EPISCOPALIAN PRAYERS REVISED

Changes to Which Opposition Was Stern Dropped; Two Petitions for President.

SOME LEFT TO 1922 MEET

DETROIT, Friday, Oct. 24.—Nearing the close of its sessions, which end today, the formal general convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church yesterday made rapid progress in clearing its business program. Revision of the prayer book was completed as far as urged by the revision commission, which refrained from pushing proposals for changes to which stern opposition developed. Amendment of the communion service was among the changes not attempted.

Business Men in Campaign. A group of business and church men was selected to direct the nationwide canvass of the church membership in October and December. The aim is to qualify the church to meet problems of reconstruction, considerable part of the program being to overcome social unrest and to Americanize aliens. Expansion in all mission fields also is contemplated.

Bishop Keator Named. The house of bishops accepted, with a minor amendment, the amendments to the constitution proposed in the house of deputies to open the way to ordination of ministers of other denominations. Final action is expected in 1922.

Right Rev. Thomas Garland, suffragan bishop of Pennsylvania, declined election as missionary bishop to Utah.

JAPANESE HIRE YANKEES

Baron Goto Says California Rice Growers Pay High Wages.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 24.—Baron S. Goto, former Japanese minister of foreign affairs, rested in Sacramento after a visit to the rice fields of the Sacramento valley where many Japanese reside.

"I find in the rice fields Japanese employers are hiring American help and paying the highest wages," Baron Goto said.

"They seem to be on the best of terms with each other." The Japanese, the baron continued, have played an important part in the development of California during the last decade.

"When an immigrant arrives, no matter whether he is of Japanese or

any other nationality, he is compelled to work harder and live more economically than the American in order to get a start."

Montana Snow Storm Continues. BUTTE, Mont., Friday, Oct. 24.—The storm which began Wednesday throughout the mountain range section surrounding Butte, still is in progress with light snow falling. The fall in Butte now equals six inches, while in the mountain peaks it is much heavier.

State Control of British Railroads.
