EDITORIAL

INAUGURATION IS MOST SIGNIFICANT POLITICAL EVENT.

AMERICA'S most momentous political event is not the election of a President but his inauguration into office.

Every four or eight years, on the fourth day of March, a private citizen and the President of the United States ride to the Capitol.

A short time later, these two customarily ride back—their roles reversed.

Ho, that had been the most powerful ruler in the world a few moments before, again has become a private citizen.

The private citizen of another hour has become the Chief Executive of the United States, wielding greater authority than any crowned king of our day.

Other nations have named their chief executive officer by ballot. There is nothing new in this.

But there is something novel in these recurring transfers of power from man to man, administration after administration and generation after generation.

Laws would not accomplish this alone. If they could, Mexico in our own day would not have been scourged by prolonged civil war.

Neither is the explanation to be found in overwhelming physical force, behind the private citizen honored by the highest office in the people's gift. The man in the White House conceivably might have as strong or a stronger personal following.

The one thing that assures this peaceful transfer of authority is public sentiment, that would turn all men against one who would seek to frustrate the political will of the people, as expressed at the polls.

This moving, thought-compelling spectacle again will be staged tomorrow in Washington.

Woodrow Wilson will surrender his high authority and Warren G. Harding will assume it.

The one will go on upward to the seats of the mighty, to have his day as earth's most powerful executive.

The other will step back into the ranks of America's private citizens, whence he emerged to serve his country with distinguished ability.

To the departing President, a respectful country will say: "Ave!"

To the other, a hopeful nation will cry: "Hail!"

WOUNDED MAN FOUND AFTER PISTOL FIGHT

Supposed Bandit Is Discovered on Northern Pacific Tracks Near Prosser, Having Been Hit by 3 Bullets.

PROSSER, Thursday, March 3.—Following a pitched battle last night between a posse headed by Sheriff Rolph and a stranger who escaped in the darkness, a man was found this morning near the Northern Pacific tracks five miles east of Prosser suffering from three bullet wounds. He refused to give his name, claiming he fell from a freight train. He will recover.

Early last night two residences and two warehouses were burglarized. Surmising that the robber had sought to escape down the railroad tracks, the sheriff and two deputies walked east until they overtook a solitary passenger train. The man was captured and his flash light on the man and announced that he was an officer. He was taken to the Yakima River. He had been shot in the back and had a dangerous wound. A revolver was picked up near the scene of the encounter. The man resisted arrest this morning and the sheriff felled him with a blow from handcuffs.

CIVIC CANDIDATES ENDING CAMPAIGNS

Only Four Days Left Before General Election. DISCUSS CARS AND TAXES

Montlake Bridge and Park Boulevard Propositions Receiving Considerable Support.

WITH only four days intervening before election day, the six candidates for City Council are confining their energies to neighborhood or community meetings and making their arguments chiefly on two points, taxation and the city street car.

WASHINGTON IS DECORATED FOR INAUGURAL DAY

Capital Misses Customary Crowds With Bands and Parades but Spirit Is Still in Evidence.

WASHINGTON, Thursday, March 3.—The inaugural spectacle, reduced in intensity and scope by Mr. Harding's desire for simplicity, is taking hold of the national capital.

The street crowds are larger and more numerous than for the ceremonies of 1907, but the sidewalks are still empty of the throngs of people that were seen in 1907.

This inauguration will be different from any of recent times, all because Mr. Harding does not like display, and thought he ought to conform to the desire of the country for extreme simplicity. There is much unemployment here, and it is going to be worse than it has been in any other part of the country.

But that is not the case now. There are a number of extra folks in town, many of them tourists returning from the inauguration. The streets tonight the crowd will have swelled into the hundreds, and the street throngs tomorrow, however, will be made up of local people on a holiday and anxious to see the little that will be going on. Of the visitors, the larger number will be more interested in the politics of the inauguration than in its ceremonies.

So far as the official part of the program is concerned, it will not be different from those of former inaugurations. The official part, however, has always been the least interesting part. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Harding will probably leave to the White House together at 10:30 tomorrow forenoon, on their way to the city.

SENTENCED TO JAIL

Thomas J. Gilbert, driver of a for-hire car, pleaded guilty in Superior Court this afternoon before Judge King Dykeman to a charge of third degree assault. Gilbert was arrested in January after a drinking party, in a dispute over payment of his bill, he was charged with assaulting the woman. He was sentenced to one year in the city jail, with a minimum sentence for jail, a misdemeanor.

