PHILAN WARNS OF JAPANESE MENACE

Senator Says Orientals Are
Rapidly Acquiring Land by
Evading Statute.

MAY BECOME LAWMAKERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Friday, April 18.—United States Senator James D. Phelan, in addressing the members of several organizations of the Pacific Hotel yesterday, took occasion to emphasize the menace which he says exists in the constant, silent movement of Japanese into California. Senator Phelan stated that his campaign to keep the Japanese from getting a firmer hold in California would be relaxed.

Senator Phelan also spoke at length on the League of Nations, his hope for early permanent peace, the creation of a great mercantile marine, and problems of the future. He said, however, the most vital to the Pacific Coast is the Japanese invasion. He said:

"It is impossible for those people who do not live in California or New Zealand to appreciate the situation in California today. I have taken the position that it is our duty to inform the people that it is a menace of national importance."

All States Exposed.
"No state can be invaded by an enemy without all states being exposed to the same menace."

"The Chinese were willing to work for wages, while the Japanese want to cultivate the land for themselves. Hawaii floats the American flag and is the Japanese goal. There are possibly 100,000 Japanese in the whole of the Hawaiian Islands. The Hawaiian Islands are in no true sense a part of the American territory."

"In a very few years the sons and daughters of the Japanese will control the vote and you will see a Japanese legislature in Hawaii. Are you going to permit the same thing in California? The soil is everything. The crops come from the soil and give employment to the farmer, the raw products necessary to give work in the various occupations come from the soil. The basis of our wealth, our taxation, rests on the soil."

Evade Land Law.
We passed a law in 1913 prohibiting the sale of land to Japanese. They have evaded this law by leasing and by taking the land in the names of their children born here. Their birth rate has grown at a tremendous rate. They are coming in over the Mexican border where there is no adequate protection. When there was an undue number the federal authorities caught eighty in one day. Notwithstanding the vigilance on the part of the government, they are coming."

Driving the White Men Out.
We must take great precaution to prevent these people from taking our land. They are preventing our own people from acquiring and improving the land. The race of the white man in California will deteriorate, because they are driving them out. The league of nations has not given the Japanese the immigration rights they expected to get at the Versailles conference. And one of the valuable lessons which we have taught the Orientals is that this great, soft, untrained nation had the stamina and the ability to rise to heroic deeds in the hour of trial. They did not think we would or could do it. The lesson has been most wholesome one for the Oriental to learn."

IN SAN FRANCISCO

Apartment House Owners
Tilt Rates When Valley
Residents Flock to City.

BUILDING TAKES SPURT

SAN FRANCISCO, Friday, April 18.—Due to the great influx to California of tourists and the large number of workers employed in local industries, San Francisco, as well as other cities around the bay, is experiencing a shortage in apartments as well as hotel accommodations.

The shortage applies more to the transients rather than to permanent residents and there is ample accommodation in the way of flats and cottages.

For several months local hotels have not been able to accommodate tourists and several of the larger hostels have been sending applicants across the bay. So great has been the demand for hotel accommodations on this side of the bay, it has been next to impossible to obtain quarters unless reservations were made several days in advance.

