

Control of Epidemic Necessary if Fight Against White Plague Is to Win.

ST. LOUIS, Friday, April 23.— Medical science must develop some method of exterminating or controlling influenza, if the fight against tuberculosis is to be successful, ac-

tuberculosis is to be successful, according to speakers at the annual convention of the National Tuberculosis Association here today.

Examination of post-influenza cases, it was asserted, develop that sixty-five per cent were infected with the tubercle bacilli.

Great headway could be made in checking the spread of tuberculosis if employers would realize the value of having their employes undergo examination, according to Dr. John S.

Billings, director of the New York Tuberculosis Association. Many cases are in that way detected in the inciplent stage and proper attention effects a complete cure.

Banker Discusses Advertising Methods for Promoting Larger Savings.

BOSTON, Friday, April 22.—Raymond R. Frazier, president of the Washington Mutual Savings Bank of Seattle, delivered an address before a national conference of savings bankers today in the Boston City Club. His subject was "What is the Best Publicity and Advertising for Encouraging Savings and for Promoting Good Will." His speech, in part, was as follows:

"The best kind of advertising for encouraging savings is the printed or spoken message which rings with sincerity and carries conviction to the person addressed. A plain message, plainly spoken, without elaborate message, plainly spoken, without elaborate membellishment of pictures and fancy borders, is what brings the business. A pretty advertisement with pretty words about as important of the pression is therefore important. Exclamation points should rarely be employed.

Apostle's Style Recommended.

"Saint Paul the apostle, if he were living today, would have a wonderful opportunity in the field of advertising. There was vibrant power in everything this great apostle said to his fellow men, and his words were so clear, forceful and convincing that they have come thundering down through the centuries, apparently without loss of power, and all of us, whether we admit it or not, are influenced in our daily lives by his utterances. This is proved by the fact that we are all constantly quoting, often unconsciously, from the speeches and letters of Saint Paul, the apostle.

"My theory of advertising is that if you believe in your business and earnestness into your written nessages as you do into your spoken words, the success of your publicity work is assured."

## ARMY TO X-RAY AIRMAN'S HEART

Schroeder, Who Made Altitude Record, Ordered to Submit to Examination.

BEATS WILL BE SHOWN

MINEOLA, N. Y., Friday, April 23.—
Maj. R. W. Schroeder, holder of the world's airplane altitude record, reported at Mitchel flying field yes-terday on orders of the War Depart-ment directing him to submit to a physical examination to determine if

physical examination to determine if flying has affected his heart.

Major Schroeder said he was not disturbed by what the examination might disclose, atthough it had been runored flying at a high altitude had caused enlargement of his heart. He said his heart beats "speeded up" at times, "but always became normal again."

The major's heart beats will be electrically photographed by Maj. L. H. Bauer, in charge of laboratory at the field.

The commission has the duty of drawing a statute for presentation to the next Legislature providing an alternative for strikes and disputes.

Organized labor in Canada is opposed to the act, declaring that it is impracticable while officers of the Department of Labor assert it has been successful.
