamin Harrison and Grover Cleveland.

Taft left the White House somewhat discredited. Today he has a hold upon the popular mind that is stronger than it was at any time during his White House career. He is adviser to the whole people, and what he says is so just, so disinterested, so unmistakably prompted by a desire for the general good, that his influence on public affairs has become very great. He is a man of strong human sympathies, has a keen and accurate sense of fair play, has in him nothing of the typical partisan or political brawler, and in the presidency the country will not soon see his like again—unless he is given another term. He is being claimed by the Democrats, but it is apparent that he belongs to that party about as much as Persing belongs to the Republican party. Nobody knows the political inclinations of either, but the tendency is to tag them as noted.

Hoover and Pershing are far and away the two great successes of the war, regardless of what Senator Reed and his supporters think about the one, and Representative Gallivan and his kind of the other. If Pershing is a military success, Hoover is an even greater executive success. He has managerial ability of a wonderful sort and it was put to a thorough test during the war. Unlike Pershing, he worked under nobody, but made his own plans, and personally saw to their being carried out.

His success has been acclaimed not only in America, but throughout Europe. Even Germany, knowing how woll he looked after the famishing pople of Belgium, was anxious to have him take charge of her food problem. There can be no question about his possessing the kind of intellect and business ability which the country will need in the White House for a number of years to come.

Succeeds at Difficut Task.

No one could have had a more thankless, more difficult, but yet more important task than the one he was given by the President. Frankly, he expected that he would fail to come up to the popular expectations, but he made up nis mind that the work had to be done, and that he would if necessary, become a martyr in doing it. Probably nobody was more surprised than he at the degree of success which was attained. He knew all the time that his plans were workable, but there was always the danger that, in the disorganization of war, the details would fall into the hands of incompetents. He had to deal with such help as he could get, and was seldom in position to select the best.

He was born in Iowa in 1874, and after graduating from the Leland Stanford Engineering School in 1895, spent two years in geological surveys and mining in the Southwest states, and then went to Australia as chief of the mining staff of the large interests. In 1899 he was chief engineer of the Chinese Imperial Bureau of Mines, and the next year took part in the defense of Eight and the part of Mines, and the next year took part in the defense of Tientsin during the Boxer uprising.

He remained in China until 1902, when he went to London as partner in a large mining ecrporation, which was his work when the war began. He acted first as chairman of the American Relief to In 1915, as food administrator in 1917, and is now at the head of the movement to feed the starving millions of Europe. In addition to these activities, he has found time for authorship, and has written numerous technical articles and books. None of the President's war appointed a criticism and shuse. thinking of himself, his limity of his village.

"Today the peasants will fight the Bolshevist bands for their homes and villages. They will organize and capture them and then want to quit. These villages. They will organize and capture them and then want to quit. These villages are separated by miles of forest and are separate as far as vision and responsibility go. These masses want peace, food and education. In the different villages there are 15 per cent of city dwellers. Here the pot of unrest from a thousand and one political ideas is constantly boiling over. The fire of newly-found freedom keeps going and no one can put the fire out.

Even in Archangel, with the Allies protecting it, there is a constant unrest, with political trouble browing. This is a proof of what is going on all over the country. No number of bayonets can stop it. Political Bolshevism is an expression of this new thing.

"Political Bolshevism." were the words of one who gave his life for the revolutionary cause. "It is not a movement but a mood."

Bolshevism or any other single political belief is a minor thing compared to the mood of the Russian caused by the reaction against the older regime.

Greatest Lesson Learned. from first hand study of the Russian problem. Bolshevism is only an expression of this radicalism that must run its course. The only possible correct solution of the political problems must come from within the nation. All the outside world can hope to do is to knew how to physically assist Russia in materiel ways and not how to change or dictate the political government.

ment.

It is evident that much can and must be done to help Russia. The railroads are in a pitiful condition, factory machinery is worn and farm machinery is used up. Russia has need of a commercial adviser and financial help. The question men have at heart are these things and they are asking how to do this. this.

By force in an upsetting of the Moscow government, or by conciliatory methods?

methods?
Some say that the Powers should talk to the Bolsheviki and reach an agreement whereby peace and justice may be restored and Russia united. These people believe that many misunderstandings and exaggerations would be wiped out when the facts are known.

Others think the best way to accomplish their end in helping Russia is to intervene immediately with large bodies of troops and food and knock out the present government and see to it that an elective government is set up and peace restored to all classes and districts.

It is evident that the radical mood of Russia must be understood and the fact recognized that no killing off of the men who dominate the present extremist movement can stop the spread of radicalism within Russia.

From a thousand opinions, viewpoints and beliefs that converge here in this hatbed of uncertainty there are two clear conclusions that everyone recognizes, that the Allies must come with troops, food and fairness or get out and find a way to help Russia except with bayonets.

### AUSTRALIA HAS TROUBLES L W. W. Hampered War Work, De-

clares Antipodes Farmer.

Labor trouble and L W. W. nuisances are the serious questions how confronting Australia, according to the belief of Thomas Miller, an English farmer of Queensland, Australia, who arrived in Seattle yesterday on the Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Kamo Maru.

"Even during the war our labor was discouraging." Miller said; "and organized labor seemed to take ah unfair and unparticitic advantage of the hard conditions brought about through the war. Strikes were ordered frequently when the help was most needed and, with the I. W. W., the laboring men at home appeared to prefer hindering to helping. At present, while the labor organizations do not openly claim to be associated with the I. W. W., they certainly pull together rather openly.

"Australia sent 400,000 men across seas to fight and of this number possibly 250,000 men will return fairly or completely fit in health and body. I believe that when they get home the I. W. W. movement will find a stronger opposition than has been possible to present before and it is not improbable that some rather harsh methods will be called into play in order to restore the labor situation in a sensible and fair way."
