Wilson Points Out Dangers

Spiritual Redemption Needed

Former President for First Time Since Illness Makes Public His Views on Present Day Problems.

By Associated Press. FROSTON, Friday, July 27.—Former President Woodrow Wilson, writing under the caption, "The Road Away From Revolution," for the August number of The Atlantic Monthly, sounds a note of warning that our civilization cannot survive materially unless it is redeemed spiritually. This is the first time since his illness that Mr. Wilson has made public his views on present day problems in the United States and throughout the world.

"In these dreadful and anxious days when all the world is at unrest and in confusion, it is the one who looks ahead seems darkened by shadows which portend dangers of many kinds. The cause of this is the denial of the ship of state during the World War. Only common prudence that we should look about us and attempt to assess the causes of distress and the most likely means of removing them."

Makes Religious Appeal.

Then, avoiding the partisan as he analyzes the existing state of American civilization, he goes briefly to the root of the matter by making essentially what is a religious appeal for a better understanding between the "haves" and "have-nots."

"Real ground for the universal unrest," he asserts, "lies deep at the sources of spiritual life of our time, and leads to revolution."

The cause of the Russian revolution, which he calls the outstanding event of his kind in our age, was, in his view, a "systematic denial to the great body of Russians of the rights and privileges which all normal men desire and must have if they are to be contented and within reach of happiness."

"What has this to do with America? It was against capitalism," he declares, "that the Russian leaders directed their attack and it is against capitalism under one name or another, that the discontented classes everywhere draw their indictment."

Everywhere, he says, there are thoughtful men who believe that capitalism is indispensable to civilization but he goes on to ask, "Is the capitalist system unimpeachable?" "Is it not true," the inquiry continues, "that capitalists have often seemed to regard the men whom they used as mere instruments of profit, whose physical and mental powers it was legitimate to exploit?"

Need Spiritual Redemption.

"The world has been made for democracy. There need now be no fear that any such mad design as that entertained by the insolent and ignorant Hohenzollerns and their counselors may prevail against it. But democracy has not yet made the world safe against irrational revolution. That supreme task which is nothing less than the salvation of civilization now faces democracy. Insistent, imperative, there is no escaping it, unless everything we have built up is presently to fall in ruin about us; and the United States as the greatest of democracies, must lead the way."

"The road that leads away from revolution is clearly marked for it is defined by the nature of men and of organized society. Therefore it behooves us to study very carefully and very candidly the exact nature of the task and the means of its accomplishment. This, that our of the whole matter is this, that our political system cannot survive materially unless it is redeemed spiritually. Here is the final challenge to our churches, to our political organizations and to our capitalists—to every one who fears God or loves his country."

He was on a vacation trip to the Coast with his wife and their son, Jack Osterman, Orpheum Circuit star, when stricken with diabetes. He was 60 years old and a native of Ohio.

California Denies Vote To Naturalized Japanese

SAN FRANCISCO, Friday, July 27.—A Japanese, admitted to citizenship by the federal courts by reason of service in the American Army, is not entitled to vote in California, according to a decision by the State Supreme Court yesterday.

The case was that of Ichizo Sato, who brought suit against Hary W. Hall, clerk of Sacramento County, asking the Superior Court for a writ of mandamus to compel the latter to register him as a citizen. Sato enlisted in the United States Army at Kure, Japan, in 1918, and was discharged at Honolulu June 29, 1919. The United States District Court for the territory of Hawaii admitted him to citizenship July 21, 1919.

The Superior Court denied the writ and an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court. Sato's attorneys argued that the Federal Court order was final and that a state tribunal must be bound by it. In yesterday's opinion the Supreme Court held that amendments to the California constitution expressly forbid the naturalization of persons of the yellow races and that state must be bound by the state law in that regard.
