**TAXES HIT AUTO MEN**

IMPOSTS OF \$1,705,000 ADDITIONAL FEARED.

Levy for Policing of Roads, on Gasoline Sales and Drivers' License Proposed.

OLYMPIA, Wednesday, Feb. 16.—Unless an immediate halt is called by the owners of the 180,000 privately owned automobiles of this state the present Legislature, before it meets in regular session, will levy a tax of \$1,705,000, automobile men here are predicting in addition to the taxes now paid.

Representatives at the capital of the Automobile Club of Western Washington, the Washington Automobile Club, the Motor Car Dealers Association of Seattle have statistics of private cars, gasoline consumption and taxes paid and from these they compute the additional tax to be exacted from one-tenth approximately of the state's population by bills passed and the legislature and being whipped into shape for introduction.

On the basis of a normal increase in the number of car owners this year, the automobile men declare that the state will collect \$1,705,000 more in taxes than it is entitled to by reason of the fact that each owner's license fee is \$2.25, \$2.25 more than the \$2.00 which was the rate at the beginning of the automobile year from March 1 to January 1, 1921. The increase in license fees is \$2,250,000. The proposed 1-cent gasoline tax, \$655,000. Total, \$1,705,000.

Representative J. C. Hubbell, chairman of the House roads and bridges committee, has the first draft of a bill that would put a tax of \$1 on private drivers of automobiles and \$3 on chauffeurs. If five members of one family drive one car each must have a license for the automobile. This would yield at least \$200,000 a year, Hubbell says he expects to have a license for the automobile men to get around the interstate commerce law. The attorney general is assisting with that problem. The idea of the legislators is it is possible to collect the tax from the consumer through the oil and gasoline stations.

It was said today that automobile men from all over the state will be in Olympia tomorrow evening to determine what course to pursue in their attempt to ward off the blow. Without counting the four additional taxes impending the representatives of the automobile men contend that the Washington man who owns a car today has already had passed a \$1000 tax.

**LOGGERS ASK CHANGES**

**ATTACK INCREASING COST OF INSURANCE LAW.**

Changes in Compensation Act Discussed by Coal Men and Laundry Operators.

OLYMPIA, Wednesday, Feb. 16.—Three bills amending the industrial insurance commission laws, after a second public hearing Friday evening, will be reported out to the House Saturday, it was announced at a hearing last night before the Senate and House industrial insurance committees.

Employers representing the lumber and logging, coal mining and laundry industries, the chairman of the industrial insurance committee, a member of the board of medical aid, men who assisted in the investigation, organized labor, and members of the legislative committees were present for the hearing. The bills amend and repeal sections of the workers' compensation act, the medical aid law and the safety law, which are administered by the industrial insurance commission.

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Briefly, the bills provide: H. B. 177, by Representative Mark E. Reed of Mason, chairing the industrial insurance committee—Act to dispense with classification of industries, to consolidate all class funds into a single fund and to establish the merit system in plants with the compensation assessment to fluctuate with the accidents, to place a premium on safety precautions.

H. B. 178, by Representative Reed—Act to bring the industrial insurance Commission under the Department of Labor and Industries created by the new civil administration code.

H. B. 179, by Representative Adam Beeler of King—Act to increase compensation 50 per cent. Employers in the lumber industry, pertaining to the increase in their assessments for industrial insurance commissions, in the case of a logging company from \$5.10 per capita for 1911, the year the industrial insurance act went into effect to \$7.65 per capita for 1920, opposed the additional compensation on the ground that their industry could not bear a greater burden.

Called Down by Reed.

Chairman Reed, in the words of Representative Reed, presiding, who interrupted the speaker, was not interested in that subject.

Chairman Reed read a letter from J. J. Donovan, Gellingham, Wash., which stated that his company had paid \$134,319 to the industrial insurance commission in the last year. Unless the costs are decreased, Mr. Donovan's letter said, the company would be forced to close.

Loggers Ask Hard Hit.