BIGAMY IS CHARGED

Frank W. Myers, alias Walter Myers, former street car employe, pleaded not guilty to a direct charge of bigamy when arraigned this afternoon before Judge King Dykeman in Superior Court. Myers is accused of deserting his wife and eight children and marrying a Tacoma girl January 13. Two charges against him in the lower court are desertion and abandonment and non-support. He is in jail in default of \$25.00 bail.

Sheriff Finds Liquor In a Deserted House

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RAIDING THE HOME OF W. A. ROSS

35 years old, a boilermaker, at Juanita, two miles north of Kirkland, yesterday afternoon, federal prohibition agents seized two stills, one of them the largest ever found by federal agents in the state of Washington. The larger still is of 100 gallons capacity and was running at full speed, on its base over a brick furnace, in an upstairs room of the Ross residence, when agents entered.

Agents trailed the big still, they said, in shipment from Yakima, where it was manufactured in a boiler works. It had been unpacked this week, and was in operation for the first time, at the time of the raid, they said.

Agents knocked at the door of the residence late yesterday afternoon, they declared, having seen a man using from the chimney in an unusual cloud. Ross told them to come in and they found that the federal prohibition enforcement agents.

"Well, you have me. Come on upstairs," Ross said, according to members of the raiding party.

The collection was turning out a "first run" of rye whiskey in the big still, and further refining it by running it through the smaller still, agents said. The product turned out was a high grade of whiskey, they alleged.

Ross was arrested and placed in the jail here. Agents said he was previously arrested by internal revenue agents, charged with running a still in the town of Juanita, where he had a former residence at 6423 Phinney Ave.

Agents seized in addition to the stills 150 gallons of rye whiskey. The Ross, they said, was sufficient to have run the still for a long time. He had not the distillation been interrupted.

The big still, federal agents said, is the most completely equipped and the best that ever has come under their observation.

VESSEL RUNS ASHORE

VANCOUVER, B. C., Thursday, March 3.—The steamship Easthorn, Capt. A. Grunland, which left Vancouver last night for Nanaimo, was grounded on the flat of the Indian reserve, in the Narrows, when the vessel ran aground. The vessel was damaged.

OLYMPIA, Thursday, March 3.—King County delegation's bill, increasing the number of Superior Court judges in the county from nine to eleven, was passed by the House today by a vote of 77 to 12.

**SENATE PASSES BILL TO BAR ALIENS AS SCHOOL TEACHERS**

OLYMPIA, Thursday, March 3.—The Senate today passed S. B. 130, prohibiting aliens and disloyal persons from teaching in the schools of the state. **FOUR MEASURES AFFECTING SEATTLE PASSED BY HOUSE**

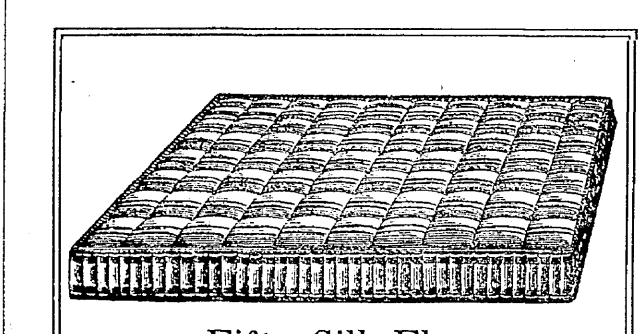

**ALIEN LAND BILL OPPOSED**

Seattle Federation of Churches Denounces Legislative Measure.

Denouncing the antialien land bill as provocative of trouble between the United States and Japan and contrary to the Bible and Declaration of Independence, a resolution has been adopted by the executive committee of the Seattle Federation of Churches and forwarded to Olympia.

The resolution charges that the bill is the direct product of anti-Japanese agitation in California, and represents a sentiment foreign to this state, "there being no real Japanese question here."

The resolution urges defeat of the "totally uncalculated and mischievous measure" on the ground that it is in all probability unconstitutional; will serve no useful purpose; will increase resentment in Japan toward the United States; is in spirit out of harmony with the teaching of the Bible; is contrary to the Declaration of Independence and un-American.
