



Murphine and Case Fear Parking Facilities Will Be Eaten Up by Permits.

That the abuse of the zone privilege

That the abuse of the zone privilege provided for by the new traffic code may result in possible injury to interests in the business district was a statement included in a report to the Board of Public Works today by C. R. Case and Thomas. F. Murphine, who were authorized by the board to receive applications for the establishment of commercial zones and automobile stands.

Under authority of the traffic ordinance, every office building in the downtown business district where the parking of automobiles is limited to a period of half an hour, every office with a main entrance may apply for a commercial zone of forty feet in front of the entrance to be kept clear or vehicles loading or unloading and would exclude other automobiles from stopping there.

The committee expresses the belief that there will be such a demand for these zones that the parking privilege downtown will be seriously affected. The fear is expressed that there may be an abuse of the zone privilege that will "result in possible injury to the business district, as we believe many people will seek other places to transact business and will go where they can find room to park their cars."
