RATES ON FUEL RAISED
RAILROADS GET PERMISSION FOR INCREASES

New Tariffs Affect Interstate Business Originating in Western Washington.

Railroads serving the Pacific Northwest will be permitted to make increases in their present interstate rates for carrying fuel and pulp wood, according to a decision just handed down by the Interstate Commerce Commission. A copy of which was received from Washington, D. C., today by the transportation bureau of the Seattle office of Commerce. But they are denied sanction for a general increase.

Due to the fact, however, that present interstate rates are not uniform, different sections will be differently affected by the decision. The rates the commission declares just and proper for example, are considerably higher than the present Western Washington rates on interstate and intrastate business. On the other hand, they are somewhat lower than the present Eastern Washington intrastate and interstate rates. They are, however, approximately the same as the rates in Oregon.

Based on Distance Hunt.
The new rates are all based on the distance haul, special commodity rates that were in effect in some districts being abolished. They will go into effect as soon as the carriers can arrange to comply with the commission's order, which is that new rates must be filed by May 2.

When they asked permission to increase their interstate rates last November, the railroads also asked permission to increase their intrastate rates—their rates on business within any state in Washington, Oregon and Idaho. An interesting feature of the interstate commission's decision is that it recognizes that the interstate rates be made the basis for a revision of the intrastate rates in the Pacific Northwest.

The State Department of Public Works in Washington and the State Public Utilities Commission in Idaho, the commission says, have indicated that they favor this plan. Neither state commission, however, has entered any intrastate rate decision.

DECLARES CALDWELL ERRED
Councillor Erickson Makes Verbal Attack on Carroll.

Attacking City Comptroller Harry W. Carroll for "preparing propaganda, discrediting the City Council," and declaring Mayor Hugh M. Caldwell erred in vetoing the \$100,000 light bond redemption fund, Councillor Oliver T. Erickson vented his wrath on the city utilities committee this afternoon at the city hall.

At the same time Chairman Erickson made public a statement by Councillor Philip Tindall, former acting chairman of the finance committee, saying that at a conference with the mayor, comptroller and light department auditor, the mayor did not manifest any such opinion on the measure as to indicate the redemption would be "undesirable," as the mayor later asserted in his veto message.

The bill in controversy appropriated \$100,000 to retire 25 per cent general bonds of the Light Department, held by the state, April 1, three years before maturity. The mayor protested that with warrants outstanding at 6 per cent, it was folly to retire obligations at a lower interest rate. As the ordinance was an emergency measure, it could not be passed over his veto.

"While the Light Department is now on a cash basis, it would be when \$14,000 in warrants for salaries and bills are issued April 25. It will be \$100,000 short," said Mayor Hugh M. Caldwell, answering the criticism of Councillor Erickson and Tindall.

Tindall told Mr. Erickson he could pay off these bonds next October, when the light fund would be on a real cash basis, meantime using this money to retire 6 per cent bonds instead of the 25 per cent bonds.

"As a matter of fact, besides being short of cash for the April 25 warrants, the department still owes the Water Department \$200,000, on which it is paying 5 per cent."

TWO JAPANESE CONVICTED
Charged With Conspiracy to Smuggle Aliens Into U. S.

Two Japanese of the original 12 defendants charged with conspiracy to smuggle Japanese aliens into the United States last October 27, on the steamship Alabama Maru, were found guilty yesterday by a jury in the United States court. They were Horakichi Saito, former quartermaster on the steamship, and Mitsuyoshi Fujitara, ship's purser.

The maximum penalty under the law, the United States attorney said, is two years imprisonment and fine of \$10,000. Sentence was deferred until next Monday.

Three other defendants found not guilty were Shigeo Shitara, Seattle restaurant proprietor; T. Yoshida, Seattle bonding agent; and S. Sakai, fireman on the Alabama Maru. Sakai was turned over to immigration authorities. Several of the 12 defendants placed on trial were stowaways charges against the stowaways were dismissed Wednesday.

YUKON PIONEERS GET HOME
Deeded to Order by Trading Company Retiring From Field.

DAWSON, Y. T., Friday, April 15.—The Yukon Order of Pioneers has been reformed with a new name in Dawson by the Northern Commercial Company, the pioneer trading concern of the Yukon country, retiring from its home office in San Francisco, the company has deeded to the pioneer order its central building on the corner of Second and Queen streets, president, St. Louis, Mo. The company is one of the few live members of the order.

After 33 years in the northern field, the Commercial Company is retiring from the Yukon and has given its Dawson home as a farewell testimonial from pioneer men to pioneer men in the northern outposts.

PLEBISCITE IS POSTPONED
Delay of Month Ordered in Austrian Crownland of Salzburg.

VIENNA, Friday, April 15.—The constitutional plebiscite for fusion with Germany to be held in the former Austrian crownland of Salzburg has been postponed for one month from April 21.

Despite this postponement, Pan-Germans in the Austrian Tyrol are insisting that the plebiscite in that region be held April 21. The Social Democrats on the other hand, declare it would be unwise to carry out the plebiscite on that date, because of the threatened march of French troops into Germany on May 1 might possibly lead to complications.

CONFERENCE ON POWER PROJECT
Governor Hart Accepts Invitation From Oregon Chief Executive.

SALEM, Ore., Friday, April 15.—Gov. Louis F. Hart of Washington has accepted an invitation from Governor Olson of Oregon to be held in Oregon relative to the Inland Empire power development. Washington will be represented by Marvin Chase, hydraulic engineer of that state. The conference date has not yet been set.

The conference is to be under a law passed by the 1921 Legislature providing for investigation and collection of data concerning hydroelectric resources of navigable streams in Oregon, the data to be presented to the federal power commission.

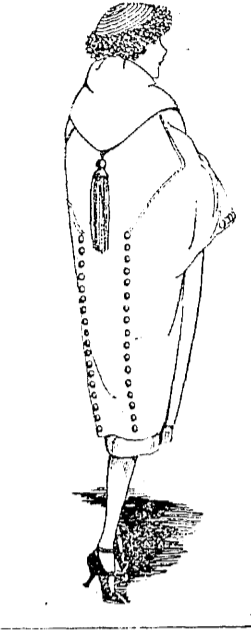