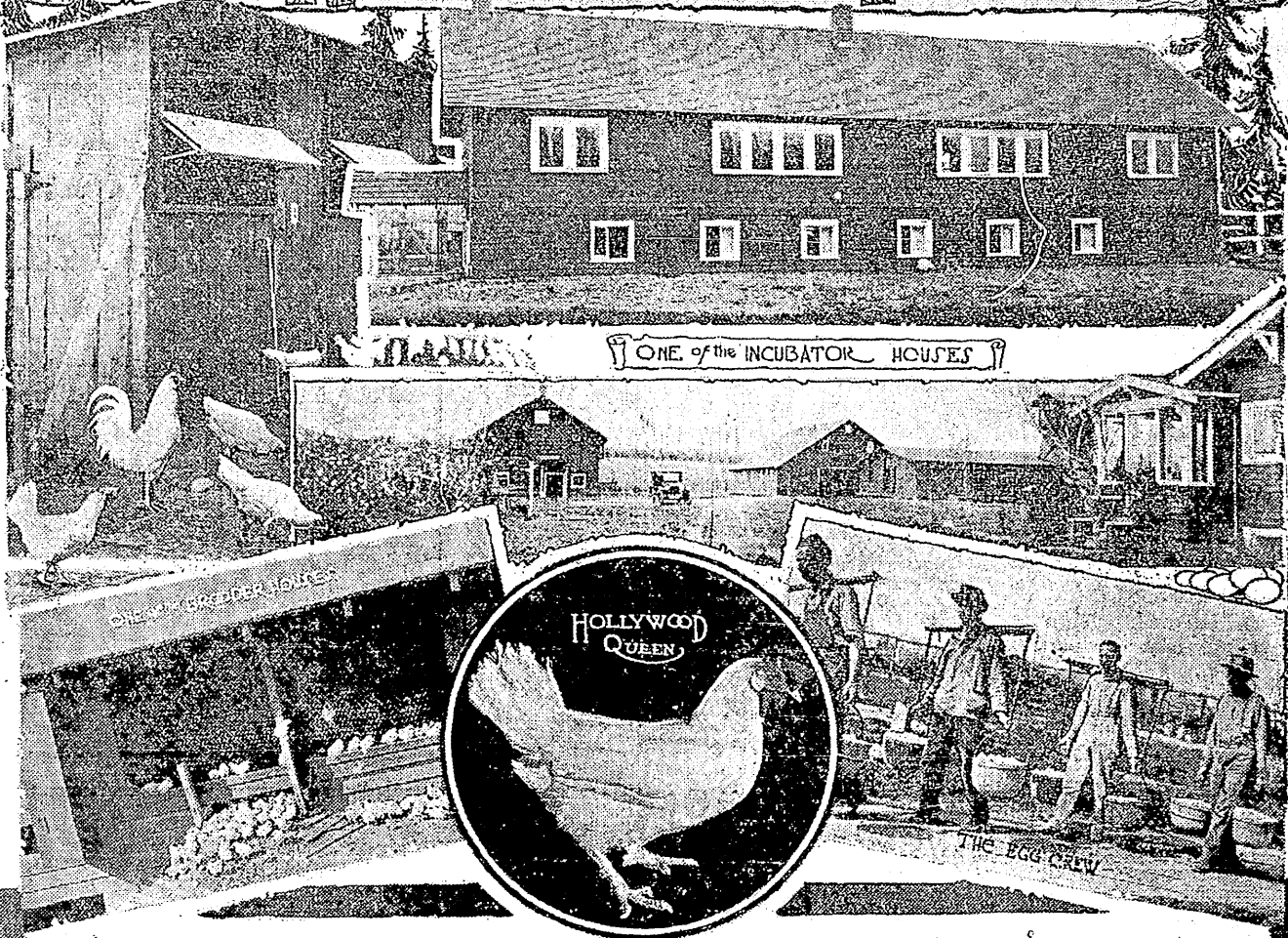
Advance Their Rents.
Apartment-house owners have advanced their rents about 10 per cent since January, 1918, and until a few weeks ago it was practically impossible to get an apartment in the downtown district. Every apartment house owner has a waiting list as fast as there is a vacancy there are a dozen applicants for the apartment.

This condition applies almost exclusively to the downtown section. Apartments farther out are available and rents are only a trifle higher than they were a year ago.

So far as he has heard there has been no agreement between apartment-house owners to boost rents, although several months ago there was talk of the owners getting together for the purpose of increasing rents. The movement never materialized, so far as the public has been able to learn.

San Francisco, noted for its modern office buildings, is not experiencing any noticeable crowding of office ten-

Egg Production at HOLLYWOOD FARM.



THE success of the Poultry Department of Hollywood Farm is due to the breeding of its White Leghorn Hens, proper housing conditions, correct feeding, and the extreme cleanliness that exists everywhere.

The question of "when is an egg more than an egg?" is quite easily answered. Only a very few people bother themselves about the egg supply, little realizing that the feeding and care of the hen is directly responsible for the quality of the egg. Carefully selected, wholesome, well-balanced rations, clean-running water, proper care and exercise are all as necessary as freshness to determine egg quality.

