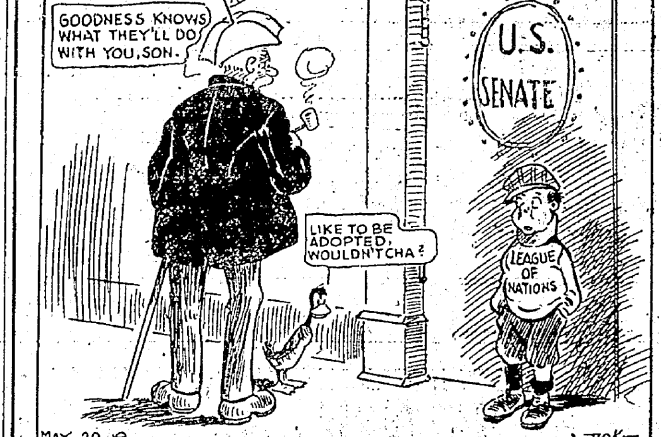

Sultan's Lost Skull Wins Fame Named in Treaty; Proves Puzzle

Experts Baffled in Efforts to Run Down Antecedents of Potentate Okwawa Who Was Wronged by the Huns in Africa.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Tuesday, May 20.—The Sultan of Okwawa and his lost skull still constitute one of the official Washington. Scores of scientific sleuths are on the trail—rather on a bone and a few feathers. Officially clues have been found, and for a few hours there have been rejoicings in scientific circles that the mystery pertaining to the dome of the Sultan of Okwawa, since purely was about to be solved. But these intangible threads invariably have been snatched out from under the feet of the sleuths as such a mystery as ever.

STATE WITNESSES RECEIVE THREATS POLISH FORCES CRUSH UKRAINIANS
