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LEADER OF LABOR WINS HIGH PRAISE

Head of American Federation Declared to Be Wilson's Chief-Aid in Crisis.

CIVILIZATION AT STAKE IN PEACE PACT

Critics of Covenant Fail to Supply Plan to Replace It, Says British Expert.

NEW YORK, Saturday, April 12.—In no country is opinion today unanimous on the question of the wisdom of establishing a League of Nations. It would be very surprising if it were for, though the conception which is embodied in the league is by no means new, it is only in the last few months that it has entered into the realm of practical politics.

Until the fiery trial through which the old world has just passed had changed the whole outlook of the peoples of Europe, those who advocated international cooperation and the submissions of international differences to arbitration were regarded as well meaning and harmless idealists on a par with the advocates of the brotherhood of man.

The world has long been accustomed to the advocacy of ideals by those who are sincerely convinced that they are desirable and are the practical difficulties in the way of their realization. It has shrugged its shoulders and gone about its business leaving the idealists to talk in their societies and at their meetings.

Now it suddenly finds itself face to face with an entirely new state of affairs. The advocates of peace are no longer irresponsible philanthropists but are to be found among the leading statesmen of every country, men charged with the practical administration of the world's affairs.

LOYD GEORGE IN DIPLOMATIC DUEL WITH PRESIDENT

By Frank H. Simonds, Notes Military Critic. Special The Times. PARIS, Saturday, April 12.—After a week of profound pessimism the Paris conference has entered one of those brief periods of optimism which the familiar prophesy of prompt agreement upon peace terms is to be heard in many quarters.

What has brought this startling change about? It is the realization that the peace of the world is the responsibility of the government of peoples of the world. It is an age-old truth which the last four and one-half years they have again and again seen in the face of the world.

Most Eager Destruction. Thinking over these facts practical statesmen have come to the conclusion that if human activity is to continue on these lines the end must be the destruction of that civilization which they are charged to foster.

AMENDMENT TO COVENANT LACKS VOTES

League of Nations Commission Gives Out Statement Explaining Its Attitude.

PARIS, Saturday, April 12.—The League of Nations commission has found it impossible to adopt the Japanese amendment to the covenant calling for the expression of the equality of nations. The discussion of the matter at the meeting of the commission last night developed some favor for the Japanese proposal, but the amendment failed to meet with unanimous approval.

At a meeting of the League of Nations commission on Friday, April 11, the Japanese delegation proposed an amendment to the preamble of the covenant of the League of Nations as follows: "To insert after the words 'by the prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations' an additional clause to read, 'by the endorsement of the principle of the equality of nations and just treatment of their nationals.'"

The amendment was admirably presented by Baron Makino, head of the Japanese peace delegation. In the course of his speech he emphasized the great desire of the Japanese government and of the Japanese people to see the League of Nations recognized in the covenant.

The discussion was marked by the high quality of thought and sympathetic exchange of opinion, and a complete appreciation by the members of the commission of the difficulties which lay in the way of either accepting or rejecting the amendment.

The commission was impressed by the justice of the Japanese claim and by the spirit in which it was presented. Mention was frequently made in the course of the discussion of the fact that the covenant provided for the representation of Japan on the executive council as one of the great powers and that a rejection of the proposed amendment would therefore never be construed as diminishing the prestige of Japan.

(Continued From Page One.) America a league of nations treaty so amended as to satisfy objections made by Republican senators.

Above all it was essential that he should persuade his associates in Paris to consent to modify the covenant of the league of nations in such terms as would extend the Monroe Doctrine from its operation.

This offered Lloyd George a chance which he would not have had if Mr. Wilson had not been informed that Great Britain found serious difficulties in the matter of extending the league of nations to conform to Mr. Wilson's application of American criticism.

Reduced to its simplest terms, the British premier declared that he had no objection in the way of giving his consent to the necessary amendments to the President's proposals in America, while Mr. Wilson remained obdurate in the matter of extending the vital alliance to Lloyd George and Clemenceau in their own constituencies.

Prepared for Move. Mr. Wilson was entirely unprepared for the Lloyd George move. When it came his first reaction was to send a message to George Washington.

We have had then, one of the most striking and dramatic diplomatic duels of the Paris conference. It has been recalled that on an historic occasion the British premier and Mr. Wilson seemed to appreciate the Anglo-American attitude in the matter of reparations, there was a growing possibility of the part of Lloyd George to understand and accept Mr. Wilson's view about the Monroe Doctrine and the covenant of the league of nations.

Necessity for Compromise. I do not think Mr. Wilson's demand for the George Washington has hastened the agreement on the terms of peace, but it is an argument that has been between Lloyd George and Mr. Wilson has led to a sudden recognition of the high sides of the necessity of compromise.

It does not seem to be the British policy to force any break with the United States. On the contrary there is every reason to believe that we shall have a restoration of concord in the near future, but it is not less clear that reaction in Parliament and in the British press will probably react against a temporary break with the President, which led the President to his present position.

We have had two gestures. We are having, it would seem, a compromise now between statesmen who have to resort to gestures to impress each other and the world. This would insure for the new Polish state an outlet upon the Baltic.
