BIG CROWDS HEAR HARDING'S VIEWS

Forceful Plea for Economy and Explanation of Republican Policies Cheered.

WELCOME IS VOCIFEROUS

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Wednesday, Sept. 23.—Speaking to a tumultuous crowd which packed the Wheeling Auditorium while the speaker battled in the streets for admission, Senator Warren C. Harding laid down here last night his program of government economy and strict business administration.

From the time of arrival here in the early afternoon the Republican nominee was besieged by howling throngs, and during the hour he addressed his words again and again weakened avouches of applause.

So dense and tumultuous was the crowd along the line from the senator's hotel to the Auditorium that both his car and the speaker were lost for a time in the throng. Mrs. Harding reached the hall first and was given an ovation as she passed through crowded aisles to the platform.

When the nominee arrived the crowd rose and cheered for more than a minute.

Denounces Boss Government.

Previously Senator Harding had made a short talk denouncing one-man government before a massing of many thousands who blocked the streets about the hotel, and earlier in the day he spoke to five crowds that gathered around his private car as it came across West Virginia.

Senator Harding's Auditorium audience which he had preferred the front porch campaign.

"It wasn't my desire to come to you and preach the gospel of Americanism from the Republican platform," he said. "I have been doing that all my life; that's why I'm a Republican. But I don't want to speak from the front porch over at Marion for the very reason that I have encountered in a western town. I don't like to disappoint any one. When I come to your city I find the time of Republicanism is over and there are 30,000 people in Wheeling who want to hear the gospel of Americanism. I don't want to disappoint you."

One thing he could do virtually all of the American people through the medium of the great American press.

Put Own House in Order.

"I think the American people have heard—I know they have heard in the past—I think they have heard everywhere and have resolved we ought to do two things: First, to put our own house in order. Second, to speak for the world which we can manage our own affairs."

Denouncing Democratic extravagance and mismanagement he brought the nation's attention to the financial disaster, Senator Harding said that the Republican party proposed to inaugurate a program of economy and efficiency that would put the whole federal government on a sound business basis.

The nominee quoted Treasury Department figures to support his charge of unparliamentary expenditure and asserted that one effect of the administration's proposed program would be to further handicap the money market and increase the cost of borrowing.

He scored President Wilson for his veto of the budget bill passed by the last Republican administration, and promised that a budget system would be one of the first policies inaugurated by a new Republican administration.

Must Check Waste.

"Unless we check the existing system of unparliamentary expenditure," he continued, "we shall run head on into disaster. We have heard during the past few days that the Democratic administration at Washington that it needs money. more money, more money. And during the same days we have heard from a Democratic administration that it is electing to the presidency he will give to the people of this country a budget system that will check the waste."

Senator Harding said the public debt had increased from \$24,295,321.47 June 30, 1913, to \$34,520,221.21, and that the deficit for the last year would have been nearer three billions than the deficit for the year 1919. He said that down administration requests for appropriations.

As an illustration of financial inefficiency he quoted Brig. Gen. H. M. Lord, director of finance of the War Department as saying that the department went into the war without a cent of money, and that the result that a dozen bureaus were competing in purchases and driving prices up.

Referring to the proposal for a new treasury certificate issue, he said that the administration's method of financing its war was a serious consequence.

Increases Cost of Living.

"It is obvious to the eyes of the United States offers 5% and 6 per cent for money, the effect of which is to drive up the interest rates on industrial and business loans, and to drive up the cost of living."

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AMERICAN LEGION AGAINST JAPANESE

Rigorous Exclusion of Immigrants Advocated in Resolution at Cleveland.

By Associated Press. CLEVELAND, Wednesday, Sept. 23.—The report of the committee on Americanism of the American Legion in its second annual convention here today recommended the cancellation of the so-called gentlemen's agreement with Japan, excluding of picture brides and rigorous exclusion of Japanese as immigrants.

The report recommended that "we enter a vigorous protest against the demand for the naturalization of rights be granted to its nationals now in the United States and that we Americanize the Japanese."

The chair announced that balloting for election of officers would start by 3 p. m.

The report of the committee on disabled soldiers affecting the resolution and adopted. The committee's report recommended that Congress be urged to consider matters of legislation for the benefit of sick and disabled former service persons before their legislative session convenes.

The committee also recommended that all prisoners of war be granted a \$100 a month, plus sums now authorized for their dependents.

The committee on publicity's report was read and adopted. It recommended that the names of former service men in connection with crime.