The five large laying houses at Hollywood are electric lighted, and when the short, dark days of Winter season approach it makes no difference in the activity of the Hollywood hen—she keeps the same hours month in and month out, and egg production suffers but little with the changing seasons.

When the baby White Leghorn chicks reach maturity and are ready for the laying houses, each one is given an individual number, and by trapezing the record of every hen is kept for the entire season.

In the various national contests in which Hollywood hens have en-

tered they have taken first place, and the Farm has already produced a number of record-breaking hens.

Hollywood eggs are gathered every afternoon by the egg crew, and they are immediately packed for transportation to the city store at Westlake and Pine, and the eggs we sell today were laid yesterday. As an extra precaution, every Hollywood egg is candled after it reaches the store before it is placed on sale.

Those who use Hollywood eggs know that they are sold on absolute guarantee of freshness and quality, and this short story should tend to emphasize just exactly what is meant by this guarantee.

Building operations here since the signing of the armistice have shown a decided spurt. This applies mainly to homes, and every day there are large numbers of building permits issued for the building of homes. During the spring and summer there is always a scarcity of apartments in and around San Francisco, due to the influx of people from the valleys of the state coming here for the warm months. Many residents from the interior of the state have already taken up their summer residence here, and as there are practically no new apartments under construction, there will be a scarcity until the transients return to their homes in the fall.

MAY END PHONE STRIKE

Postmaster General Takes Action That May Mean Settlement.

WASHINGTON, Friday, April 18.—Basis for settlement of the strike of telephone operators and allied workers in New England, which has paralyzed telephone service since Tuesday, was believed by officials last night to have been reached.

Postmaster-General Burleson yesterday forwarded to General Manager of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company the demands of the striking operators with instructions to hear the employees either individually or collectively upon receiving assurance that they would return to work immediately. This action was considered as forming a basis for agreement. Postmaster-General Burleson had announced that action would be taken by the wire board on the general manager's recommendations on or before May 10.

MAY AVERT BIG STRIKE

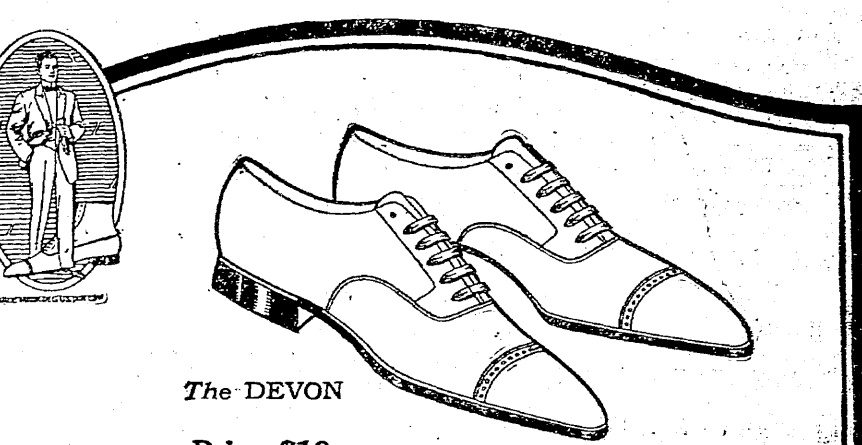
NEW YORK, Friday, April 18.—A new offer designed to avert the threatened general strike of 16,000 New York harbor workers was made by officials of the Maritime Workers' Affiliation yesterday at a conference with private boat owners and government officials arranged by James L. Hughes, federal mediator.

The offer, on which private owners will act today, called for an immediate return to work of all union men now on strike under a thirty-day temporary arrangement, with arbitration of the wages and hour issues before a board of nine, four members to be appointed by the union, four

of the owners and one by the eight so appointed.

I believe my daughter must have fallen into bad company. Her action is particularly unfortunate at this present moment when her sister Crystal has been nominated as a candidate for Parliament from the Abbey division of Westminster.

"In a word," concluded Mamma Pankhurst, "some miscreants have been abusing Sylvia's artistic temperament."
